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REDSKINS HOLD SIX PICKS IN 2014 NFL DRAFT

LOUDOUN COUNTY, Va. — The Washington Redskins currently hold six selections in the 79th National Football League Draft, which commences on the evening of Thursday, May 8. The first round begins at 8 p.m. ET at Radio City Music Hall in New York City and will be televised by ESPN and NFL Network.

The draft will continue at 7 p.m. ET on Friday with the second and third rounds, and will conclude with rounds 4-7 on Saturday, starting at noon ET.

Executive Vice President/General Manager Bruce Allen and Director of Player Personnel Scott Campbell will speak to the media at Redskins Park at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, May 6.

The team will host media at Redskins Park all three days of the draft. Members of the Redskins coaching staff will be made available to the media following days in which the team makes a selection.

The 2014 draft will be the franchise's fifth under the guidance of Executive Vice President/General Manager Bruce Allen. All three of Allen's first-round selections have earned at least one Pro Bowl berth in their young careers.

Allen's first selection at the helm of the Redskins came in the 2010 NFL Draft when the Redskins selected tackle Trent Williams with the No. 4 overall pick. The three-year offensive captain has started the last 32 games for Washington at left tackle and earned consecutive Pro Bowl appearances following the 2012 and 2013 seasons.

Williams' Pro Bowl berth was the 15th by a Redskins offensive tackle since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining Chris Samuels (2001-02, 05-08), Jim Lachey (1990-91), Mark May (1988) and Joe Jacoby (1983-86). Between Williams and Samuels, Redskins left tackles have been selected to six of the last nine Pro Bowls.

In the 2011 NFL Draft, Allen and the Redskins traded out of the No. 10 overall selection for the rights to the No. 16 overall pick, which the team used to select linebacker Ryan Kerrigan. The Purdue product has started all 49 combined regular season and postseason games played by the Redskins since he joined the team and has registered 24.5 sacks, 10 forced fumbles, two interceptions (both returned for touchdowns) and one fumble recovery in his three NFL seasons. Kerrigan was selected to his first career Pro Bowl following the 2012 season.

The Redskins' most recent first-round selection, quarterback Robert Griffin III, whom the Redskins selected with the No. 2 overall pick acquired from St. Louis in the 2012 NFL Draft, also made his first career Pro Bowl in 2012. Griffin III shattered virtually every rookie passer record in Redskins history that season and went on to set NFL rookie records for lowest percentage of passes had intercepted and rushing yards by a quarterback, all while leading Washington to its first division title since the turn of the century.

Including the selection of linebacker Brian Orakpo in 2009, the team's last four first-rounders have earned seven combined Pro Bowl selections during their time in Washington. Seven of the last eight players selected by the Redskins in the first round have earned Pro Bowl berths during their NFL careers.

The Redskins do not currently hold a first-round pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. Last year, Washington used its top selection on cornerback David Amerson, who played in all 16 games in 2013 with eight starts. In Week 4, Amerson recorded a 45-yard interception return for touchdown against Oakland, the longest by a Redskins' rookie since cornerback Champ Bailey scored on a 59-yard interception return at Arizona on Oct. 17, 1999.

Washington also found an eventual PFWA All-Rookie selection in the third round last season when it selected tight end Jordan Reed out of Florida with the No. 85 overall selection. In a season in which he was limited by injury to only nine games, Reed still set Redskins rookie records for a tight end with 45 receptions for 499 yards.

The 2014 NFL Draft will feature a three-day format for the fourth consecutive year. Thursday's first round will allow 10 minutes before each pick. The second round, which resumes the draft on Friday evening, allows seven minutes between picks. The third round allows five minutes between selections. The final four rounds will take place on Saturday and allow five minutes between picks. Live coverage of the entire draft will be provided by both the NFL Network and ESPN/ESPN2.

Trading draft picks is allowed during the course of the draft. However, the Commissioner reserves the right to proceed with the selection process if a club fails to complete a trade within their allotted time period in that round.

2014 REDSKINS SELECTIONS

The Redskins enter the 2014 NFL Draft with a total of six scheduled picks. The team's first pick in the draft is at No. 34 overall, the second pick of the second round. Washington's first-round selection was traded to the St. Louis Rams two seasons ago as part of the team's trade package to acquire the No. 2 pick in the 2012 NFL Draft, a pick used to select 2012 Offensive Rookie of the Year Robert Griffin III.

If the Redskins make a selection with the No. 34 overall pick, it would be the team's third selection at No. 34 in team history. More information about the team's history at the Nos. 34, 66, 102, 142, 178 and 217 picks can be found on Page 3.

DRAFT DAY PARTY

On Saturday, May 10, the Redskins will host their annual Draft Day Party at FedExField.

Media interested in attending the Draft Day Party must contact Susanna Nickell of Redskins Public Relations at nickells@redskins.com or 703-726-7077 to request a credential no later than Friday, May 9 at 5 p.m. Media should enter FedExField through the South Field Tunnel on the day of the event to secure a credential.

Admission and parking is free for all fans. Parking lots open at 11 a.m. and fans will be admitted through the Comcast SportsNet Gate (Gate H) at noon. Fans interested in attending must sign up for their free Redskins Draft Day Party Pass at Redskins.com.

Fans can watch the NFL Draft on the high definition video boards, as well as tour the Redskins locker room, test their passing and kicking skills, dress like a Redskins player, play in the game arcade, take pictures with the Super Bowl trophies and get active at the Redskins Play 60 youth fitness station. Schedules permitting, a group of current and former Redskins players will be on hand to sign autographs and take pictures with fans.

The draft party will feature the debut of the 2014 Redskins Cheerleaders and will also include performances by the Redskins Marching Band. Fans will also have the opportunity to enter free raffles for autographed Redskins memorabilia. The Redskins Hall of Fame Store will be open and will feature new 2014 merchandise, including the New Era Draft Hat.

Fans can enter the Draft Party Dream Contest, which includes the chance to win a grand prize consisting of VIP access to the Draft Day Party, including a pair of premium tickets to a 2014 Redskins regular season home game and an autographed football. Ten First Prize winners will receive a pair of tickets to a 2014 Redskins regular season home game.

MEDIA AVAILABILITY:

Head Coach Jay Gruden is scheduled to speak with the media briefly following each selection. The press conferences will be held in the media interview room at Redskins Park. As soon as possible, Redskins Public Relations will provide notes, player biographies and other materials on each selection. Redskins Public Relations staffers will coordinate a conference call with each of the Redskins' draft picks shortly after their selections. These calls will take place in the media room. Transcripts will be provided.

REDSKINS REPRESENTATION IN NYC:

Each NFL team sends club personnel to serve as its representatives at the NFL Draft site at Radio City Music Hall. The representative is in constant communication with the principal decision makers back at Redskins Park. This year, Video Director **Mike Bracken** and Physical Therapist/Assistant Athletic Trainer **Elliott Jermyn**, will represent the Redskins in New York. Four-time Pro Bowl linebacker **London Fletcher** will be the Redskins' representative on Friday to announce the team's selection during the second round.

PLAYERS/ALUMNI IN ATTENDANCE ON SATURDAY:

Among the players expected to attend Saturday's Draft Day Party at FedExField are **WR DeSean Jackson**, **DE Chris Baker**, **G Adam Gettis**, **RB Roy Helu, Jr.**, **TE Niles Paul**, **RB Evan Royster**, **LS Nick Sundberg** and **FB Darrel Young**. Several Redskins alumni are also scheduled to attend.



REDSKINS DRAFT HISTORY

The Redskins have made 22 picks all-time at the overall selections currently held by the team in the 2014 NFL Draft. The team has made two picks at No. 34, five at No. 66, four at No. 102, one at No. 142, six at No. 178 and four at No. 217. Of the 22 selections, 10 have been made since the institution of the Common Draft in 1967.

Five active Redskins — cornerback E.J. Biggers (No. 217 in 2009), quarterback Kirk Cousins (No. 102 in 2012), offensive lineman Maurice Hurt (No. 217 in 2011), wide receiver Aldrick Robinson (No. 178 in 2011) and linebacker Darryl Sharpton (No. 102 in 2010) were selected with an overall selection currently held by the Redskins in the 2014 NFL Draft. Three of those active Redskins — Cousins, Hurt and Robinson — were selected by Washington. Biggers and Sharpton were selected by Tampa Bay and Houston, respectively.

NFL PICKS AT THESE SELECTIONS

Since the institution of the National Football League Draft in 1936, teams have made a total of 485 combined selections with the Nos. 34, 66, 102, 142, 178 and 217 picks — the overall selections currently held by the Redskins for the 2014 NFL Draft. Of these 485 picks, 282 have come in the Common Draft era since 1967.

Those six slots currently held by the Redskins have produced seven members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, five at the No. 34 overall selection and two with the No. 102 overall pick:

REDSKINS HIRE HEAD COACH JAY GRUDEN

The Washington Redskins announced on Jan. 9, 2014 that they had named Jay Gruden as the 29th head coach in franchise history.

Excluding interim coaches, Gruden, 46, became the team's youngest head coaching hire since hiring eventual Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Gibbs at 40 years of age in 1981. He becomes the first Redskins coach hired directly from an offensive coordinator role on another team since Norv Turner in 1994.

Gruden spent the last three seasons as offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals. In his tenure in Cincinnati from 2011-13, the Bengals averaged 10 wins a season, making three consecutive playoff appearances and earning an AFC North championship in 2013. Members of the Bengals' offense accounted for seven Pro Bowl selections in his three seasons in Cincinnati.

Gruden was tasked with the development of quarterback Andy Dalton, a 2011 second-round pick. In three seasons together, Gruden helped Dalton to a 30-18 regular season record as a starter (.625), as Dalton's 30 wins in that time frame ranked tied for fifth-most among NFL quarterbacks. Dalton's 80 passing touchdowns rank third-most in NFL history for a quarterback in his first three seasons, trailing only Dan Marino (98) and Peyton Manning (85).

Prior to joining the Bengals, Gruden served two years with the Florida Tuskers of the United Football League from 2009-10. In 2009, Gruden served as offensive coordinator under current Redskins defensive coordinator Jim Haslett as the Tuskers compiled a 6-0 regular season record and earned a UFL championship game berth. In 2010, he assumed the roles of head coach and general manager and led the Tuskers to their second consecutive championship game appearance.

Gruden coached for seven seasons (2002-08) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, earning a Super Bowl championship ring as an offensive assistant in 2002. There he worked under his brother, Jon, then the Bucs' head coach, and current Redskins Executive Vice President/General Manager Bruce Allen, the Bucs' general manager from 2004-08. Gruden helped guide the Buccaneers to the team's first league championship, a 48-21 victory in Super Bowl XXXVII.

Gruden also ranks among the most outstanding players and coaches in the history of the Arena Football League, having won six combined league championships – four as a quarterback and two as a head coach. Gruden played quarterback (2002-03) and served as head coach (2004-08) of the AFL's Orlando Predators, all while simultaneously working as an offensive assistant with the Buccaneers. In all, Gruden served as head coach of the Predators for nine seasons (1998-2001 and 2004-08), leading the Predators to four championship game appearances and two league titles as a coach. During a two-year hiatus from coaching the Predators in 2002-03, he returned to the playing field as Orlando's quarterback, leading the Predators to playoff appearances in both seasons.

In his eight seasons as a player in the AFL, Gruden completed 1,673-of-2,775 passes (60.3 percent) for 21,578 yards with 398 touchdowns and 99 interceptions. In addition to his time with Orlando, he spent six seasons (1991-96) at quarterback for the Tampa Bay Storm, winning four AFL titles and being named MVP of ArenaBowl VII in 1993. He was also named the 1992 AFL Most Valuable Player and was honored with induction into the AFL Hall of Fame in 1999.

Gruden played quarterback for four seasons for former Redskins draft pick Howard Schnellenberger at the University of Louisville (1985-88) and was a two-time team MVP.

Gruden was born March 4, 1967 in Tiffin, Ohio. He and his wife, Sherry, have three sons — J.J., Joey and Jack.

2014 NFL DRAFT ORDER



The draft order is determined by the following procedures:

(A) The winner of the Super Bowl game shall select last and the loser of such game shall select next-to-last in all rounds, regardless of the record of such participating clubs in the regular season.

(B) The losers of the Conference championship games shall select 29th and 30th in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(C) The losers of the Divisional playoff games shall select in the 25th through 28th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(D) The losers of the Wild Card games shall select in the 21st through 24th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

(E) Clubs not participating in the playoffs shall select in the first through 20th positions in all rounds, according to the reverse order of their standing.

If, after all the foregoing procedures have been applied, ties still exist in any grouping, such ties shall be broken by figuring the aggregate won-lost-tied percentage of each involved club's regular season opponents and awarding preferential selection order to the club which faced the schedule of teams with the lowest aggregate won-lost-tied percentage. If ties still exist, the divisional or conference tie-breaking method, if applicable, shall be applied. If neither the divisional nor the conference tie-breaking methods are applicable, ties shall be broken by a coin flip conducted by the Commissioner. Clubs involved in two-club ties will alternate positions from round-to-round. In ties that involve three or more clubs, the club at the top of a tied segment in a given round will move to the bottom of the segment for the next round, while all other clubs in the segment move up one position. This rotation continues throughout the Draft.

2013 REDSKINS DRAFT RECAP

NOTES ON REDSKINS OVERALL DRAFT

- With seven selections, the Redskins made at least seven picks for the ninth time since the institution of the seven-round draft in 1994. This was the first time in that timeframe in which the Redskins picked at least seven in three consecutive years.
- Washington selected 28 players in the past three drafts, the most of any three-year period in team history since the institution of the seven-round format. The team had previously posted a three-year total of 27 from 2010-12. The 28 picks by the Redskins in the past three seasons are the most since selecting 29 players from 1991-93, which included two 12-round drafts and one eight-round draft.
- The Redskins selected two players who led the Football Bowl Subdivision in interceptions over the past two seasons (David Amerson, 13 in 2011; Phillip Thomas, eight in 2012). Safety Bacarri Rambo was second in the FBS in interceptions in 2011 with eight.
- This was the second time in three years that the Redskins have selected three players who played collegiately in the state of Florida (2011 – WR Leonard Hankerson, OL Maurice Hurt, LB Markus White).
- This was the 15th time in the Common Draft era (since 1967) that the Redskins have selected college teammates in a draft class (1969, 1970, 1974, 1975, 1981, 1982, 1984, 1988, 1992, 1993, 2002, 2005, 2011, 2012, 2013). This was the fifth time that this has happened since the NFL instituted the seven-round format in 1994.
- The Redskins selected a set of college teammates in three consecutive years for the first time in the Common Draft era (2013: RB Chris Thompson, LB Brandon Jenkins – Florida State; 2012: G Josh LeRibeus, CB Richard Crawford – SMU; 2012: G Adam Gettis, S Jordan Bernstine – Iowa; 2011: RB Roy Helu, Jr., S DeJon Gomes, WR Niles Paul – Nebraska).
- This was the first time in the Bruce Allen era that the Redskins did not make a draft-day trade.
- This was the first time since 2003-05 a Mike Shanahan-coached team had selected five running backs in a three-year span (2011 – Roy Helu, Jr., Evan Royster; 2012 – Alfred Morris; 2013 – Chris Thompson, Jawan Jamison).

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF DAVID AMERSON

- The selection marked the earliest the Redskins have taken a defensive back since selecting safety LaRon Landry out of LSU with the sixth overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft. It marked the earliest the team has taken a cornerback since selecting Carlos Rogers out of Auburn with the ninth overall pick in the 2005 NFL Draft.
- The selection marked the earliest a Shanahan-coached team had taken a defensive back since selecting cornerback Willie Middlebrooks out of Minnesota with the No. 24 overall pick in the 2001 NFL Draft as head coach of the Denver Broncos.
- Amerson was the sixth defensive back selected by a Shanahan-coached team in the first 51 picks of a draft, joining Middlebrooks, Kenoy Kennedy (No. 45, DEN 2000), Deltha O'Neal (No. 15, DEN 2000), Tory James (No. 44, DEN 1996) and Terry McDaniel (No. 9, LA Raiders 1988).
- Amerson was the seventh player from NC State selected by the Redskins all-time and the second in the Common Draft era, joining Dom "Mac" Cara (1937), Jim O'Rourke (1952), Alex Webster (1953), Darrell Dess (1958), John Lawrence (1960) and Lloyd Harrison (2000).
- Amerson was the first NC State product drafted by a Shanahan-coached team.
- Amerson was the fifth player to be selected by the Redskins with the No. 51 pick of a draft all-time, joining Johnny North (1945), Nick Carras (1953), Greg Jones (1997) and Malcolm Kelly (2008).
- Amerson shares his draft selection in common with Redskins Defensive Coordinator Jim Haslett, who was selected with the No. 51 overall selection in the 1979 NFL Draft.

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF JORDAN REED

- The selection marked the earliest the Redskins had taken a tight end since selecting Fred Davis out of USC with the No. 48 overall pick in the 2008 NFL Draft. He was the first college tight end selected by the Redskins in the Shanahan era.
- Reed was the second tight end selected by the Redskins in the third round all-time, joining Utah State's Chris Cooley, the team's all-time leader in receptions by a tight end, who was selected by Washington with the No. 81 overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft.
- Reed was the 12th player from the University of Florida selected by the Redskins all-time and the fifth Gator selected by the Redskins in the Common Draft era.
- Reed was only the second player all-time selected by the Redskins at No. 85 overall, joining Kansas running back Bert Coan (1962).
- Reed was the seventh college tight end selected by a Shanahan-coached team and the first since Tony Scheffler, who was selected by Shanahan's Denver Broncos in the second round of the 2006 NFL Draft.
- Reed was the eighth player from the University of Florida selected by a Shanahan-coached team, the most of any school.
- Reed was the third player selected by the Redskins in the Shanahan era to have played for a school at which Shanahan used to coach, joining Hurt (Florida, 2011) and tackle Trent Williams (Oklahoma, 2010). Including Shanahan's time in Los Angeles and Denver, Reed was the 18th player taken by a Shanahan-coached team to come from a university at which Shanahan has coached in his career (Oklahoma, Northern Arizona, Eastern Illinois, Minnesota and Florida).

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF PHILLIP THOMAS

- Thomas was the first Fresno State product selected by a Shanahan-coached team.
- Thomas was the sixth player selected by the Redskins with the No. 119 overall selection all-time. He joins E Joe Tereshinski (1946), T Weldon Edwards (1947), B Billy Joe (1963), DE Dexter Manley (1981) and LB Keenan Robinson (2012).
- With the selection of Thomas and Robinson in consecutive years, the Redskins made selections at No. 119 overall in consecutive years for the second time in team history (1946-47).
- Thomas was the third player from Fresno State selected by the Redskins all-time, joining B Jackie Fellows (1944) and WR Tydus Winans (1994).
- This marked the fourth time a Shanahan-coached team has selected at least two defensive backs in the first four rounds of the draft, joining Shanahan's 1996 (Tory James and Darrius Johnson), 2000 (Deltha O'Neal and Kenoy Kennedy) and 2005 (Darrent Williams, Karl Paymah and Dominique Foxworth) draft classes with the Denver Broncos.

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF CHRIS THOMPSON

- Thompson was third player selected with the No. 154 selection by the Redskins, joining Delaware State receiver Darnerian McCants (2001) and Louisville linebacker Robert McCune (2005).
- Thompson was the 22nd running back selected by a Shanahan-coached team but the first to have played collegiately in the Atlantic Coast Conference.
- Thompson was the second player selected with the No. 154 selection by a Shanahan-coached team along with wide receiver Muneer Moore (2000 – Richmond).

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF BRANDON JENKINS

- This marked the fifth time in the Common Draft era (since 1967) that the Redskins drafted a pair of college teammates with consecutive picks. The five instances include Florida State (2013), Nebraska (2011), Auburn (2005), Notre Dame (1993) and Virginia (1969).
- Jenkins became the eighth Florida State player selected by the Redskins all-time, joining Ron Schomburger (1958), Tony Romeo (1961), Ed Trancygier (1962), Jack Shinholser (1966), Sterling Palmer (1993), Markus White (2011), and Chris Thompson (2013).
- Jenkins was the fourth Seminole selected by a Shanahan-coached team. He was the first player from any school taken by a Shanahan-coached team with the No. 162 overall pick.
- Thompson was the 15th linebacker selected by a Shanahan-coached team and the second to have played collegiately in the Atlantic Coast Conference (White).

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF BACARRI RAMBO

- Rambo was the third player selected by the Redskins from Georgia in the Common Draft era (since 1967), joining cornerback Champ Bailey (1999) and defensive lineman Kedric Golston (2006).
- Rambo was the fourth player selected by a Shanahan-coached team from Georgia, joining running back Terrell Davis (1995), running back Olandis Gary (1999) and tackle George Foster (2003).
- Rambo became the second safety on the Redskins' 2013 roster to have been drafted by the organization in the sixth round (Reed Doughty – 2006).
- Rambo was the fifth player selected by the Redskins with the No. 191 overall pick all-time, joining back Steve Juzwik (1942), center Heath Wingate (1966), running back Larry Brown (1969) and cornerback David Terrell (1998).
- Rambo was the second player selected by a Shanahan-coached team with the No. 191 pick, joining tight end Jeb Putzier in 2002.

NOTES ON THE SELECTION OF JAWAN JAMISON

- The selections of Jamison and running back Chris Thompson (No. 154 overall) represented the seventh time a Shanahan-coached team has selected multiple running backs in a draft class and the second time in his tenure with Washington (2011 – Roy Helu, Jr. and Evan Royster).
- Jamison was the third player selected by the Redskins from Rutgers, joining defensive back Don Harris (No. 300, 1977) and back Bully Austin (No. 329, 1959).
- Jamison was the sixth player selected by the Redskins with the No. 228 pick, joining tackle Hal Mullins (1947), back Dick West (1948), back Frank Pattee (1949), kicker Mike Flater (1974) and defensive end Dallas Hickman (1975).
- Jamison was the first player from Rutgers selected by a Shanahan-coached team.
- Jamison was the second player selected by a Shanahan-coached team with the No. 228 pick, joining defensive back Chris Young in 2002.
