REDSKINS OPEN 2011 PRESEASON AT FEDEXFIELD

Two of the NFL's most storied franchises kick off their 2011 preseason campaigns this Friday as the Washington Redskins host the defending AFC Champion Pittsburgh Steelers at FedExField. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. ET.

The game will be broadcast locally on NBC4 and Comcast SportsNet with Kenny Albert calling the play-by-play, Joe Theismann providing the color analysis and Doc Walker reporting from the sideline.

The contest can be heard on the Redskins Radio Network with Larry Michael on the call, Pro Football Hall of Famers and Redskins legends Sam Huff and Sonny Jurgensen adding color analysis, and Chris Russell on the sideline.

The Redskins' preseason debut will highlight a quarterback battle between eight-year NFL veteran Rex Grossman and 29-year-old John Beck. Grossman, who led the Chicago Bears to the 2006 NFC Championship, posted two of his three career 300-yard passing games during his three starts for the Redskins from Weeks 15-17 last season.

Whichever quarterback gets the starting nod will share the backfield with new running back Tim Hightower, recently acquired in a trade from Arizona. Hightower spent three seasons with the Cardinals, where in 2010 he totaled career highs in carries (153), rushing yards (736) and average yards per carry (4.8).

The Redskins return four starters from their offensive line, including right tackle Jammal Brown, a two-time Pro Bowler, in his second season in Washington. The other tackle position is held by Trent Williams, the team's 2010 first-round pick (fourth overall).

Will Montgomery will slide over to center after having started six games at right guard in 2010, and Kory Lichtensteiger will start at left guard, where he started all but two games a season ago. The group is rounded out by guard Chris

Chester, who the Redskins signed as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore.

The offense, under the direction of offensive coordinator Kyle Shanahan, will be bolstered once again by tight end Chris Cooley, a two-time Pro Bowler. In 2010, Cooley became the 27th player in team history to play in 100 games as Redskin, and his 420 career receptions are the sixth-most in franchise history.

The defense returns all three of the Redskins' Pro Bowlers from a season ago, led by 14th-year NFL veteran London Fletcher, whom coach Mike Shanahan recently called "the best leader I've seen since I've been in the National Football League."

Brian Orakpo, who has two Pro Bowl appearances in as many NFL seasons, will man one outside linebacker position. Ryan Kerrigan, selected by the Redskins with the 16th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, is expected to provide a complementary pass rush at the other outside linebacker position.

The defensive line received a boost with the signings of free agents Barry Cofield and Stephen Bowen, both of whom were pulled away from division rivals. Cofield set career highs in tackles (54) and sacks (four) with the Giants in 2010, while Bowen was impressive with the Cowboys in replacing defensive end Marcus Spears late last season.

The secondary includes the reigning Pro Bowl MVP, as cornerback DeAngelo Hall returns after tying a career high in interceptions (six) and tying for the league lead in takeaways (8) a season ago. Josh Wilson, an offseason free agent signing, will start at the opposite cornerback position. Strong safety LaRon Landry returns in 2011 after an Achilles injury derailed an All-Pro caliber first half in 2010, and he'll team with free safety Oshiomogho Atogwe, a free agent signing who had 22 interceptions in six seasons with the St. Louis Rams.

ALUMNI CENTER

Formally organized in 1958, the Washington Redskins Alumni Association was the first organization of its kind in the country. The organization spearheaded the alumni movement among former professional football players and was the model for other alumni groups that later formed in all NFL cities.

The primary objectives of the Redskins Alumni are “promoting a continuing interest in current and past players of the Washington Redskins” and “promoting and fostering interest and funding for charitable purposes.” With respect to the latter, the alumni conduct fundraising events to raise money that can be donated to charitable organizations or used in other ways to help improve the quality of life for youth in the Greater Washington community.

Today, Redskins alumni continue to make their presence known throughout the community. As a very active chapter of the NFL Alumni Association, their motto is “Caring for Kids.” In addition to the numerous events and appearances, Redskins Alumni participate in throughout the year, they hold two major fundraising events of their own—the Redskins Alumni Charity Golf Classic, now in its 33rd year, and the annual Washington Redskins Welcome Home Luncheon, now in its 50th year. Since his arrival in Washington as Executive Vice President/General Manager in December of 2009, Bruce Allen has made it a priority to build a bridge to the franchise’s glorious past.

That heritage was honored once again last weekend when former Redskins great Chris Hanburger was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He was presented by his son, Chris. Hanburger was voted into the Hall after being a nominee of the seniors committee. In all, he waited 28 years to be elected.

Hanburger joins Darrell Green (2008), Art Monk (2008) and Russ Grimm (2010) to make four players who spent the majority of their careers with the Redskins to earn the honor in the past four years. In addition, former Redskins Bruce Smith (2009) and Deion Sanders (2010) have also been elected over that time.

Hanburger said of his election to the Hall of Fame: “It’s wonderful, I’m overwhelmed. It’s just such a tremendous honor to even be nominated, let alone, be voted in. You have to think about all of the men that played before I did, certainly the men that I played with and against, and then you look at the guys playing now. It’s just a select few that make it in. I was fortunate to play with players on the Redskins defense that made it all work for me.”

The Washington Redskins picked North Carolina linebacker Chris Hanburger in the 18th round of the 1965 NFL Draft. The All-American started to make his mark late in his rookie season as he began to form a reputation as a player who made big plays. Soon thereafter he assumed the role as the “quarterback” of the Redskins defense while becoming one of the most dependable and steady linebackers of his era.

Hanburger was an integral part of the dominant Redskins teams of the 1970s. At the same time that Washington was rising to the top of the NFL, Hanburger began earning national acclaim. He was selected first-team All-Pro four times in a five-season span from 1972 to 1976 and named All-Eastern Conference in 1968 and 1969 and All-NFC six times in seven seasons from 1970 to 1976. Hanburger was also voted to nine Pro Bowls in his 14-season career.

His performance in the 1972 season gained him perhaps his

greatest notoriety as he helped lead the Redskins to its first ever Super Bowl berth.

“I am so happy for Chris,” Redskins Owner Daniel Snyder said following the announcement. “He was one of the era’s most dominating players and is well deserving of this honor. Not only did he make nine Pro Bowls, Chris was the captain of the defense and was a true coach on the field. This is a great day for the entire Redskins’ organization.”

Allen echoed Snyder’s sentiments:

“I think it’s a great day for the Redskins, our fans and all of Chris’ teammates,” Allen said. “It shows that a person who is dedicated to the game and is passionate and didn’t care about his own personal glory, but cared about his teammates can be rewarded, and that is special.”



Nine-time Pro Bowler Chris Hanburger was elected as part of the 2011 Pro Football Hall of Fame Class. He became the fourth predominantly Redskins alumnus to be so honored in the last four years.

WASHINGTON REDSKINS HEAD COACH MIKE SHANAHAN

Mike Shanahan is in his second season as the Redskins' Executive Vice President/Head Coach. He enters the year with a resume that includes two Super Bowl championships and a 152-108 regular season record as an NFL head coach. Additionally, he is one of 12 head coaches in league history to guide a club to a pair of Super Bowl victories and one of six to accomplish the feat in consecutive years.

Shanahan has the 15th-most regular season wins (152) by a head coach in NFL history and ranks second in that category among active coaches (Bill Belichick – 162). Including eight postseason victories, Shanahan's 160 overall wins are 16th all-time and are also second among active coaches to Belichick's 177. In 17 seasons as a head coach with the Washington Redskins (2010-) Denver Broncos (1995-2008) and Los Angeles Raiders (1988-89), Shanahan has a regular season winning percentage of .585 (152-108) and an overall winning percentage of .586 (160-113).

Shanahan became the 28th head coach in Redskins history on January 6, 2010. In his first season in Washington, Shanahan guided the Redskins to a two-win improvement over the 2009 campaign. His club set franchise season records for overtime victories (3) and completions (349), and registered the third-highest gross passing yards total in team annals. In addition, the 2010 Redskins registered a touchdown pass in 15 consecutive games for the first time in club history and led the NFL with nine completions of at least 50 yards, including one in four consecutive games for the first time since 1987.

Defensively, the Redskins recorded 27 takeaways on the season, which was their most since 2005 (28), including 14 interceptions, which tied for their most since 2005 (16). Washington registered at least two takeaways in six consecutive games from Weeks 2-8, the first time the franchise had done so in the same season since 1995. The unit placed linebackers London Fletcher and Brian Orakpo and cornerback DeAngelo Hall on the NFC Pro Bowl team. In his 26 seasons as an NFL coach, Shanahan has had 47 different players earn a total of 95 berths in the Pro Bowl.

During his NFL coaching career, Shanahan has been a part of teams that have played in 10 AFC or NFC Championship Games. He has coached in six Super Bowls – five with Denver and Super Bowl XXIX with San Francisco. In his nine seasons coaching at the collegiate level, Shanahan's teams participated in eight bowl games and won two national championships (Oklahoma – 1975 and Eastern Illinois – 1978).

In his tenure with the Broncos, Shanahan guided the franchise to two Super Bowl victories, three conference championship game appearances, seven postseason berths and nine winning seasons. He joined Vince Lombardi, Don Shula, Chuck Noll, Jimmy Johnson and Belichick as one of six coaches with back-to-back Super Bowl championships. Shanahan led Denver to 138 regular-season victories in 14 seasons in Denver, a win total that marks the 10th-most by a head coach with one franchise in NFL history. Among the nine coaches who have more wins with one club than Shanahan, all eight who are eligible for the Pro Football Hall of Fame have been honored with membership. In the spring of 2010, Shana-

han was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame.

Shanahan arrived as head coach in Denver in 1995 from the World Champion San Francisco 49ers, where he served as offensive coordinator for three seasons (1992-94). The 49ers offense reached unprecedented levels under his leadership. San Francisco's three-year offensive averages under Shanahan's direction were the most productive in the history of pro football. His three-year averages included being No. 1 in the NFL in total points (an average of 469.7 per year), total touchdowns (60.3), rushing touchdowns (23.7), passing touchdowns (31.7), third-down efficiency (48.5%), total offense (6,230 yds.) and average yards per play (6.2).

San Francisco quarterback Steve Young re-wrote many NFL passing records and was named the NFL Most Valuable Player twice in his three years under Shanahan's guidance. In addition, Young threw for a record six touchdowns on his way to earning Super Bowl XXIX Most Valuable Player honors.

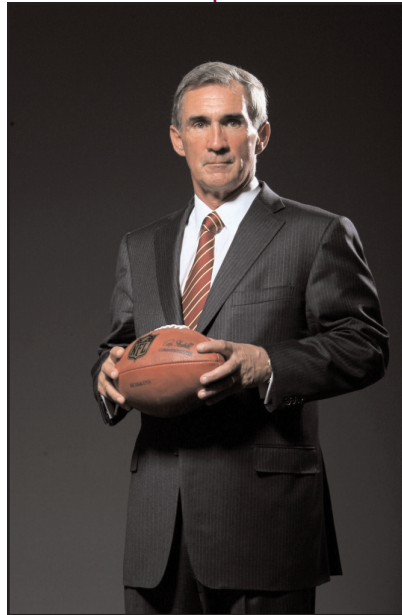
Shanahan was on the Broncos coaching staff for all three of their Super Bowl appearances in the 1980s (following the 1986, 1987 and 1989 seasons). He first went to Denver in 1984 as the club's wide receivers coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1985 and would serve the next three seasons in that capacity. Shanahan returned to Denver as quarterbacks coach on October 16, 1989, after serving as head coach of the Los Angeles Raiders in 1988 and through the first four games of the 1989 campaign.

Shanahan began his coaching career as an offensive assistant for Oklahoma in 1975-76, and the school won the national championship in his first year on its staff. In 1977, at the age of 24, he was hired as Northern Arizona's backfield coach and the Lumberjacks averaged a school-record 391.1 yards per game that season. A year later, Shanahan returned to his alma mater, Eastern Illinois, as offensive coordinator and helped guide the Panthers to the Division II national title. The year before Shanahan's arrival, the team was 1-10. In 1979, he served as offensive coordinator at Minnesota, where he implemented the run-and-shoot offense to help the Golden Gophers set 40 school offensive records.

Shanahan moved on to Florida the following year, inheriting the poorest offense in Division I football as well as a team record of 0-10-1. In Shanahan's four years at Florida, the team broke many offensive school records and went to four consecutive bowl games. During his stint as a college coach, his teams had a combined record of 78-29-2 (.725), won two national championships, and appeared in eight bowl games and four playoff contests.

A native of Oak Park, Ill. (8/24/52), Michael Edward Shanahan attended East Leyden High School in Franklin Park, Ill. He received a scholarship to Eastern Illinois University, where he played quarterback and earned bachelor's and master's degrees.

Shanahan and his wife, Peggy, have two children – son Kyle and daughter Krystal. Kyle is a graduate of the University of Texas and is the Redskins' offensive coordinator. Krystal also is also a graduate of the University of Texas.

2011 WASHINGTON REDSKINS BY POSITION

The Redskins underwent significant change in personnel at the turn of the 2009-10 calendar years, as in December, the team hired Bruce Allen as General Manager and, in January, announced the hiring of Mike Shanahan as Head Coach. Nearly 18 months later, the turnover of their roster is just as drastic as their arrival.

Of the 90 players on the roster entering the Redskins' 2011 preseason opener against the Pittsburgh Steelers, 66 have joined the team since the new regime joined forces in early January 2010, a turnover rate of 73.3 percent from the team Shanahan inherited.

First and foremost, Shanahan and Allen have shown a commitment to building through the college ranks, as 35 of the 66 new additions have come by way of the NFL Draft or college free agency signings. The Redskins have 17 draft picks from 2010 and 2011 on their current roster, outnumbering the 14 players on the current roster drafted by the Redskins from 2004-09. College free agents signed during the Shanahan era account for 18 players of the current roster. The Redskins have also added 25 players via free agency, five by trade and one by waiver claim.

QUARTERBACKS (5)/RETURNING STARTERS (0)

The Redskins are in the midst of a quarterback competition, with John Beck and Rex Grossman competing for the starting position.

The Redskins return John Beck and Rex Grossman, who started the final three games in 2010. In Grossman's four games of action, including three starts, he completed 74-of-133 passing attempts for 884 yards, seven touchdowns and four interceptions. He has played in 41 career games with 34 starts and has completed 598-of-1,104 passes for 7,081 yards, 40 touchdowns and 40 interceptions.

In Beck's four NFL seasons, he has completed 60-of-107 passing attempts for 559 yards, one touchdown and three interceptions. Six-year veteran Kellen Clemens signed as an unrestricted free agent. In his career, he has played in 24 games, including nine starts. He has completed 146-of-282 passes for 1,680 yards, five touchdowns and 11 interceptions.

Ben Chappell and Marc Verica have added depth to the position as college free agents.

RUNNING BACKS (8)/RETURNING STARTERS (1)

Ryan Torain finished the 2010 season as the Redskins' starting running back, but he'll face competition in the face of Tim Hightower, a fourth-year back traded from Arizona.

Last year, Torain appeared in a career-high 10 games with eight starts. He set career highs in rushes (164), rushing yards (742), rushing touchdowns (four), receptions (18), receiving yards (125) and receiving touchdowns (two). Hightower, who graduated from Richmond, has played three seasons, improving his rushing yardage totals each season. He has compiled 439 attempts for 1733 yards (3.9 ypc) and 23 touchdowns. He also grabbed 118 catches for 801 yards.

rookie draft picks Roy Helu and Evan Royster could factor into the rotation as well. Helu finished with 3,404 rushing yards at Nebraska, the 11th-highest total in Big 12 Conference history. Royster became Penn State's all-time leading rusher as a senior after amassing 686 rushes for 3,932 yards (5.7 avg.) and 29 touchdowns.

James Davis and Keiland Williams return after appearing on the Redskins' roster in 2010, and Shaun Draughn was added in June as a college free agent out of North Carolina.

Second-year fullback Darrel Young will start at fullback.

WIDE RECEIVERS (11)/RETURNING STARTERS (2)

Santana Moss, who has led the Redskins in receiving yards in each of his six seasons in Washington, returns for his 11th NFL season in 2011. His 442 receptions, 5,027 receiving yards, and 27 touchdown catches as a Redskin all rank in the top ten in franchise history. He is now only 350 yards away from moving into fourth place on the team's all-time receiving yards list. His average of 73 receptions per season with the Redskins is a record for a franchise that has employed Hall of Fame receivers Wayne Millner, Bobby Mitchell, Charley Taylor and Art Monk.

Second-year receiver Anthony Armstrong broke out as a season ago as a 27 year-old rookie. He ranked second on the team in receiving yards with 871, third on the team in receptions with 44, and tied tight ends Chris Cooley and Fred Davis for second on the team with three touchdowns. Armstrong's 19.8 yards per catch ranked third in the NFL.

Among the other returning receivers are Malcolm Kelly, Brandon Banks and Terrence Austin. Kelly spent the 2010 season on Injured Reserve while Banks and Austin served primarily as special teamers. Banks emerged as a threat as a punt and kick returner in 2010, ranking third in the NFL in punt return yards (431). Against Detroit on Oct. 31, he returned a kickoff 96 yards for his first regular season touchdown. Austin contributed late in the season at wide receiver, catching two passes for 41 yards vs. the New York Giants in Week 17.

During the offseason, the Redskins added veteran receivers Jabar Gaffney and Donté Stallworth. Gaffney is coming off of career-high 65 receptions and 875 yards in Denver. Stallworth joins the club following an injury-plagued 2010 season in which he had 82 yards on only two receptions.

The Redskins addressed the position in the 2011 NFL Draft as well, selection Miami's Leonard Hankerson (third round), Nebraska's Niles Paul (fifth round), and SMU's Aldrick Robinson (sixth round). They also signed undrafted free agent Isaac Anderson.

TIGHT ENDS (6)/RETURNING STARTERS (1)

A favorite for both fans and quarterbacks, Chris Cooley returns after a 2010 season in which he finished second on the team with 77 receptions and third with 849 receiving yards. His 849 receiving yards tied a career high set in 2008.

Cooley has been one of the league's premier tight ends since entering the NFL in 2004. He earned Pro Bowl nods in 2007 and 2008, becoming the first tight end in franchise history to earn consecutive selections. He is the only tight end in NFL history to record at least six touchdown receptions in each of his first four seasons. Cooley's career statistics include 420 career receptions for 4,638 yards and 33 touchdowns. His reception numbers from 2005-10 account for five of the top six receiving seasons by a tight end in club history. He had at least one reception in 76 consecutive regular season games, dating back to 2004, before the reception streak was snapped at Carolina in Week 5 of 2009.

Cooley's absence in 2009 created opportunities for Fred Davis, who used the playing time to develop and create one of

the top tight end tandems in the league heading into 2010. Davis finished 2009 with 10 starts, posting career highs in receptions (48) and receiving yards (509) and leading the team with a career-high six touchdown receptions. Of those totals, only seven receptions and 46 yards came before taking over for Cooley. Davis' four receiving touchdowns in December were the third-most in the NFL for the month. He followed up his impressive 2009 season with 21 receptions for 316 yards and three touchdowns in 2010.

Former fullback Mike Sellers has transitioned to tight end to provide a veteran presence as an edge blocker. Second-year tight end Logan Paulsen and undrafted free agents Kevin Gidrey and Joe Torchia round out the group. Paulsen caught two passes in 2010, accounting for 10 yards and his first career touchdown.

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN (15)/RETURNING STARTERS (4)

The Redskins return four starters on the offensive line in tackles Trent Williams and Jammal Brown, guard Kory Lichtensteiger and center Will Montgomery, who slides over to center after having started six games at guard in 2010. The team also added free agent guard Chris Chester from the Baltimore in the 2011 offseason.

Williams, the fourth overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft, arrived at training camp noticeably slimmer and expects to improve on a season in which he saw action in 14 games with 13 starts. Brown, a two-time Pro Bowler, enters his second full season at right tackle.

The group, led by coach Chris Foerster, also includes 10-game starter Artis Hicks, as well as free agent signing Sean Locklear, who started 16 games for Seattle in 2005 on an offensive line that helped NFL MVP Shaun Alexander to a record-breaking season. The unit also includes Eric Cook, Selvish Capers, Xavier Fulton, Donovan Raiola and Clint Oldenburg.

The team also added guard Maurice Hurt in the 2011 NFL Draft and signed Corey O'Daniel and Willie Smith as college free agents.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN (11)/ RETURNING STARTERS (2)

The Redskins made defensive line a priority in the free agent market, luring Barry Cofield and Stephen Bowen from division rivals in the offseason. Cofield spent his first five seasons with the New York Giants, posting totals of 211 career tackles (156 solo) and 10.5 sacks. Bowen joins the Redskins after 44 career tackles (17 solo) and 5.5 sacks in five seasons with Dallas. Kedric Golston returns after leading the defensive line with 57 tackles a season ago, a number that bested fifth-year end Adam Carriker by three. Anthony Bryant had 18 tackles in 2010, and the rest of the unit includes Darrion Scott, Doug Worthington and Jeff Stehle.

The Redskins added two defensive linemen in the 2011 NFL Draft, selecting Jarvis Jenkins and Chris Neild and signing Thomas Weaver as an undrafted free agent. Jenkins, who was selected in the second round, is expected to compete for a starting job after impressing coaches and teammates early in camp.

LINEBACKERS (13)/ RETURNING STARTERS (4)

The Redskins return a deep and productive unit at the linebacker position, including two Pro Bowlers, London Fletcher and Brian Orakpo. In addition, the two other starters from last year's linebacker corps return, including Rocky McIntosh and Lorenzo Alexander. McIntosh totaled 155 tackles – trailing only Fletcher in that category.

Fletcher is the only NFL player to have tallied more than 100

tackles in each of the past 11 seasons, and ranks second among active NFL players in tackles. In his career, Fletcher has totaled 2055 tackles (1348 solo), 16 interceptions, two touchdowns, 32.5 sacks, 17 forced fumbles and 12 fumble recoveries. He has earned Pro Bowl selections each of the last two seasons and was a member of the 1999 Super Bowl Champion Rams.

Orakpo has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons, amassing 19.5 sacks. Kerrigan with the 16th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft. During his senior campaign at Purdue, Kerrigan was an All-American in addition to earning first-team All-Big Ten and Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. Last season, Kerrigan ranked third in the country with 12.5 sacks and registered 70 tackles, five forced fumbles and an FBS-high 26 tackles for loss.

During training camp, the Redskins added linebacker Keyaron Fox, a seven-year NFL veteran who had been part of a Super Bowl championship team in Pittsburgh in 2009.

The depth at the linebacker position includes Horatio Blades, Rob Jackson, Edgar Jones, Perry Riley, Marcus White, Eric McBride, and Obi Eze.

DEFENSIVE BACKS (15)/RETURNING STARTERS (2)

The Redskins' secondary returns the reigning Pro Bowl MVP, as cornerback DeAngelo Hall will start at cornerback one season removed from tying a career high with six interceptions, including a four-interception performance against Chicago. At the opposite corner, the Redskins signed free agent cornerback Josh Wilson, whom coach Mike Shanahan has praised for his ability to play in multiple types of coverages. Nine-year NFL veteran Phillip Buchanon will assume primary responsibility for the nickel back spot.

With the free agent addition of free safety Oshiomagho Atogwe to returning strong safety LaRon Landry, the Redskins can boast one of the most talented safety duos in the NFL. Atogwe joins the Redskins after six seasons with the St. Louis Rams. Landry was in the midst of an All-Pro season before being placed on Injured Reserve with an Achilles injury. Second-string safeties Reed Doughty and Kareem Moore combined to start 22 games for the Redskins a season ago.

Third-year cornerbacks Kevin Barnes and Byron Westbrook will be joined by rookies Tyrone Grant, Reggie Jones and Brandyn Thompson. Chris Horton, Anderson Russell and DeJon Gomes add depth at safety.

SPECIALISTS (4)/RETURNING STARTERS (2)

Veteran kicker Shayne Graham was signed to battle incumbent kicker Graham Gano kicking duties in 2011. Gano finished the 2010 season in a three-way tie for 13th in field goals made (24).

Graham, a Dublin, Va. native, is entering his 11th NFL season. His 86.0 career field goal percentage ranks third in NFL history. In 2010, Graham played eight games last season with the New England Patriots after one game with the New York Giants. In the nine games, he converted on all 12 field goal attempts.

The Redskins signed punter Sav Rocca as a free agent in the offseason. The former Australian Football League star spent the last three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Long snapper Nick Sundberg remains as long snapper one season after starting all 16 games as a rookie.



THE OPPONENT

The Steelers enter as the defending AFC Champions, having won their conference en route to an appearance in Super Bowl XLV last February.

Quarterback Ben Roethlisberger threw for 3,200 yards through 12 regular season games in 2010, going 240-of-389 (61.7 percent) with 17 touchdowns and five interceptions. He added 622 yards, four touchdowns and four interception during Pittsburgh's three-game playoff run, including a 25-for-40 for 263-yard, two-touchdown performance in the Super Bowl. The 263 yards were his third-highest passing yardage total in his 13 career postseason games.

Rashard Mendenhall will start at running back after posting a career-high 1,273 yards last season. He also set career highs in carries (324), touchdowns (13), and games played/started (16/16). His 324 carries were second-most in the AFC, only three shy of Houston's Arian Foster. Isaac Redmond was second on the team in carries in 2010, getting 4.8 yards per carry on 52 attempts.

Roethlisberger's top target in 2010 was receiver Mike Wallace, whose 1,257 yards ranked fifth in the NFL. Wallace's 21.0 yards per catch average was second to only Philadelphia's DeSean Jackson (22.5), and his 10 touchdowns were tied for third in the AFC. Hines Ward will start at the opposite wide receiver position. Ward, a 13-year NFL veteran, has amassed 11,702 yards and 83 receiving touchdowns during his career. Roethlisberger also has the option of tight end Heath Miller, who caught 42 passes in 14 regular season games in 2010.

The Steelers boast the reigning NFL Defensive Player of the Year in safety Troy Polamalu, who won the award despite missing two games with an Achilles injury. Polamalu was the sixth Steeler to win the award. He had 63 tackles and seven interceptions in 2010.

At defensive line, the Steelers starting trio includes defensive ends Aaron Smith and Brett Keisel and nose tackle Casey Hampton, the three of whom have 21 combined years of NFL experience entering 2011. Back-up nose tackle Chris Hoke is entering his 10th NFL season, and backup ends Ziggy Hood and Cameron Heyward were first-round draft picks in 2009 and 2011, respectively.

Linebackers Lawrence Timmons (132), James Farrior (109) and James Harrison (100) accounted for the top three tackling totals for the Steelers in 2010. Harrison contributed 10.5 sacks, six forced fumbles and five passes defended. Linebacker LaMarr Woodley also had 10 sacks as well as two interceptions.

Polamalu is joined in the defensive backfield by safety Ryan Clark, nickel back William Gay, and cornerbacks Bryant McFadden and Ike Taylor. In conjunction with the team's pass rush, the unit helped hold opposing passers to 6.31 yards per attempt in 2010, the lowest average in the league.

Former Redskin Shaun Suisham will handle kicks, and Daniel Sepulveda, the former two-time Ray Guy Award winner from Baylor, will handle punting duties. Antonio Brown will return kickoffs and punts.



MIKE TOMLIN

Mike Tomlin was named the 16th head coach in Pittsburgh Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. Hired at the age of 34, Tomlin became only the third head coach hired by the Steelers since 1969.

Tomlin became the youngest head coach in NFL history to both coach in and win a Super Bowl when he led the Steelers to a 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII. By winning the Super Bowl in only his second season as a head coach, he also became the fastest to win a Super Bowl title in Steelers history.

Tomlin is one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach. Tomlin has compiled a 43-21 record in the regular season during his four-year head coaching career. His .672 winning percentage after four seasons is tied for first in team history. By leading the Steelers to a 12-4 record in 2010, Tomlin became only the second Steelers' head coach to post winning records after each of his first four seasons.

The Steelers' offense ranked 14th in the NFL (14th passing, 11th rushing) despite playing its first four games without its starting quarterback, Ben Roethlisberger. Pittsburgh's defense ranked second in the NFL (first vs. run, 12th vs. pass) while leading the NFL with 48 quarterback sacks. The Steelers set a team record and led the NFL, allowing only 62.8 rushing yards per game. The Steelers continued to be dominant at Heinz Field under Tomlin in 2010. Pittsburgh finished with a 5-3 home record in 2010 after finishing 7-1 (2007), 6-2 (2008) and 6-2 (2009) at home during Tomlin's first three seasons. Tomlin's 24-8 record

and .750 winning percentage at home after four seasons ranks second in Steelers' history.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William and Mary (1990-94) and finished his career with 101 receptions for 2,046 yards and a school-record 20 TD catches. A first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994, he established a school record with a 20.2 yards-per-catch average.

Tomlin was the NFL's second-youngest head coach in 2007, and he became only the second Steelers coach in team history to win at least 10 games during his first year at the helm. The Steelers posted a 7-1 record at home in 2007 and were 5-1 in the AFC North (3-0 at home).

Tomlin became only the second Steelers head coach to win his first three games. During 2007, the Steelers became just the fifth team in NFL history to win their first four home games by at least 20 points.

The Steelers' defense was dominant under Tomlin's guidance in 2008, leading the NFL in total defense (237.2), pass defense (156.9), points per game (13.9), total yards per play (3.9), rushing yards per attempt (3.3), passing yards per attempt (4.7) and third down efficiency (31.4), and finished second in league rushing defense (80.3).

Tomlin led the Steelers to a 10-6 record in 2007, and became just the second coach in team history to post a winning record, win a division title and earn a playoff berth in his inaugural season.

FEDEXFIELD GOES GREEN

The Washington Redskins and NRG Energy, one of the largest energy companies in the United States, are bringing renewable energy to FedExField as part of the first professional sports sponsorship to carry the NRG name. New solar power installations integrated into the stadium and in the parking lot will be unveiled in September. The solar power system at FedExField will provide a portion of the stadium's electricity needs on game days and can generate enough power to serve all of its electrical needs on non-game days.

As part of the nine-year agreement, NRG will install three different types of solar panels that together will generate two megawatts (MW) of electricity. NRG will cover 850 spaces in the Platinum A1 Parking Lot with 8,000 solar panels. These panels will generate power for the stadium and provide covered parking to protect fans from inclement weather and enhance their tailgating experience on game days. An NRG-branded entry plaza at Gate A will inform fans about renewable energy and showcase clean energy technologies. The installation will include translucent solar panels, sculptures featuring thin film solar technology and 10 electric vehicle charging stations from NRG's eVgasm charging network.

"Our partnership with NRG will add to the fans' game day experience at FedExField and offers a unique example of how solar energy installations can do more than generate power," said Dan Snyder, owner of the Washington Redskins. "NRG's expertise and vision are a great match for us and we are excited to be part of this effort that will reduce our environmental impact and offer our fans another unique experience."

"It will take 8,000 solar panels and a lot of expertise to deliver this win to the Redskins – we're getting it done," said David Crane, NRG's President and CEO. "The Redskins understand the importance of increasing our national energy security by making full use of our own inexhaustible natural energy resource. NRG is helping to make that change at FedExField and across the country."

"There is nothing like homegrown, in this case stadium-grown, energy," said Fred Smith, chairman, president and chief executive officer of FedEx Corporation and part owner of the Washington Redskins. "Solar can be a very smart investment. I am pleased to see FedExField moving in this direction and increasing its own energy independence."

"We were very excited when the Redskins came to us for process support for the solar panel project at FedExField," Prince George's County Executive Rushern L. Baker III added. "It is the type of green initiative that we are encouraging all businesses in the county to undertake."

NRG is involved in some of the most ambitious clean energy projects in the country, including utility-scale solar generation in California; eVgasm, the nation's first privately funded electric vehicle charging network; and smaller-scale efforts that bring the benefits of renewable energy directly to consumers.

NRG's subsidiary Reliant Energy will be the official provider for all the electricity to power the Redskins in their home stadium. Reliant is one of the largest retail electricity providers in the competitive Texas market, and is expanding both its commercial and residential businesses to several states in the Northeast, including Maryland.

LONDON CALLING

Redskins linebacker London Fletcher earned the nickname "Bam Bam" as a child because of his fondness for the Flintstones cartoon and his propensity to ransack his home.

In like manner, Fletcher has terrorized opponents for the last 13 seasons as one of the NFL's most consistent and productive defensive players.

Fletcher continued that level of play in 2010 earning his second consecutive Pro Bowl berth after registering 188 tackles (according to coaches totals), including four for loss, 2.5 sacks, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 12 passes defended and one interception.

Fletcher has also proven to be one of the league's most durable players as he has now started 167 straight league contests, a figure which ranks third among active players behind Indianapolis' Peyton Manning (208) and Tampa Bay's Ronde Barber (183).

Furthermore, Fletcher has not missed a game since entering the league as a college free agent with St. Louis in 1998. His 208 consecutive games played streak is tied for the fourth-longest streak among linebackers in NFL history and tied for first among active players.

Since joining the Redskins in 2007, Fletcher has led the team in tackles in each of his four seasons with the club, while assuming a leadership and defensive captaincy role.

Prior to being selected to the Pro Bowl following 2009 and 2010, Fletcher had been named an alternate each of the previous two years.

Fletcher anchored the St. Louis Rams' defense from his middle linebacker spot in 1999, leading the team in tackles with 138. While St. Louis' offense received much of the acclaim on the team's way to winning Super Bowl XXXIV, the defense ranked sixth in the league overall and first against the run.

Fletcher enjoyed four seasons in St. Louis, leading the Rams in tackles from 1999-2001, before joining Buffalo from 2002-06. He topped the Bills in tackles all five seasons and has continued that streak of leading his team in tackles to 12 straight seasons after four years in Washington.

His 188 tackles in 2010 marked the 12th straight season in which Fletcher recorded at least 100 stops, dating back

to 1999 when he was in his second season with the Rams. That is the longest current streak among all NFL players. Fletcher's 188 tackles in 2010 give him 2,053 for his career, the second-most among active players, behind only Baltimore's Ray Lewis.

Fletcher's 2.5 sacks in 2010 gave him 32.5 for his career, which is fourth among active inside linebackers behind Brian Urlacher (41), Ray Lewis (38.5) and James Farrior (33.5).

His 16 career interceptions are sixth among active linebackers, behind Lewis (30), Keith Bullock (21), Urlacher (18), Mike Peterson (18) and Takeo Spikes (18).

Fletcher, who was named to Peter King's All-Decade Team after leading the 2000s in tackles, has amassed more stops than any other player since the start of the 2000 season (according to STATS, INC).

In addition to winning the Redskins Defensive MVP Award in each of his first two seasons in Washington, Fletcher has become one of the team's most valuable players in the community. Fletcher earned the Washington Redskins Man of the Year Award in 2008 and 2009 and was one of three finalists for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year in 2009.

KID IN THE HALL

Redskins cornerback DeAngelo Hall earned his third Pro Bowl selection following the 2010 season after finishing tied for fifth in the NFL with six interceptions and tied for first with eight takeaways.

Hall made history in Week 7 at Chicago when he tied the league record with four interceptions, all in the second half, in the Redskins' 17-14 victory. Hall became the 19th player in NFL history to accomplish the feat and the first since Denver's Deltha O'Neal on Oct. 7, 2001. Hall also became the first player in NFL history to intercept four passes in a single half.

The following week, Hall became the first player since Albert Lewis in 1985 to record five interceptions over a two-game span. He finished the month of October with six interceptions. No NFL player has had more in a single month since Hall of Famer Mike Haynes in November of 1975.

Hall returned one of those interceptions against the Bears 92 yards for a touchdown to provide the winning score. That return was the longest of his career and tied for the third-longest in Redskins history.

Coupled with his 32-yard fumble return for a touchdown in Week 1 against Dallas, Hall became the first Redskins defender to score two defensive touchdowns in the same season since Andre Collins in 1994. Hall's fumble return for a touchdown was the Redskins' first fumble return for a touchdown since Sean Taylor did it at the Philadelphia Eagles on Jan. 1, 2006.

Hall now has three career interception returns for a touchdown and six career defensive returns for a touchdown. Hall also intercepted a pass and forced a fumble, which he returned 34 yards for a touchdown, in the Pro Bowl on his way to earning Most Valuable Player honors.

In his 36 games with the Redskins, Hall has registered 12 interceptions and four fumble recoveries and shown that he still has the playmaking ability that once made him the eighth overall selection in the 2004 draft.

Since entering the league that season, Hall is tied for third in the NFL in interceptions, behind Ed Reed (42) and Asante Samuel (40).

Hall has also shown he knows what to do when he has the ball in his hands as his 681 interception return yards over that span are the third-most in the league, behind Reed and Sharper.

Hall's six interceptions in 2010 tied a career high and were the most for a Redskins player since Matt Stevens also had six in 1999. Hall also recorded two fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. His eight takeaways were the most for a Redskins player since Barry Wilburn had nine (all interceptions) in 1987.

Hall recorded his 32nd career interception while only 26 years old. Since the 1970 merger, only Everson Walls (37) had more before turning 27.

In addition to his propensity for creating turnovers, Hall recorded a career-high 112 tackles (according to coaches film) in 2010, including four for loss. Hall's tackle total was third among NFL cornerbacks (according to NFL GSIS) behind the Giants' Terrell Thomas and the Titans' Cortland Finnegan. Hall's 16 passes defended ranked 11th in the NFL.

RACK 'EM

Second-year linebacker Brian Orakpo earned his second consecutive Pro Bowl berth following the 2010 season. In doing so, Orakpo became the first Redskins player ever selected to Pro Bowls following each of his first two NFL seasons.

Orakpo led the Redskins in sacks for the second consecutive year as a focal point in the Redskins' new 3-4 defensive scheme. Coupled with his franchise rookie-record 11 in 2009, his 8.5 sacks in 2010 made Orakpo the first Redskins player since Ken Harvey in 1996 and 1997 to record at least eight sacks in consecutive seasons.

In addition to his 8.5 sacks, Orakpo compiled 78 tackles, including nine for loss, 47 quarterback hurries, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He was often the focus of opposing offense's pass protections, which led to his drawing many crucial penalties throughout the season.

In Week 1 against Dallas, Orakpo drew one false start and three holding penalties, including one that negated a game-tying touchdown pass on the contest's final play.

Orakpo registered his first sack of 2010 in Week 2 when he brought down Houston's Matt Schaub and his second in Week 3 when he snagged St. Louis' Sam Bradford.

In Week 4 at Philadelphia, Orakpo drew two more holding penalties against Pro Bowl left tackle Jason Peters.

In Week 5 against Green Bay, Orakpo recorded two more sacks for the fourth multi-sack game of his young career.

Against the Colts in Week 6, Orakpo stripped quarterback Peyton Manning and recorded his fifth sack of the season in the process.

In Chicago in Week 7, Orakpo sacked Jay Cutler twice to increase his season total to seven. It also marked the first time in his career that Orakpo recorded a full sack in three straight games.

Against Philadelphia in Week 10, Orakpo combined with Andre Carter to sack Michael Vick. He added a sack against Minnesota in Week 12 to bring his season total to 8.5.

Orakpo, the team's first-round pick in the 2009 NFL Draft (No. 13 overall) and the fifth defensive player selected, was one of the most productive rookies in 2009. His 11 sacks led all NFL rookies and is tied for the most for a rookie over the last five seasons (Kameron Wimbley, 2006). Following the season he was named to the PFWA/PFW All-Rookie Team.

Orakpo tied for seventh in the NFL with 11 sacks each in 2009, while combining with Carter to form the league's fourth-highest producing sack tandem. They were one of only two pairs of teammates to reach double-digit sack totals in 2009. The last time the Redskins had two players with double-digit sacks in the same season was in 2000 when Marco Coleman had 12 and Bruce Smith had 10.

The last time the Redskins had two players with at least 11 sacks in the same season was in 1985 when Charles Mann had 15 and Dexter Manley had 14.5.

Orakpo's sack total was a franchise rookie record, surpassing the previous high of six shared by Dean Hamel (1985) and Andre Collins (1990).

With four sacks at Oakland in 2009, Orakpo is one of 14 players to record a double-digit sack season as a rookie over the last 16 years, joining Hugh Douglas (10, 1996), Simeon Rice (12.5, 1996), Peter Boulware (11.5, 1997), Jevon Kearse (14.5, 1999), Darren Howard (11, 2000), Dwight Freeney (13, 2002), Julius Peppers (12, 2002), Terrell Suggs (12, 2003), Kevin Williams (10, 2003), Shawne Merriman (10, 2005), Mark Anderson (12, 2006), Kameron Wimbley (11, 2006) and Ndamukong Suh (10, 2010).

Orakpo's four-sack game tied a Redskins franchise record and made him the first NFL rookie to record four sacks in a game since Cornelius Bennett, on Dec. 27, 1987. Orakpo's 44 yards lost on his four sacks are the most in the league since the statistic began being tracked in 1994.

Coupled with Carter's two sacks the pair became only the second duo in Redskins history to combine for six sacks in the same game, joining Phillip Daniels and Marcus Washington, who accomplished the feat on Dec. 18, 2005.

As a senior at the University of Texas, Orakpo was a unanimous All-American and won the Nagurski Trophy (nation's top defensive player), Lombardi Award (nation's top lineman) and Hendricks Award (nation's top defensive end).

He was a unanimous first-team All-America selection by the American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Football Writers Association of America, Sporting News and Walter Camp Football Foundation, the consensus Big XII Defensive Player of the Year and unanimous first-team All-Big XII selection.

LaRON LANDRY

Redskins safety LaRon Landry is perhaps the Redskins' most athletically gifted player, mixing his chiseled 6-foot, 220-pound frame with superior speed and range.

The 26-year-old was an All-American and three-time All-SEC performer at LSU, who the Redskins drafted with the sixth overall pick in 2007. Following a 2007 season in which he earned All-Rookie honors, Landry continued his emergence as one of the NFL's best safeties in 2008.

That year, he recorded 70 tackles, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, two interceptions and 13 passes defended and was voted as the first alternate to the NFC Pro Bowl squad behind Brian Dawkins and Adrian Wilson.

Recognizing Landry's unmatched athletic ability and aggressive, hard-hitting style, new Redskins defensive coordinator Jim Haslett decided to move Landry to his more natural strong safety position after two-and-a-half years at free safety. It was the perfect fit for Haslett's attacking scheme.

Following a Week 5 win against Green Bay, Sports Illustrated and NBC's Peter King wrote, "no single defensive player in the league has jumped from relative anonymity to stardom like strong safety LaRon Landry of the Redskins. In Week 5 against Aaron Rodgers and the Packers, he was the most important Redskin defender in a 16-13 beat down.

"Talk about starting and finishing the job: In the first minute of the game, on the first Green Bay series of the day, he creamed tight end Donald Lee and forced a fumble that the Redskins recovered. In the 63rd minute, in overtime, Landry picked off a Rodgers pass intended for the forgotten Greg Jennings; five minutes later, a Graham Gano field goal won the game."

After that game, Mike Shanahan said of Landry, "He amazes me, to be honest with you. I've been around a lot of football players in my career, and to watch a guy play that hard and that consistent week after week – it's only the fifth game of the season, but he's fast, he's a hitter and he loves to play. It's a pleasure to watch him and he's that way every snap – obviously, a great football player."

SI.com named Landry to its Midseason All-Pro Team, but an Achilles injury ended his season after nine games. Landry finished the season with 101 tackles (according to coaches film), including six for loss, one sack, one interception, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, 10 quarterback hurries and 11 passes defended.

At the time of his injury, Landry was third in the NFL in tackles (according to NFL GSIS.).

ACE OF ALL TRADES

Lorenzo Alexander, one of the most versatile players on the Redskins' roster, has emerged as one of the team's starting outside linebackers and a special teams standout. Earlier in his career, Alexander played defensive tackle, defensive end, and offensive guard and tight end in short-yardage situations.

This past offseason Alexander slimmed down to 275 pounds in order to make a position change in the Redskins' new 3-4 defense. After starting just one game in his previous three seasons, Alexander earned a starting outside linebacker job in Week 4 and opened 12 games there in 2010. According to coaches totals, he finished the season with 62 tackles, including three for loss, 1.5 sacks, one forced fumble, 17 quarterback hurries and four passes defended.

Alexander got his first career start at linebacker in a Week 4 win at Philadelphia and stayed there for a Week 5 win against Green Bay. In that matchup, Alexander broke up a 4th-and-goal pass from the Redskins own one-yard line to stop the drive.

"We thought Lorenzo would give us a little bit more flexibility in some of the things we do with our coverages out wide," Redskins Head Coach Mike Shanahan said.

Alexander, who led the Redskins with 20 special teams tackles and one fumble recovery, became one of the NFL's top special teams players and was elected an alternate to the NFC's Pro Bowl squad.

Along the way, Alexander has become one of the most feared special teams player in the league. He once again showed the propensity to deliver bone-crushing hits when in Week 4 he leveled Eagles kick returner Jorrick Calvin at the Philadelphia 17-yard line.

"Lorenzo seems to do this each week regardless of the other team," Shanahan said. "That was one of the best hits I've been around since I've been in the NFL. That was an explosion on the sidelines. So that was very, very special."

While Alexander has developed into one of Washington's special teams aces, he has also been one of the Redskins most active members of the community. For his efforts, Alexander was the Redskins winner of the Walter Payton Man of the Year Award.

Alexander started his ACES Foundation in 2008. The foundation runs college prep and life skills workshops and provides tutoring to young people in Alexander's native Oakland. More information can be found at www.lorenzoalexander.org.

THE COOLEY ZONE

Chris Cooley entered 2009 fresh off a Pro Bowl berth, his second straight, only to see his season ended prematurely by injury when he fractured a bone in his foot in Week 7 against Philadelphia. To that point, Cooley had registered 29 catches for 332 yards and two touchdowns. He ranked in the top eight tight ends in the NFL in all three categories.

In 2010, Cooley re-gained his form by catching 77 passes for 849 yards and three touchdowns. He tied for ninth in the NFC and tied for 15th in the NFL in receptions, which placed him second among NFC and NFL tight ends behind only Dallas' Jason Witten (94). His receiving yardage total ranked 18th in the NFC and 28th in the NFL, placing him third among NFC and NFL tight ends behind Witten (1,002) and San Francisco's Vernon Davis (914).

Cooley has taken his place among the league's elite tight ends since the Redskins drafted him in the third round in 2004, a year in which he was selected to the All-Rookie Team. Since that time, among players at his position, Cooley ranks fourth in receptions (420) and receiving yards (4,638) and fifth in touchdowns (33).

Cooley, who is the first tight end in NFL history to catch at least six touchdowns in his first four seasons, has also demonstrated his speed and athletic ability to run with the ball after the catch. The former high school All-American and undefeated Utah state champion wrestler has amassed 2,386 yards after catch (YAC) since entering the league in 2004, the third-most among NFL tight ends over that span.

In addition to making his mark as one of the most productive tight ends in the NFL, Cooley has established himself as arguably the greatest tight end in Redskins history. His 420 catches, 4,638 receiving yards and 33 touchdowns all rank second behind Jerry Smith (421-5,496-60), despite Cooley having played 66 fewer games in Washington.

Cooley is two catches shy of passing Jerry Smith (421) for fifth-place in Redskins history and the most ever by a tight end. Cooley, who tied a career and franchise tight end high with 849 receiving yards has now accounted for five of the top six receiving seasons by a tight end in Redskins history.

In Week 14 against the Buccaneers, Cooley (103) became the 27th player in Redskins history to play 100 games with the franchise. In Week 16 against the Jaguars, Cooley passed Ricky Sanders (414) for sixth all-time in receptions in Redskins history. Cooley had already passed Michael Westbrook for ninth all-time in receiving yards in Week 11 against the Titans.

Cooley's reception total of 420 is the 22nd-most in NFL history among tight ends, while his 4,638 receiving yards are the 35th-most by a tight end in league annals. He is three catches shy of moving past Smith, Bob Tucker (422), and Jay Novacek (422) and into the top 20 all-time among tight ends.



Redskins tight end Chris Cooley tied his career high with 849 receiving yards, which also tied a franchise record for tight ends. That total ranked third among NFL tight ends.

GATHER NO MOSS

The 2009 season marked Santana Moss' fifth as a Washington Redskin and the fifth straight he has led the club in receiving yards. For the year, the nine-year NFL veteran recorded a team-high 70 catches, for 902 yards and three touchdowns.

With 93 receptions for 1,115 yards in 2010, Moss ranked fourth in the NFL in catches and 10th in receiving yards. The 2010 season marked Moss' fourth career 1,000-yard receiving season and third with the Redskins. That ties Henry Ellard for the third-most in franchise history behind Gary Clark (5) and Art Monk (5). Moss also accomplished the feat in 2003 as a member of the New York Jets and in 2005 and 2008 as a Redskin.

Moss' 93 receptions set a career high and he led the Redskins in receiving yards for the sixth time, which ties him with Art Monk (1980, 82, 84-85, 89, 91) and Hugh Taylor (1949-54) for the second-most in club history.

Moss trails only Hall of Famer Charley Taylor, who did it eight times (1966-69, 72-75). It also marks the sixth consecutive season Moss has done so, tying Hugh Taylor (1949-54) for the franchise high.

In Week 14 against the Buccaneers, Moss caught seven passes for 82 yards and passed Ricky Sanders for fifth all-time in Redskins history in receiving yards. He has 6,142 as a Redskin, which is 350 yards behind Bobby Mitchell for fourth place in Redskins annals.

Moss' 70-catch average during his five seasons with the Redskins is a record for a franchise that has employed Hall of Fame receivers Wayne Millner, Bobby Mitchell, Charley Taylor and Art Monk. In addition, Moss set the club record for single-season receiving yards in 2005 with 1,483 yards on his way to the Pro Bowl.

For his career, which includes four seasons with the New York Jets, Moss owns 593 receptions for 8,558 receiving yards (14.4) and 52 touchdowns. Those totals rank 59th, 63rd and 87th, respectively, in NFL history.

Since 2003, among wide receivers, he is tied for 12th in the NFL with 48 touchdown catches, 10th with 8,085 receiving yards, and 11th with 561 receptions.

NEW TORAIN

Despite playing in just 10 games, running back Ryan Torain led the Redskins with 742 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns on 164 carries (4.5 avg.). Torain also added 18 catches for 125 yards and two touchdowns, which tied him with Santana Moss for the team lead in total touchdowns (6).

Torain's 74.2 rushing yards/per game ranked 14th in the league, while he cracked the 100-yard rushing mark in three of his eight starts.

The 24-year old endeared himself to Redskins fans with a physical running style, but Torain also proved he has the speed to pick up yardage in chunks. The 6-foot-1, 218-pounder reeled off 26 runs of 10 yards or more, which accounted for 15.9 percent of his rushing attempts. That was the third-best rate among NFL running backs behind only Jamaal Charles and LeGarrette Blount.

Prior to this season, Torain had appeared in three NFL contests, both coming during his rookie season in 2008. After spending the first two weeks of the 2010 season on the Redskins' practice squad, Torain accumulated 116 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries spelling starter Clinton Portis in Weeks 3 and 4.

Following an injury to Portis, Torain started the next four contests, which included back-to-back 100-yard rushing efforts against Indianapolis (20-100-5.0-2) and Chicago (21-125-6.0-0).

In the Week 6 game against the Colts, Torain became the first Redskins player to rush for 100 yards and two touchdowns in the same game since Portis on Oct. 12, 2008, against St. Louis.

When Torain followed that up with another 100-yard effort at Chicago, he became the first Redskin to reach 100 rushing yards in consecutive games since Portis in 2008, when he had 175 against Cleveland (10/19) and 126 at Detroit (10/26).

A mid-season hamstring injury cost Torain four games, but when he returned in Week 14 against Tampa Bay, he registered a historic performance.

Torain opened the game with a 54-yard scamper, a career and Redskins season long, on his way to a career-high 172 yards on 24 carries (7.2 avg.). His 172 rushing yards were the 10th-most in a single game in Redskins history. Torain gained 121 rushing yards in the first quarter, the most in the NFL since Tiki Barber of the New York Giants had 121 on Dec. 31, 2005. Torain's 158 rushing yards in the first half were the most in the NFL since Barber had 171 on Oct. 20, 2005 against Carolina.

First-year wide receiver Anthony Armstrong made a strong impression on Redskins coaches last offseason, but few could imagine the role he would play during the 2010 season. The West Texas A&M product finished the year with 44 catches for 871 yards (19.8 avg.) and three touchdowns.

Armstrong's 871 receiving yards in 2010 were the most for any Redskins wide receiver other than Moss since 2004 (Laveranues Coles – 950).

Armstrong (871) and Moss (1,115) became the first pair of Redskins wide receivers to top the 800-yard receiving mark since 1999. That year, Michael Westbrook had 1,191 and Albert Connell registered 1,132. Armstrong and Moss' combined 1,986 receiving yards are the most for a Redskins wide receiver duo since that 1999 season.

Moss (1,115), Armstrong (871) and Chris Cooley (849) became the first Redskins trio to each top 800 receiving yards since 1989 when Gary Clark (1,229), Art Monk (1,186) and Ricky Sanders (1,138) accomplished the feat.

Armstrong proved to be one of the league's premier deep threats as his 19.8-yards per catch average ranked third in the NFL behind Philadelphia's DeSean Jackson (22.5) and Pittsburgh's Mike Wallace (21.0). In addition, Armstrong hauled in four receptions of 50 yards or more, tied with Tennessee's Kenny Britt for the third-most in the league behind Jackson (6) and Wallace (5).

Led by Armstrong, the Redskins led the league with nine completions of at least 50 yards. Redskins tight end Fred Davis and San Francisco's Vernon Davis (3) were the only players at their position to have multiple catches of at least 50 yards. In fact, Fred Davis has two of the 12 receptions by the league's tight ends in 2010 to cover at least 50 yards. Redskins quarterback Donovan McNabb led all passers with eight completions of at least 50 yards.
