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

July 9, 1932

George P. Marshall heads syndicate (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, M. Dorland Doyle) that buys National Football League franchise for Boston, Mass. They contract to play in Braves Field, home of National Baseball League team—and are called "The Braves."

July 8, 1933
The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home
of American League Red Sox, and "The Braves"
become "The Redskins."

The Franchise National Football League approves transfer of Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C.

The Band The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its Aug. 9, 1938 kind . . . and still the best.

Aug. 17, 1938 "Hail to the Redskins!", our rally song, rings out across the land for the first time—over a coast-to-coast network, another NFL first.

Westward Ho! Redskins set forth on first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Wash.

Aug. 18, 1941 Redskins bring pro football on large scale for first time to California. Establish training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

July 30, 1944 Redskins abandon their double-wing formation and adopt the T-formation.

First Annual Redskins-Rams Game for benefit of Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. Draws 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum. NETS Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.

High Note
Redskins Band performs at Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.

Birth of Book First official press-radio year-book printed and distributed free to fans.

Big Parade
July 7, 1949
Redskins Band represents the Nation's Capital in the big parade up New York's Fifth Avenue featuring the Lions Clubs National Convention.

First on TV American Oil announces plans to televise all Red-June 14, 1950 skins games—no other pro team on TV.

Oct. 10, 1954 Dr. Howard Mitchell leads his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a half-time show.

Redskins Alumni Association organized. Twentythree former players residing here adopt formal
constitution and by-laws and invite all nonresident ex-Redskins to join for the welfare of all.

Redskins sign 30-year lease to play in proposed

Dec. 24, 1959

D. C. Stadium and Congress gives go-ahead to
build.

New Home First game in new D. C. Stadium draws 36,767. Oct. 1, 1961 Redskins fail to hold 21-0 lead, Giants win 24-21.

Dec. 14, 1961 Dramatic deal with Browns brings all-pro half-back Bobby Mitchell to Redskins for No. 1 draft pick (Syracuse All-American Ernie Davis).

Redskins stun public by trading QB Norman Snead to Eagles for veteran QB Sonny Jurgensen. Then repeat the performance, shipping favorite Dick James to N. Y. for Sam Huff.

Business Blitz Redskins sell out all games in New D.C. Stadium.

Graham Era Redskins appoint former Cleveland star Otto Jan. 25, 1966 Graham as head coach and general manager.

Feb. 7, 1969 The unbelievable happened—Vince Lombardi left Green Bay to become head coach of the Redskins.

THE BIG GAMES . . . for our Team

First Victory
Sept. 16, 1937
The First Game! Thursday night opener draws
19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley
Smith scores on 60-yd run with interception, two
field goals and extra point. Redskins 13, Giants 3.

First Title First big invasion of New York. Ten thousand feather-wearing fans stomp up Broadway behind brass band. Sam Baugh completes 11 of 15, Cliff Battles runs 75 and 76 yds for TDs, Giants routed, 49 - 14, for Eastern Championship.

World Champs! Freezing weather, frozen field, icy-nerved Bears can't stop Baugh. Completes 17 of 33 for 335 yds and 3 TDs. Wayne Millner, the all-time Notre Dame great, escapes with nine for 160 yds . . . including 77 and 55-yd TD sprints.

Zero Hour Only scoreless tie in Redskins history as Giants Oct. 1, 1939 are battled in mud and rain.

Dec. 1, 1940

Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13-6 to clinch Eastern Championship.

73-to-Ohhh! Redskins get more first downs than Bears in Dec. 8, 1940 World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium.

Nov. 23, 1941 Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13 - 10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20 - 13.

Only Loss Giants don't make first down, gain only ONE yard rushing, complete just ONE pass...but it's good for TD; then they capture another TD on interception . . . and we suffer our only 1942 defeat, 14-7.

Bears take early lead on errant pass from center. But Sam Baugh's 85-yd quick kick sets them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then makes vital interception and follows with sensational catch for 38-yd TD. Andy Farkas caps victory by carrying ball 10 of 12 times on 80-yd TD tour. Score: 14-6.

Champs Again After two straight losses, Redskins bounce back in Dec. 19, 1943 Eastern Title playoff game to thrash Giants 28 - 0.

Dec. 26, 1943 Sam Baugh suffers concussion early tackling Sid Luckman on punt return and Bears go on to win, 41-21.

Dec. 9, 1945 Second straight shutout (Steelers 0 - 24 Dec. 2) vs Giants today, 17 - 0, wins Eastern title.

Post Mortems
In subzero weather, Redskins lose world title to
Rams, 15-14, on incredibly freakish plays.
Baugh's pass from end zone hits goal-post for
safety (no longer allowed); and Waterfield's tryfor-point hits crossbar and bounces over.

Champs Trumped Fans give auto to Sam Baugh who thanks them Nov. 23, 1947 with 6 TD tosses, routing champion Cards, 45 - 21.

Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! Eagles lead 16-0 in 3d. Brito recovers fumble on their 32 and LeBaron passes to Janowicz for TD. Thomas recovers kick-off in end zone for TD. Torgeson recovers fumble on Eagles 13. Janowicz goes over. Skins win, 31-30.

Nov. 8, 1959

World Champion Colts nipped in final 11 seconds by Sam Baker's 46-yd field goal.

4 Of A Kind Dec. 17, 1961 Dick James scores 4 TDs to set Redskins single game scoring record in 34 - 24 win over the Dallas Cowboys.

A Record Tie Sept. 15, 1963 Redskins tie their own record for the longest TD pass in NFL history when quarterback George Izo tosses a 45-yd pass to Bobby Mitchell who races 54 yards to the Cleveland end zone to wind up 99-yd scoring shocker.

A Sunny Day Oct. 11, 1964 Sonny Jurgensen out-duels Norm Snead by pitching four TD's against the Eagles in the first meeting of the TRADED quarterbacks.

Indians Scalp 'em Nov. 28, 1965 Sonny Jurgensen sparks greatest comeback win in Redskins history. Down 21-0 Redskins record 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passes for over 400 yds and 3 TDs.

TD Jamboree Nov. 27, 1966 The Redskins score the most points in NFL history as they tie or set many team and league records in routing New York, 72-41.

Pass-Catch Records 1967 Sonny Jurgensen sets new Redskin and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finish 1, 2, and 4 in the league; highest ever by receivers on same team.

Vince Lombardi

HEAD COACH AND EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT

1st Year

Became Head Coach of the Redskins February 1969

Vince Lombardi played his collegiate football at Fordham University where he was one of the famed "Seven Blocks of Granite." After attending Law School at Fordham, he coached and taught Chemistry, Latin and Physics at St. Cecelia High School in Englewood, New Jersey.

Then in 1946 he became the line coach at Fordham University where he served until 1948 when he was named assistant to Earl "Red" Blaik at West Point.

Lombardi left the U.S. Military Academy in 1954 to join the New York Giants under Jim Lee Howell as offensive line coach. In four years with the Giants, they won two Eastern Division Titles and one World Title.

In 1959, Lombardi came to Green Bay as Head Coach and General Manager and dramatically altered the football fortunes of the Packers. He brought the Packers from a 1-10-1 record to contention his first season and from 1960 on, the Packers never finished below second as they captured 6 Western Division and 5 World Championships, including an unprecedented three in a row from 1965-1967 and the first two AFL-NFL World Championships in 1966 and 1967. Overall his record was 141-39-4 for a .783 winning percentage.


In addition to serving as General Manager of the Packers, Vince Lombardi also serves, holds, or held the following awards and positions: Chairman of the Board, Public Facilities Corp. of Madison, Wis., Fordham University's highest award—the Insignis Medal; The Senator Bryan MacMahan Award; Director of the Peoples Trust and Savings Bank of Green Bay; serves on the Council for Human Relations in the City of Green Bay; Trustee of Fordham University; Citizens Committee of St. Norbert's College; President of the State Mental Health Association; Chairman of the State Cancer Fund; Director of Pop Warner Football; Co-Chairman on Gov. Knowles' Council on Physical Fitness; Director of the World Festival in Milwaukee; Special Events Coordinator of The City of Hope, and has served as June Dairy Month Chairman. Also is a member of Board of Trustees, American Cancer Society, District of Columbia.

Lombardi received the high honor of selection as member of the Order of Malta.

In 1969 he received many honors: the John V. Mara Memorial Award as "Sportsman of the Year" by the New York CYO; the "Silver Buffalo" award as Man of the Year by the National Boy's Scout Federation; "Salesman" of the Year honor as voted in a poll of 1 million salesmen in the country; received an honorary doctor's degree in humane letters from St. Peters College, Trenton, N.J. He previously received an honorary doctor of laws degree from St. Norbert College. He also is a Golden Fleece award recipient.

Lombardi authored a best seller, "Run to Daylight." Produced a film, "Second Effort" which is in great demand by sales groups. He just completed a 12-series football instruction film.

Lombardi married the former Marie Planitz. They have two children, Vincent and Susan.

First season with Redskins:

Eleventh season coaching in NFL. Assistant coach under Lombardi at Green Bay, 1959-1964. In 1965, assistant coach at Los Angeles. Was head coach of Pittsburgh Steelers, 1966-68.

Became Redskin: March 1, 1969.

Pro Playing Career: Went to New York Giants from Oregon State as a guard. Played 1949 and 1950. Called into the service and spent two years. Returned to the Giants in 1953 and played through 1957. Was All-Pro guard

in 1954 with Giants.

College playing Career: Standout tackle three years at Oregon State.

Bowls: East-West Shrine, 1949; Pro Bowl, 1955.

College Coaching Career: 1958, assistant coach at Wichita University.

Notable: Coached by Lombardi when he played with Giants. He was first assistant hired by Lombardi when he went to Green Bay in 1959. He was first assistant hired when Lombardi took the Redskin coaching job. His Steeler team defeated the Packers the final game of the 1967 season. The Packers then went on to win the NFL Championship and the Super Bowl over Oakland.

Pro Playing Career: Played 10 years in NFL before first coaching assignment. Played 3 years at Detroit; 2 in Cleveland; 5 in Green Bay, under Lombardi. Was used as both running back and receiver. Played on championship teams with Detroit, Cleveland and Green Bay.

Notable: Brother of Preston Carpenter, former Redskin and Brown.







Against Rutgers in 1965, he kicked 6 FGs. Gogolak was an honor student at Princeton. His brother, Pete, kicks for N.Y. Giants.

Marame Redskin: Nov. 30, 1965. Selected No. 1 in 1965 draft.

Pro Career: As a rookie, Gogolak became the 3rd highest scoring rookie in the NFL with 105 points, which represents a new Redskin scoring mark. The old Rodskin record was held by fullback Vic Janowicz, 88, set in 1955. He also set a new Redskin mark for most field goals as he hit 22 of 32. The old mark was 17, set by Sam Baker in 1956. His 39 extra points also established a new Redskin record, the old record was 38, set in 1962 by Bob Khayat. His 105 points was third high in the NFL in 1966. In 1967, Gogolak suffered a muscle pull in his kicking leg in the thigh area, and was lost to the team after the opening game of the season, a major factor in the Redskin record for 1967.

His 12 TDs by receptions tied him with Hugh "Bones" Taylor for most touchdowns by receptions for a Red skin and his total of 15 set a new Redskin touchdown mark for a season. Against Dallas in the first game, Taylor caught 11 passes to tie Mitchell's mark for most receptions in a game. He caught passes for more than 100 yards in five games. He had 4 in 1967.

The 1-2-4 finish by Taylor, Smith and Mitchell marked the first time in the history of the NFL that three receivers on the same team finished that high, and the combined 197 receptions was the most by a three-some in the top-finishers, ever. The pass receiving title went down to the final game of the season as the four battled back and forth to the leadership throughout the last half of the campaign. In fact, Taylor and Smith went into the final game tied for the lead with 62 catches each. Taylor won it with 8 catches against Smith's 5 against New Orleans.

In '66, the trio finished first, sixth and tenth. Taylor led the league, with Mitchell sixth and Smith tenth.

The finish in 1967 is even more phenomenal since Taylor missed three games because of an injury and Mitchell was running back for five games, from the second through the sixth game. Taylor led the team in receptions again in 1968 with 48, 7th in the NFL.


