### REDSKINS HOLD SEVEN PICKS IN 2015 NFL DRAFT, INCLUDING No. 5 OVERALL SELECTION

LOUDOUN COUNTY, Va. — The Washington Redskins currently hold seven selections in the 80th National Football League Draft, which commences on the evening of Thursday, April 30. The first round begins at 8 p.m. ET at the Auditorium Theatre in Chicago and will be televised by ESPN and NFL Network.

The draft will continue at 7 p.m. ET on Friday with the second and third rounds, and will conclude with rounds 4-7 on Saturday, starting at noon ET.

**Redskins General Manager Scot McCloughan will speak to the media at Redskins Park at noon on Monday, April 27.**

The team will host media at Redskins Park all three days of the draft. A member of the Redskins coaching staff will be made available to the media following days in which the team makes a selection.

The 2015 draft will be the franchise's first under the guidance of McCloughan, who joined the Redskins in January with a premier pedigree in player selection throughout his NFL career. During his tenures in various capacities with the San Francisco 49ers and Seattle Seahawks, draft picks selected during McCloughan's teams have accounted for 38 career Pro Bowl selections and 14 first-team All-Pro honors, including players like guard Steve Hutchinson and linebacker Patrick Willis. McCloughan also contributed to the 2011-13 drafts as the Seahawks' Senior Personnel Executive, drafts that included two-time All-Pro cornerback Richard Sherman and three-time Pro Bowl quarterback Russell Wilson.

In his introductory press conference at Redskins Park on Jan. 9, McCloughan stressed the importance of the draft, a philosophy into which he was indoctrinated as a scout for the Green Bay Packers from 1994-99 under Pro Football Hall of Famer Ron Wolf.

"I honestly think the draft is the lifeline of your organization," McCloughan said. "The thing I liked about what we did in San Fran, what we did in Seattle, we drafted our own, molded our own and re-signed the ones we wanted to re-sign. So all of a sudden now, you train them how you want to train them. See, in Washington, we're going to draft these guys and we are going to draft them and mold them as Redskins."

The 2015 NFL Draft will mark the first time since 2012 that the Redskins will enter the draft with a first-round pick. The team's last four first-rounders (Brian Orakpo, 2009; Trent Williams, 2010; Ryan Kerrigan, 2011; Robert Griffin III, 2012) have earned eight combined Pro Bowl selections. Seven of the last eight players selected by the Redskins in the first round have earned Pro Bowl berths during their NFL careers.

Last year, the Redskins added eight players as part of their 2014 draft class, marking the third time in four years Washington had selected at least eight players (2011, 2012 and 2014) in a single draft. The Redskins have selected 36 players in the past four drafts, the franchise's largest four-year total since the institution of the seven-round draft in 1994.

The Redskins' most instant contributor came in the fourth round when the team selected Clemson cornerback Bashaud Breeland with the No. 102 overall selection. Breeland played in all 16 games of his rookie season, making 15 starts. His 15 starts were the third-most by a rookie cornerback in team history, trailing only Champ Bailey (16 in 1999) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Darrell Green (16 in 1983). Breeland intercepted two passes — both coming in Redskins wins — and earned recognition on NFL.com's All-Rookie Team as named by long-time NFL personnel guru Gil Brandt.

The 2015 NFL Draft will feature a three-day format for the sixth consecutive year. Thursday's first round will allow 10 minutes before each pick. The second round, which resumes the draft on Friday evening, allows seven minutes between picks. The third round allows five minutes between selections. The final four rounds will take place on Saturday and allow five minutes between picks. Live coverage of the entire draft will be provided by both the NFL Network and ESPN/ESPN2.

Trading draft picks is allowed during the course of the draft. However, the Commissioner reserves the right to proceed with the selection process if a club fails to complete a trade within their allotted time period in that round.

### 2015 REDSKINS SELECTIONS

The Redskins enter the 2015 NFL Draft with a total of seven scheduled picks. The Redskins have all of their original selections for 2015.

By virtue of finishing tied with the New York Jets last season, the Redskins and Jets will alternate the fifth and sixth picks in each round. The Redskins will have the fifth pick in the draft order in odd-numbered rounds and the sixth pick in even-numbered rounds.

The team's first pick in the draft is at No. 5 overall. If the Redskins make a selection with the No. 5 overall pick, it would be the team's second selection at No. 5 in team history and their first since selecting Redskins legend Sean Taylor in 2004. Each NFL team sends club personnel to serve as its representatives at the NFL Draft site. The representative is in constant communication with the principal decision makers back at Redskins Park. This year, Video Director **Mike Bracken** and Physical Therapist/Assistant Athletic Trainer **Elliott Jermyn**, will represent the Redskins at the draft. Former Redskins safety **Brig Owens** will be the Redskins' representative on Friday to announce the team's selection during the second round.

## REDSKINS DRAFT HISTORY

The Redskins have made 30 picks all-time at the overall selections currently held by the team in the 2015 NFL Draft. Since the institution of the National Football League Draft in 1936, teams have made a total of 505 combined selections with the Nos. 5, 38, 69, 105, 141, 182 and 222 picks — the overall selections currently held by the Redskins for the 2015 NFL Draft.

### DRAFT TRIVIA

**Q: Are the Redskins' nine all-time selections at No. 38 their most at any pick?**

**A:** No, the Redskins' nine picks at No. 38 are tied for their third-most at any single draft position. The Redskins have made 11 all-time selections at Nos. 148 and 160.

**Q: The Redskins hold the No. 222 overall selection in the 2015 NFL Draft. Which eventual Redskins receiver and college football icon was drafted by the 49ers with the No. 222 overall pick in 1959?**

**A:** College Football Hall of Fame coach Tom Osborne, who won 255 career games as head coach at the University of Nebraska. After being selected by the 49ers, Osborne actually played in 24 games as a member of the Redskins from 1960-61.

## 2015 NFL DRAFT ORDER



The Draft order is determined by the following procedures:

(A) The winner of the Super Bowl game shall select last and the loser of such game shall select next-to-last in all rounds, regardless of the record of such participating clubs in the regular season.

(B) The losers of the Conference championship games shall select 29th and 30th in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(C) The losers of the Divisional playoff games shall select in the 25th through 28th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(D) The losers of the Wild Card games shall select in the 21st through 24th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(E) Clubs not participating in the playoffs shall select in the first through 20th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

If, after all the foregoing procedures have been applied, ties still exist in any grouping except (A) above, such ties shall be broken by figuring the aggregate won-lost-tied percentage of each involved club's regular season opponents and awarding preferential selection order to the club which faced the schedule of teams with the lowest aggregate won-lost-tied percentage.

If ties still exist, the divisional or conference tie-breaking method, if applicable, shall be applied. If neither the divisional nor the conference tie-breaking methods are applicable, ties shall be broken by a coin flip conducted by the Commissioner.

The tie between Kansas City and San Diego was broken by the division tie-breaker. Since Kansas City defeated San Diego twice in head-to-head competition, San Diego is given priority in the Draft order and will select in the 17th position, with Kansas City in the 18th position.

Clubs involved in two-club ties will alternate positions from round-to-round. In ties that involve three or more clubs, the club at the top of a tied segment in a given round will move to the bottom of the segment for the next round, while all other clubs in the segment move up one position. This rotation continues throughout the Draft.

## 2014 DRAFT RECAP



The Washington Redskins finalized their 2014 NFL Draft class on Saturday, May 10, 2014, selecting eight total players.

### NOTES ON THE REDSKINS' OVERALL DRAFT

- The Redskins made eight selections in the 2014 NFL Draft. The eight selections marked the third time in four years Washington has selected at least eight players (2011, 2012 and 2014).
- Washington selected 36 players in the past four drafts, the franchise's largest four-year total since the institution of the seven-round draft in 1994. The team last posted a four-year total of 36 across the 1991-94 NFL Drafts, a time frame which included two 12-round drafts, one eight-round draft and one seven-round draft.
- Washington made at least seven selections in four consecutive drafts for the first time since 1992-95.
- The Redskins selected two players in the seventh round, marking the sixth time in the last seven years that the team has drafted multiple players in the seventh round. Washington has made multiple seventh-round selections in each year from 2008 through 2014 with exception of the 2013 NFL Draft.
- Washington made two trades during the 2014 NFL Draft. On Friday, the team sent the No. 34 overall pick to the Dallas Cowboys in exchange for the Nos. 47 and 78 overall picks. On Saturday, Washington sent the No. 178 overall pick to the Tennessee Titans for the Nos. 186 and 228 overall selections.
- Washington selected four players with selections acquired by trade: LB Trent Murphy (No. 47 from Dallas), G Spencer Long (No. 78 from Dallas), RB Lache Seastrunk (No. 186 from Tennessee) and K Zach Hocker (No. 228 from Tennessee).
- Washington has selected 23 players with selections acquired by trade since 2010: FB/TE Dennis Morris (2010), WR Terrence Austin (2010), C Erik Cook (2010), T Selvish Capers (2010), LB Ryan Kerrigan (2011), WR Leonard Hankerson (2011), RB Roy Helu, Jr. (2011), S DeJon Gomes (2011), WR/TE Niles Paul (2011), WR Aldrick Robinson (2011), OL Maurice Hurt (2011), LB Markus White (2011), QB Robert Griffin III (2012), G Josh LeRibeus (2012), LB Keenan Robinson (2012), RB Alfred Morris (2012), T Tom Compton (2012), CB Jordan Bernstine (2012), LB Brandon Jenkins (2013), LB Trent Murphy (2014), G Spencer Long (2014), RB Lache Seastrunk (2014) and K Zach Hocker (2014).
- The 2014 NFL Draft marked the first time since 2010 that the Redskins had not selected college teammates in the same draft. Washington selected at least a pair of college teammates in each draft from 2011-13 (Nebraska's Roy Helu, Jr., DeJon Gomes and Niles Paul in 2011; SMU's Josh LeRibeus and Richard Crawford in 2012; Florida State's Chris Thompson and Brandon Jenkins in 2013).
- With the selection of Stanford's Trent Murphy, the Redskins made a product of the conference now known as the Pac-12 the team's top selection for the first time since selecting Stanford DB Duncan McColl with their top selection in the 1977 NFL Draft.

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF TRENT MURPHY

- Murphy was the first selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 35th selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Murphy was the 432nd selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 34th second-round selection in that time frame. He was the 52nd second-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- The selection marked the third time the Redskins had taken a pass rusher with their first selection in the last six drafts (DE/LB Brian Orakpo in 2009 and LB Ryan Kerrigan in 2011).
- Including the selection of CB David Amerson with their initial pick in 2013, the Redskins selected a defensive player with their top pick in

consecutive seasons for the first time since drafting S Sean Taylor, CB Carlos Rogers, LB Rocky McIntosh and S LaRon Landry with their first selections in the 2004-07 NFL Drafts.

- Murphy was the 15th Stanford product selected by the Redskins all-time, joining E Keith Topping (1936), B Bill Joslyn (1944), B Willard Sheller (1944), B Bill Shipkey (1945), C Jim McCurdy (1945), B Lynn Brownson (1947), B Bob Anderson (1948), B Bob Mathias (1953), E Sam Morley (1954), QB Don Bunce (1972), DE Duncan McColl (1977), G Brad Badger (1997), QB Todd Husak (2000) and LB Jarred Newberry (2005).
- Murphy was the sixth Stanford product selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967), tied for 11th-most by a single college in that timeframe.
- Murphy's selection at No. 47 marked the highest the Redskins had taken a Stanford product since selecting E Keith Topping with the No. 11 overall pick in the 1936 NFL Draft.
- With Murphy's selection, the Redskins used a second-round pick to draft a linebacker for the first time since selecting McIntosh in the second round (No. 35 overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft.
- Murphy was the third player selected by the Redskins at No. 47 all-time, joining T Larry Lutz (1936) and DE Shane Collins (1992).
- All three of Washington's all-time selections at No. 47 played collegiately in the conference now known as the Pac-12.
- Murphy was the first Pac-12 Conference player selected by the Redskins since selecting UCLA WR Terrence Austin in 2010. The two are the only Pac-12 products selected by the Redskins since 2010.

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF MORGAN MOSES

- Moses was the second selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 36th selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Moses was the 433rd selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 32nd third-round selection in that time frame. He was the 61st third-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- The selection marked the earliest the Redskins had taken an offensive lineman since selecting two-time Pro Bowler Trent Williams with the fourth overall pick of the 2010 NFL Draft.
- Moses was the first player from the University of Virginia selected by the Redskins since the team picked G Jim Huddleston in the sixth round of the 1986 NFL Draft. The Redskins' last four selections from UVA have all been offensive linemen.

- Moses became the ninth player from the University of Virginia selected by the Redskins all-time, joining E Tom Dudley (1947), B Jonny Papit (1951), E Fred Polzer (1958), RB Jeff Anderson (1969), DT Rick Brand (1969), T Paul Rogers (1969), C Dan Ryczek (1971) and Huddleston.

- Moses' selection was the highest the Redskins had ever selected a UVA product. Jonny Papit was previously the highest-selected UVA player by the Redskins at the No. 76 overall pick in the 1951 NFL Draft.

- Moses was the sixth player selected by the Redskins at No. 66 all-time, joining G Rotta Holland (1937), B George Peters (1942), B Dick Lynch (1958), KR Mike Oliphant (1988) and DT Tracy Rucker (1989).

- Moses was the seventh Redskins draft pick since 2010 to have competed collegiately in the Atlantic Coast Conference, the most of any conference in that timeframe. The Redskins selected three ACC products in both the 2011 (Clemson's Jarvis Jenkins, Miami's Leonard Hankerson and Florida State's Markus White) and 2013 drafts (NC State's David Amerson, Florida State's Chris Thompson and Florida State's Brandon Jenkins).

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF SPENCER LONG

- Long was the third selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 37th selection by the Redskins since 2010.

- Long was the Redskins' second pick of the third round, marking the first time the Redskins had made two third-round selections since 2002 (CB Rashad Bauman and WR Cliff Russell). It was the fourth time in the Common Draft era (since 1967) that the Redskins had made multiple selections in the third round (1993, 1994, 2002 and 2014).

- Long was the 434th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era and the 33rd third-round selection in that time frame. He was the 62nd third-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.

- Including the selection of Morgan Moses, Washington selected offensive linemen with consecutive picks for the first time since selecting C Erik Cook and T Selvish Capers with two seventh-round selections in the 2010 NFL Draft.

- Long was the 20th Nebraska Cornhusker selected by the Washington Redskins all-time, tied with Alabama for fourth-most of any school in team history.

- Long joined E Elmer Dohrmann (1938), G Don Boll (1953), T Jerry Minnick (1954), T Don Glantz (1955), G Bob Jones (1964), B Kent McCloughan (1965), T John Strohmeier (1965), T Walter Barnes (1966), T Mark Doak (1975), DB Ardell Johnson (1975), G Dennis Pavelka (1975), DE Dean Gissler (1976), DB Brian Davis (1987), DT Kent Wells (1990), S Jamel Williams (1997), LB Cody Glenn (2009), RB Roy Helu (2011), S DeJon Gomes (2011) and WR Niles Paul (2011) as Nebraska products drafted by Washington all-time.

- Long was the seventh player to be selected by the Redskins at No. 78 all-time, joining B Wilbur Moore (1939), B Bob Hoffman (1940), T Mike Katrisha (1948), B Bob Kennedy (1949), T Leon Bennett (1958) and T Charley Nickoson (1963).

- Long was the fourth Nebraska product selected by the Redskins since 2010, the most of any school.

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF BASHAUD BREELAND

- Breeland was the fourth selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 38th selection by the Redskins since 2010.

- Breeland was the 435th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 30th fourth-round selection in that time frame. He was the 45th fourth-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.

- Including the selection of safety Phillip Thomas in 2013, the Redskins drafted defensive backs in the fourth round in consecutive drafts for the first time in the Common Draft era. It was the first time the Redskins have selected members of the same position group in the fourth round in consecutive years since selecting linebackers Shawn Barber and Nate Stimson in the 1998 and 1999 NFL Drafts, respectively.

- Breeland was the 81st defensive back selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era, the most of any position group.

- Breeland was the eighth Redskins draft pick since 2010 to have competed collegiately in the Atlantic Coast Conference, the most of any conference in that timeframe. The Redskins selected three ACC products in both the 2011 (Clemson's Jarvis Jenkins, Miami's Leonard Hankerson and Florida State's Markus White) and 2013 drafts (NC State's David Amerson, Florida State's Chris Thompson and Florida State's Brandon Jenkins) and added Virginia's Morgan Moses in the third round.

- Breeland was the seventh Clemson player selected by the Redskins all-time, joining B Charlie Timmons (1942), B Buck George (1955), DB Frank Liberatore (1968), S Leomont Evans (1996), WR Rod Gardner (2001) and DE Jarvis Jenkins (2011).

- Breeland was the fifth player selected by the Redskins at No. 102 all-time, joining C Frank Kuchta (1958), RB Jimmy Smith (1984), RB Stephen Davis (1996) and QB Kirk Cousins (2012).

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF RYAN GRANT

- Grant was the fifth selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 39th selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Grant was the 436th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 46th fifth-round selection in that time frame. He was the 71st fifth-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Grant's selection marked the first time the Redskins had selected a wide receiver since picking three in the 2011 NFL Draft (Leonard Hankerson, Niles Paul and Aldrick Robinson).
- Grant joins Paul (2011) and Darnerian McCants (2001) as the only receivers drafted by the Redskins in the fifth round all-time.
- Grant was the 48th wide receiver selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era.
- Grant was the 11th Tulane product selected by the Redskins all-time, joining B Buddy Banker (1940), T Bill Kirchem (1940), T Harley McCollum (1942), B Walt McDonald (1943), T Roman Bentz (1943), E Art Porter (1945), G Don Lockwood (1959), G Bernie Darre (1960), HB Terry Terrebbonne (1962) and QB Patrick Ramsey (2002). Grant and Ramsey are the Redskins' only two selections from Tulane in the Common Draft era.
- Grant was only the second player selected by the Redskins all-time with the No. 142 selection, joining UCLA T Gil Moreno (1956).

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF LACHE SEASTRUNK

- Seastrunk was the sixth selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 40th selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Seastrunk was the 476th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 51st sixth-round selection in that time frame. He was the 77th sixth-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- The Redskins have selected at least one running back in four consecutive drafts, their longest streak since selecting a running back in nine consecutive drafts from 1983-91.
- Seastrunk was the first sixth-round running back taken by the Redskins since drafting Pro Bowler Alfred Morris at No. 173 overall in the 2012 NFL Draft.
- Seastrunk was the first Baylor product selected by the Redskins since drafting quarterback Robert Griffin III with the No. 2 overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft.
- Seastrunk was the 10th Baylor product drafted by the Redskins all-time, joining QB Adrian Burk (1951), B Larry Isbell (1952), B Jerry Coody (1954), DT Earl Maxfield (1970), G Mike Hughes (1976), LB Geff Gandy (1983), DB Johnny Thomas (1987), DB Charles Bell (1991) and Griffin III (2012).
- Seastrunk was the 55th running back selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era, tied with linebacker for the second-most of any position group in that time frame.
- Seastrunk was the eighth player selected by the Redskins all-time at the No. 186 overall pick, joining T Tiny Croft (1942), E Fred Polzer (1958), B Ton Urbanik (1964), RB Rick Badanjek (1986), DT Mario Mondos (2001), QB Colt Brennan (2008) and LB Robert Henson (2009).
- The No. 186 overall selection used to pick Seastrunk was acquired by Washington from Tennessee via trade. Seastrunk became the second Redskins draft pick to be selected by means of a pick acquired from the Titans, joining CB Justin Tryon (2008).

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF TED BOLSER

- Bolser was the seventh selection of the Jay Gruden era and was the 41st selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Bolser was the 477th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 57th seventh-round selection in that time frame. He was the 88th seventh-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Including the selection of Jordan Reed in 2013, the Redskins drafted a tight end in consecutive drafts for the first time since drafting Tyler Ecker and Fred Davis in 2007 and 2008, respectively.
- Bolser was the 11th Indiana product drafted by the Redskins all-time, joining B Chick Jagade (1948), B Nick Sebek (1949), G Cas Witucki (1950), T Harry Jagielski (1954), E Brad Bomba (1957), G-LB Don Croftcheck (1965), LB Stu O'Dell (1974), DB Quinn Buckner (1976), QB Babe Laufenberg (1983) and QB Gibran Hamdan (2003).
- Bolser was the 26th running back selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era.
- Bolser was the fifth player selected by the Redskins all-time at the No. 217 overall pick, joining G Robert Reed (1965), WR Tim Alexander (1999), OL Maurice Hurt (2011) and CB Jordan Bernstine (2012).

### NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF ZACH HOCKER

- Hocker was the eighth selection of the Jay Gruden era and is the 42nd selection by the Redskins since 2010.
- Hocker was the 478th selection made by the Redskins in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 58th seventh-round selection in that time frame. He is the 89th seventh-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Hocker was the first kicker selected in the 2014 NFL Draft.
- Hocker was the first kicker selected by the Redskins since taking Tennessee's John Hall in the sixth round of the 1999 NFL Draft.
- Hocker was the seventh listed kicker selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era, joining Mike Braff (1968), Mike Wedman (1973), Mike Flater (1974), Dan Miller (1982), Chip Lohmiller (1988) and Hall (1999).
- Hocker was the seventh player selected by the Redskins all-time with the No. 228 overall selection, joining T Hal Mullins (1947), B Dick West (1948), B Frank Pattee (1949), K Mike Flater (1974), DE Dallas Hickman (1975) and RB Jawan Jamison (2013).
- Washington made selections at No. 228 in consecutive seasons across the 2013 and 2014 NFL Drafts. All of Washington's picks at No. 228 (1947-49, 1974-75, 2013-14) have either been preceded or followed by another selection at No. 228 in the draft the year before or year after.
- Hocker was the Redskins' second of two selections in the 2014 NFL Draft acquired from Tennessee (RB Lache Seastrunk - No. 186).
- Hocker was the 11th Arkansas Razorback selected by the Redskins all-time, joining C Earl Wheeler (1947), B Ross Pritchard (1949), B Alvin Duke (1950), G Buddy Brown (1951), B A.J. Baker (1955), G John Childress (1962), G Dave Adams (1963), B Gordon Guest (1964), LB Jeff Goff (1982) and LB Ravin Caldwell (1986).
