GREAT DAYS to remember

July 9, 1932

George P. Marshall heads syndicate (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, M. Dorland Doyle) that buys National Football League franchise for Boston, Mass. They contract to play in Braves Field, home of National Baseball League team—and are called "The Braves."

The Name July 8, 1933

The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home of American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" become "The Redskins."

The Franchise National Football League approves transfer of Feb. 13, 1937

Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C. The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its kind . . . and still the best.

The First Game! Thursday night opener draws 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scores on 60-yd run with interception, two field goals and extra point. Redskins 13, Giants 3.

Dec. 5, 1937

First big invasion of New York. Ten thousand feather-wearing fans stomp up Broadway behind brass band. Sam Baugh completes 11 of 15, Cliff Battles runs 75 and 76 yds for TDs, Giants routed, 49 - 14, for Eastern Championship.

Dec. 12, 1937

Freezing weather, frozen field, icy-nerved Bears can't stop Baugh. Completes 17 of 33 for 335 yds and 3 TDs. Wayne Millner, the all-time Notre Dame great, escapes with nine for 160 yds...including 77 and 55-yd TD sprints.

A Kick Coming
Dec. 3, 1939

Giants lead, 9-7, with one minute left as Redskins hammer on goal line. Tackle Bo Russell drops back to 15-yd line and kicks placement . . . but Referee Halloran rules kick wide.

Eastern Champs
Dec. 1, 1940

Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes
33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13-6
to clinch Eastern Championship.

73-to-Ohhh! Redskins get more first downs than Bears in World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium.

Nov. 23, 1941 Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13-10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20-13.

Only Loss
Sept. 27, 1942
Giants don't make first down, gain only ONE yard rushing, complete just ONE pass...but it's good for TD; then they capture another TD on interception ... and we suffer our only 1942 defeat, 14-7.

World Champs
Dec. 13, 1942

Bears take early lead on errant pass from center.
But Sam Baugh's 85-yd quick kick sets them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then makes vital interception and follows with sensational catch for 38-yd TD. Andy Farkas caps victory by carrying ball 10 of 12 times on 80-yd TD tour.

Score: 14-6.

Champs Again After two straight losses, Redskins bounce back in Dec. 19, 1943 Eastern Title playoff game to thrash Giants 28 - 0.

A New Era

Jan. 25, 1966

Untitled Dec. 26, 1943 Sam Baugh suffers concussion early tackling Sid Luckman on punt return and Bears go on to win, 41-21.

Eastern Champs Dec. 9, 1945 Second straight shutout (Steelers 0-24 Dec. 2) vs Giants today, 17-0, wins Eastern title.

Post Mortems Dec. 16, 1945 In subzero weather, Redskins lose world title to Rams, 15-14, on incredibly freakish plays. Baugh's pass from end zone hits goal-post for safety (no longer allowed); and Waterfield's tryfor-point hits crossbar and bounces over.

Champs Trumped Nov. 23, 1947 Fans give auto to Sam Baugh who thanks them with 6 TD tosses, routing champion Cards, 45 - 21.

TD Torrent Oct. 1, 1955 Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! Eagles lead 16-0 in 3d. Brito recovers fumble on their 32 and LeBaron passes to Janowicz for TD. Thomas recovers kick-off in end zone for TD. Torgeson recovers fumble on Eagles 13. Janowicz goes over. Skins win, 31-30.

Time's Awastin' Nov. 25, 1956 Eddie LeBaron completes five straight to edge Browns in final 91 seconds.

The Spoilers Oct. 27, 1957 Ed Sutton's 23-yd smashing TD run, and Bert Zagers' 76-yd punt return for TD provide impetus for 31 - 14 upset of defending champion Giants.

Colts Corraled Nov. 8, 1959 World Champion Colts nipped in final 11 seconds by Sam Baker's 46-yd field goal.

4 Of A Kind Dec. 17, 1961

Dick James scores 4 TDs to set Redskins single game scoring record in 34 - 24 win over the Dallas Cowboys.

Snead to Mitchell 1962 The birth of this great passing combination launches new Redskins era. Norman Snead passes 81-yds to Bobby Mitchell against Dallas on Sept. 16th in sensational 35-35 tie, then a week later, hits Mitchell for a 50-yd game winning toss against Cleveland with 96 seconds to play.

A Record Tie Sept. 15, 1963 Redskins tie their own record for the longest TD pass in NFL history when quarterback George Izo fakes a line plunge from his 1-yd line against Cleveland, and steps back and tosses a 45-yd pass to Bobby Mitchell who races 54 yards to end zone to wind up 99-yd scoring shocker.

A Sunny Day Oct. 11, 1964 Sonny Jurgensen out-duels Norm Snead by pitching four TD's against the Eagles in the first meeting of the TRADED quarterbacks.

Indians Scalp 'em Nov. 28, 1965 Sonny Jurgensen sparks greatest comeback win in Redskins history. Down 21-0 Redskins record 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passes for over 400 yds and 3 TDs.

The Million Dollar Games

it was the Redskins who started it—the Good Samaritan Schedule—those pre-season charity football games played annually by the National Football League from Coast-to-Coast.

And the Redskins are still in the forefront of the Charity League today.

Over the years the Redskins have played pre-season charity games in more than three dozen cities across the land and have helped raise more than \$3,000,000 for charity.

A pre-season series sponsored by the Variety Clubs of Washington and Baltimore not only introduced pro football to Baltimore but

raised over \$125,000 for boys' club activities.

In 1946 the Redskins launched the famous Times Charity Game against the Rams in Los Angeles. The biggest and greatest of all pre-season games, the Redskins performed in the Times game from 1946 through 1962. During this period, the Times Charities netted over \$1,600,000—money which built and staffed three boys' clubs.

The Redskins ended this famous series in order to bring Charity back home. For with the advent of D. C. Stadium, the time had come for Washington to take its place on the Good Samaritan Schedule.

A five-year contract was signed with Almas Temple of the Shrine in Washington in 1961 and renewed in 1965. Under this contract the Redskins are to alternate playing the Baltimore Colts and Chicago Bears in a late August game in D. C. Stadium. The first four games netted Almas Temple almost \$300,000 for its various charities.

Also, due to a schedule break, this year the Redskins agreed to play a second Shrine game in Washington against the Philadelphia Eagles on September 3.



THE HEAD COACH

Otto E. Graham, Jr., Northwestern University '44



First Year.

Became Head Coach of the Redskins, January 25, 1966.

Otto E. Graham, Jr., was born in Waukegan, Illinois on December 6, 1921. His father was the music and band leader at the Waukegan high school for 40 years.

The state of the s

Known more as a basketball player than a grid star in his Waukegan high school, Graham's football potential was not fully realized until after he had enrolled at Northwestern University on a basketball scholarship, and Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf put him in the backfield of N.U.'s eleven. There he became an All-American performer. In 1943, he was selected

to receive the Chicago Tribune Trophy as the most valuable player in the Western Conference. His biggest day that season came against Michigan when he completed 20 out of 29 passes.

He twice played with the College All-Stars, each time the collegians whipped their professional adversaries. In 1943, he helped the Stars whip Washington, 27-7, as he ran 95 yards for a touchdown—the longest run ever made in the All-Star classic. Three years later, Graham passed for a touchdown as the Stars defeated the Los Angeles Rams, 16-0. In 1951, he played in the All-Star classic for the third time, but with the pros, where he led the Cleveland Browns to a 33-0 win over the collegians,

Graham is the only college athlete ever to make All-American in two sports the same year—football and basketball. He was on the All-American football team of 1943 and named to the basketball team of the 1943-44 season. That was a team which included George Mikan, one of the greats of pro basketball.

Following his graduation in 1944 with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Northwestern, where he majored in music and education, he became a naval air cadet until the end of World War II. It was during this period, while he was stationed at Chapel Hill, N.C., that he first became familiar with the "I" formation.

While others have since followed suit, Graham was the first to play professionally in two sports. He was quarterback for the Cleveland Browns and a forward for the Rochester Royals (now the Cincinnati Royals) in the NBA.

Graham was the first player signed by Coach Paul Brown of the Cleveland Browns when he undertook the job of organizing his first professional football team. Though he was planning his offense and knew Graham had only a smattering of experience as a "T" quarterback, Brown picked him because of his exceptional ability to throw the ball. Brown was sure Graham had all the requirements to become a good man at the "T" position, and the records bear out his claim.

In his years with the Browns, Graham directed the high-powered offense that led the team to 94 victories against only 15 defeats and 3 ties, including 10 straight championships and playoff games. His passes were directly responsible for one-third of the 2,990 points the Browns scored. Of his 2,201 attempted passes, he completed 1,224, good for 19,771 yards and 148 touchdowns.

Retiring from his professional football career after the 1955 season, Graham was soon called to coach the College All-Stars in their annual clash with the pros.

He was named to the College Hall of Fame in 1959, and in 1965 was added to the Pro Hall of Fame.

Aside from football, Graham was, at one time, a talented musician, playing the piano, violin, cornet and French horn. He is a fine tennis player, shoots a low 70 golf game, and is a fine swimmer.

While attending Northwestern University, he met his wife, the former Beverly Jean Collinge of Wabash, Indiana. They have two sons, Duey, born March 13, 1947, and David, born April 15, 1951, and a daughter, Sandy, born September 6, 1948.

He has three brothers, Eugene, recently retired after twenty years in the U.S. Marine Band in Washington, D.C.; Victor, an insurance salesman in the Chicago

area; and Richard, who is an insurance salesman in Waukegan.

On February 27, 1959, Graham received his commission as a Commander in the Coast Guard Reserve, and, at that time, he was assigned the position of head football coach and director of athletics at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Connecticut. On November 14, 1963, he was permanently appointed to the commissioned teaching staff at the academy, and was promoted to the rank of Captain on April 3, 1965.

At the Academy, Graham made a marked improvement in the cadet's gridiron record, and in 1963 chalked up the academy's first undefeated, untied season. It was also this year that the Academy participated in its first bowl game, the Tangerine Bowl, on December 28, 1963 in Orlando, Florida. His seven year coaching record at the Academy was 32-23-1.

THE SCORE CARD

Graham was selected on an All-America Conference Team of some description (either United Press International, or Associated Press) in each of the four years of competition in the All-America Conference. He was named to an All-Pro team in 1951, '52, '54 and '55 while in the N.F.L.

Graham does not hold a single National Football League record. The reason, of course, is the NFL doesn't recognize the statistics compiled over his four years in the All-America Conference. His passes gained more yards in 10 years, however, than Sammy Baugh did in 16 years.





They include: 50 consecutive extra points, 33 his senior year and 17 held over from his junior year; six field goals in one game, versus Rutgers in 1965; most field goals in one season, 16; most field goals for a career, 27; most points kicking one season, 81; most points kicking for a career, 164; and most points kicking one game, 20. The soccer-style place-kicker kicked a 54-yarder against Cornell last season against a human pyramid, a defense set up by Cornell coach Tom Harp. This was Gogolak's longest field goal. Against Rutgers, the six he kicked were for 52, 39, 27, 41, 37, and 27 yards. The record 50 consecutive extra points broke the old NCAA mark of 44 set by his brother Pete while Pete was the star place-kicker for Cornell. Pete now is with the New York Giants after playing 2 years as kicking specialist with the Buffalo Bilis. Gogolak was an honor student at Princeton.


