The Start
July 9, 1932

George P. Marshall heads syndicate (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, M. Dorland Doyle) that buys National Football League franchise for Boston, Mass. They contract to play in Braves Field, home of National Baseball League team—and are called "The Braves."

The Name
July 8, 1933

The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home of American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" become "The Redskins."

The Franchise
Feb. 13, 1937

National Football League approves transfer of Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C.

The Band
Aug. 9, 1938

The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its kind . . . and still the best.

Westward Ho!
Aug. 2, 1939

Redskins set forth on first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Wash.

California
Aug. 18, 1941

Redskins bring pro football on large scale for first time to California. Establish training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

To a T
July 30, 1944

Redskins abandon their double-wing formation and adopt the T-formation.

Times Game
Sept. 6, 1946

First Annual Redskins-Rams Game for benefit of Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. Draws 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum. NETS Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.

High Note
June 13, 1947

Redskins Band performs at Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside White-man, Waring and the Philharmonic.

Birth of Book
July 28, 1947

First official press-radio year-book printed and distributed free to fans.

First on TV
June 14, 1950

American Oil announces plans to televise all Redskins games—no other pro team on TV.

Baugh-to-Bach
Oct. 10, 1954

Dr. Howard Mitchell leads his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a half-time show.

The Alumni
Oct. 15, 1958

Redskins Alumni Association organized. Twenty-three former players residing here adopt formal constitution and by-laws and invite all non-resident ex-Redskins to join for the welfare of all.

Here to Stay Dec. 24, 1959	Redskins sign 30-year lease to play in proposed D. C. Stadium and Congress gives go-ahead to build.
New Home Oct. 1, 1961	First game in new D. C. Stadium draws 36,767. Redskins fail to hold 21-0 lead, Giants win 24-21.
A New Deal Dec. 14, 1961	Dramatic deal with Browns brings all-pro half-back Bobby Mitchell to Redskins for No. 1 draft pick (Syracuse All-American Ernie Davis).
Spring Time 1964	Redskins stun public by trading QB Norman Snead to Eagles for veteran QB Sonny Jurgensen. Then repeat the performance, shipping favorite Dick James to N. Y. for Sam Huff.
Business Blitz Fall 1964	Redskins sell out all games in New D.C. Stadium.
Graham Era Jan. 25, 1966	Redskins appoint former Cleveland star Otto Graham as head coach and general manager.
Lombardi Hired Feb. 7, 1969	The unbelievable happened—Vince Lombardi left Green Bay to become head coach of the Redskins.
A Winner Dec. 14, 1969	Redskins' 17-14 win over New Orleans brought first winning season to Washington in 14 years.

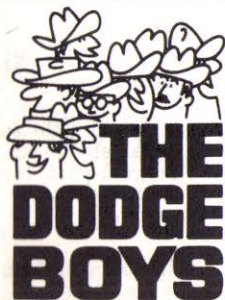
First Victory Sept. 16, 1937	The First Game! Thursday night opener draws 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scores on 60-yd run with interception, two field goals and extra point. Redskins 13, Giants 3.
First Title Dec. 5, 1937	First big invasion of New York. Ten thousand feather-wearing fans stomp up Broadway behind brass band. Sam Baugh completes 11 of 15, Cliff Battles runs 75 and 76 yds for TDs, Giants routed, 49-14, for Eastern Championship.
World Champs! Dec. 12, 1937	Freezing weather, frozen field, icy-nerved Bears can't stop Baugh. Completes 17 of 33 for 335 yds and 3 TDs. Wayne Millner, the all-time Notre Dame great, escapes with nine for 160 yds . . . including 77 and 55-yd TD sprints.
Zero Hour Oct. 1, 1939	Only scoreless tie in Redskins history as Giants are battled in mud and rain.

GLORY ROAD — continued

Record Pass Oct. 15, 1939	From kick formation, standing deep in end zone, Frank Filchock flips pass to Andy Farkas who goes all the way for touchdown. Longest pass play in National League history . . . 99 yds.
Eastern Champs Dec. 1, 1940	Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13-6 to clinch Eastern Championship.
73-to-Ohhh! Dec. 8, 1940	Redskins get more first downs than Bears in World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium.
Title Escapes Nov. 23, 1941	Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13-10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20-13.
Only Loss Sept. 27, 1942	Giants don't make first down, gain only ONE yard rushing, complete just ONE pass . . . but it's good for TD; then they capture another TD on interception . . . and we suffer our only 1942 defeat, 14-7.
World Champs Dec. 13, 1942	Bears take early lead on errant pass from center. But Sam Baugh's 85-yd quick kick sets them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then makes vital interception and follows with sensational catch for 38-yd TD. Andy Farkas caps victory by carrying ball 10 of 12 times on 80-yd TD tour. Score: 14-6.
Champs Again Dec. 19, 1943	After two straight losses, Redskins bounce back in Eastern Title playoff game to thrash Giants 28-0.
Untitled Dec. 26, 1943	Sam Baugh suffers concussion early tackling Sid Luckman on punt return and Bears go on to win, 41-21.
Eastern Champs Dec. 9, 1945	Second straight shutout (Steelers 0-24 Dec. 2) vs Giants today, 17-0, wins Eastern title.
Post Mortems Dec. 16, 1945	In subzero weather, Redskins lose world title to Rams, 15-14, on incredibly freakish plays. Baugh's pass from end zone hits goal-post for safety (no longer allowed); and Waterfield's try-for-point hits crossbar and bounces over.
Champs Trumped Nov. 23, 1947	Fans give auto to Sam Baugh who thanks them with 6 TD tosses, routing champion Cards, 45-21.

- TD Torrent**
Oct. 1, 1955
Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! Eagles lead 16-0 in 3d. Brito recovers fumble on their 32 and LeBaron passes to Janowicz for TD. Thomas recovers kick-off in end zone for TD. Torgeson recovers fumble on Eagles 13. Janowicz goes over. Skins win, 31-30.
- Colts Corraled**
Nov. 8, 1959
World Champion Colts nipped in final 11 seconds by Sam Baker's 46-yd field goal.
- 4 Of A Kind**
Dec. 17, 1961
Dick James scores 4 TDs to set Redskins single game scoring record in 34-24 win over the Dallas Cowboys.
- A Sunny Day**
Oct. 11, 1964
Sonny Jurgensen out-duels Norm Snead by pitching four TD's against the Eagles in the first meeting of the TRADED quarterbacks.
- Indians Scalp 'em**
Nov. 28, 1965
Sonny Jurgensen sparks greatest comeback win in Redskins history. Down 21-0 Redskins record 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passes for over 400 yds and 3 TDs.
- TD Jamboree**
Nov. 27, 1966
The Redskins score the most points in NFL history as they tie or set many team and league records in routing New York, 72-41.
- Pass-Catch Records**
1967
Sonny Jurgensen sets new Redskin and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finish 1, 2, and 4 in the league; highest ever by receivers on same team.
- A Winning Season**
Dec. 14, 1969
Redskins defeat New Orleans by score of 17-14 to insure their first winning season since 1955. Victory also kept Coach Lombardi's record of never having coached a losing NFL team intact.

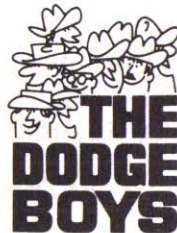

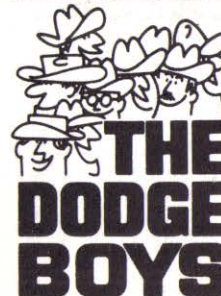

HEAD COACH AND EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT

2nd Year with Redskins

Became Head Coach of the Redskins February 1969

"I hope to be a winner the first year."

This was the statement made February 6, 1969, by Vince Lombardi as he accepted the Head Coaching job of the Washington Redskins.

The 1969 Redskin record: 7 wins—5 losses—2 ties.

The winning record hoped for by Lombardi was realized.

It was the first winning season for the Redskins since 1955, ending a 14-year famine.

It also kept intact Lombardi's great record of never having had a losing season, nine at Green Bay and last year at Washington. His 10-year record now stands at 96 victories, 34 losses and 6 ties. It was remarkable that the 7 wins and 5 losses was the identical record Lombardi had in his first year at Green Bay in 1959.

This gives him the second best winning percentage in pro football, .738%. The Rams' George Allen has the best mark, .755%, with 40 wins, 13 losses, and 3 ties.

With 4 more wins, Lombardi will be the 8th coach to reach the 100-win record. The 7 coaches who have attained 100 or more wins have been George Halas, 321; Curley Lambeau, 230; Steve Owen, 150; Paul Brown, 111; Sid Gillman, 110; Weeb Ewbank, 109; and Buddy Parker, 102.

Vince Lombardi played his collegiate football at Fordham University where he was one of the famed "Seven Blocks of Granite." After attending Law School at Fordham, he coached and taught Chemistry, Latin and Physics at St. Cecelia High School in Englewood, New Jersey.

Then in 1946 he became the line coach at Fordham University where he served until 1948 when he was named assistant to Earl "Red" Blaik at West Point.

Lombardi left the U.S. Military Academy in 1954 to join the New York Giants under Jim Lee Howell as offensive line coach. In four years with the Giants, they won two Eastern Division Titles and one World Title.

In 1959, Lombardi went to Green Bay as Head Coach and General Manager and dramatically altered the football fortunes of the Packers. He took the Packers from a 1-10-1 record to contention his first season and from 1960 on, the Packers never finished below second as they captured 6 Western Division and 5 World Championships, including an unprecedented three in a row from 1965-1967 and the first two AFL-NFL World Championships in 1966 and 1967. Overall his record was 141-39-4 for a .783 winning percentage.

In addition to serving as General Manager of the Packers, Vince Lombardi also serves, holds, or held the following awards and positions: Chairman of the Board, Public Facilities Corp. of Madison, Wis., Fordham University's highest award—the Insignis Medal; The Senator Brien McMahon Award; Trustee of Fordham University; Citizens Committee of St. Norbert's College; President of the State of Wisconsin Mental Health Association; Chairman of the State Cancer Fund; Di-

rector of Pop Warner Football; Special Events Coordinator of The City of Hope. Also a member of Board of Trustees, American Cancer Society, District of Columbia.

Lombardi received the high honor of selection as member of the Order of Malta.

In 1969 he received many honors: the John V. Mara Memorial Award as "Sportsman of the Year" by the New York CYO; the "Silver Buffalo" award as Man of the Year by the National Boy's Scout Federation; "Salesman" of the Year honor as voted in a poll of 1 million salesmen in the country; received an honorary doctor's degree in humane letters from St. Peters College, Trenton, N.J. He previously received an honorary doctor of laws degree from St. Norbert College. He also is a Golden Fleece award recipient.

Lombardi is on the Advisory Board of National Capital Area Council of Boy Scouts of America. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of District of Columbia Division, American Cancer Society; on Committee for Children's Hospital of the District of Columbia. He was Honorary Chairman of Washington, D.C. Kidney Foundation Drive for 1970. He also is on Board of Directors of National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. Is a member of Citizens Committee for Peace with Security.

He recently received the high honor, "The Lighthouse Award" from the New York Association for the Blind — honored as "Builder of Men."

Lombardi authored a best seller, "Run to Daylight." Produced a film, "Second Effort" which is in a great demand by sales groups. He also has produced a 12-series football instruction film.

Lombardi married the former Marie Planitz. They have two children, Vincent and Susan.

LOMBARDI'S 10-YEAR NFL COACHING RECORD

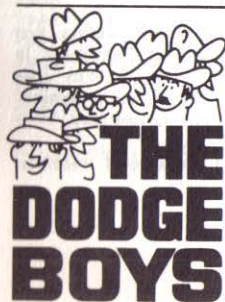

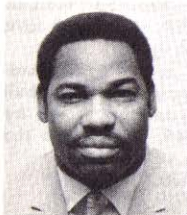

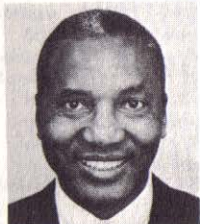

Brown, also a fine blocker, rushed for 888 yards, the most ever by a rookie in Redskin history. He threatened the all-time Redskin record of 951 yards for a season set in 1951 by Rob Goode. He carried the ball 202 times for a 4.4 average and scored 4 touchdowns.

He finished as the League's fourth top running back.

Brown also was outstanding as a pass receiver as he caught 34 for 302 yards. This gave him a total offense mark of 1190 yards. Hill rushed for 942 yards and caught 20 passes for 232 yards for 1174 total yards.

Brown had 3 over-100-yard efforts. He had 105 yards against the Giants; 102 against the Falcons and 138 yards against the Eagles on the wicked "astro-ice" in Franklin Field.

For his brilliant year, he was awarded by his selection to the Pro Bowl game in which he started and starred for the East team.

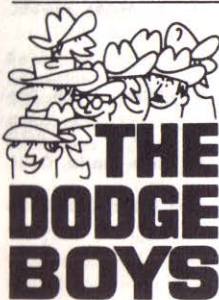

Jurgensen still holds host of Eagle season records—most attempts, 416; most completions, 235; most yardage, 3723; and most TD passes, 32, all set in 1961. With the Eagles, he threw 5 TDs three times in a single season. His completion high is 33 (Eagles) and attempts high is 57 (Eagles).

Jurgensen's 418 yards vs Cleveland was the fifth time he has thrown for more than 400 yards in a game. He is the only quarterback ever to accomplish this feat more than twice. He did it three times with the Eagles and twice with the Redskins - 1965 and 1967. Don Meredith of the Cowboys has had two over-400 yard games. Jurgensen had 9 over-300 yard days with the Eagles and now 12 with the Redskins, 3 in 1964—2 in 1965 and 1966—5 in 1967. Jurgensen had 5 over-300-yard games in 1967 which gave him 21 thru 1967. 2nd in the NFL. He also passed 3 times for 4 touchdowns, vs. Los Angeles, Dallas, and Philadelphia.

In 1968, Jurgensen was hampered by injuries and missed three full games and parts of others. He had an elbow operation May 18 for removal of calcium deposits. He participated in training camp drills sparingly. He did not

play until final pre-season game and led Redskins to win over Steelers. After the fifth game of the season with Pittsburgh, it was discovered that he had fractured ribs. A special protective cast was made and had to be worn rest of season. A severe case of the flu also hit him during season. He finished 8th in the NFL in passing. In 1968, he threw 4 TD passes in opening game against Chicago.

Referred to as having the "quickest wrist" of any thrower in the history of the game, Jurgensen holds the all-time pass yardage total for one season in the League, as he threw for 3737 yards in 1967. The total Redskin passing yardage of 3887 yards in the same season is the all-time high in the League for a team in one season.

In winning his second passing crown in three years last year, Jurgensen had 274 completions in 442 attempts for 3102 yards and 22 touchdowns. The 274 completions total is the second highest ever in the League, topped only by Sonny's 288 in 1967. He is the only passer ever to gain over 3000 yards in a season five times.

When he hit running back Charley Harraway with a touchdown pass in the 17-14 victory over New Orleans in the next to last game of the season, he moved into second place in all-time career touchdown passes. It was his 213th scoring toss of his 13-year career, moving him ahead of Y.A. Tittle, who has 212. Baltimore's John Unitas is number one with 278 scoring tosses in 14 years. He is also listed second behind Unitas as the second best lifetime passer.

Twice Jurgensen has thrown five TD passes in one game; passed for over 400 yards on five occasions; and has thrown for over 300 yards 23 times in his career, three of these posted in 1969. Unitas also leads in this department with 25 games of over 300 yards. Jurgensen has passed for over 400 yards five times, three with the Eagles and twice with the Redskins.

When he threw 4 touchdown passes against Dallas in 1969, it was the fifth time he has accomplished this since joining the Redskins.

Since joining the Redskins in 1964, Jurgensen has finished in passer ranking as follows: 3rd., 10th., 2nd., 1st., 8th., and 1st.

Jurgensen's career can be divided into three segments:

As a Philadelphia reserve, 1957-60, he completed 72 of 141 for 1242 yards and 11 touchdowns.

As the Eagles' regular quarterback, 1961-63, he completed 530 of 966 for 8397 yards and 65 touchdowns.

And, since joining Washington as the Redskins regular quarterback, 1964-69, he has hit on 1380 of 2419 for 17,151 yards and 137 touchdowns.

During the 1969 season, Jurgensen was the quarterback on every play except ONE. That occurred in the Eagles' game at Franklin Field when he had to leave the game with a knee injury at the end of the half. His able back-up quarterback, the veteran Frank Ryan came in and threw a completed pass. On the very next play, Sonny returned to hold the ball for kicker Curt Knight for a successful 43-yard field goal.

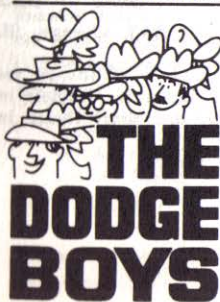

In 1967 Smith's 67 receptions were the most ever in the NFL by a Tight End and his 12 touchdown catches tied him for leadership in most TD receptions by a Tight End with Mike Ditka, who caught 12 for the Bears in 1961. It also tied him with teammate Charley Taylor for the Redskin mark, 12. Smith's second place finish to Taylor was the closest a Tight End has ever come to winning

the pass receiving title. He is the third tight or closed receiver ever to finish in the top ten with his three finishes following his 7th place ranking in 1969. The others to finish in the top ten have been Tight Ends Mike Ditka (four times) and Pete Retzlaff (three times).

For 1969's unanimous All-Pro tight end Smith, his 54 receptions and 9 touchdown catches represented the best by the League's tight ends. It also marked the third time Smith has been the number one tight end in the League, 1966 with 54; 1967 with 67. It was also the 4th consecutive year the five-year veteran has finished in the top ten pass leaders of the NFL. As a 1965 rookie, he started the last five games and has been there since. However, in 1968 he played all season as flanker when he caught 45 passes, 9th best in the League. Smith's '69 tight end reception leadership was the 3rd time for him. The only other tight ends in the history of the League to finish in the top ten have been Mike Ditka (four times) and Pete Retzlaff (three times). His 67 receptions in 1967 are the most ever caught by a tight end in the history of the League. His 3 TD receptions against Dallas marked second time in career he has caught 3. He caught 3 against Rams in 1967.

Smith finished tied for 7th last year with the Browns' Gary Collins. His 54 receptions was one less than teammate Harraway. His 9 touchdowns was only 3 behind the League leader, the Cowboys' Lance Rentzel, who had 12. He was selected to the Pro Bowl for the second time.

It was late in the first quarter that Taylor surprised and left his halfback post and went outside. Before the switch, from his halfback spot, Taylor caught 18 passes for 348 yards and 4 scores. Seven games later, he finished as the league leader. His 12 TDs by receptions tied him with Hugh "Bones" Taylor for most touchdowns by receptions for a Redskin and his total of 15 set a new Redskin touchdown mark for a season. Against Dallas in the first game, Taylor caught 11 passes to tie Mitchell's mark for most receptions in a game. He caught passes for more than 100 yards in five games. He had 4 in 1967.

The 1-2-4 finish by Taylor, Smith and Mitchell marked the first time in the history of the NFL that three receivers on the same team finished that high, and the combined 197 receptions was the most by a three-some in the top-finishers, ever. The pass receiving title went down to the final game of the season as the four battled back and forth to the leadership throughout the last half of the campaign. In fact, Taylor and Smith went into the final game tied for the lead with 62 catches each. Taylor won it with 8 catches against Smith's 5 against New Orleans.

In '66, the trio finished first, sixth and tenth. Taylor led the league, with Mitchell sixth and Smith tenth.

The finish in 1967 was even more phenomenal since Taylor missed three games because of an injury and Mitchell was running back for five games, from the second through the sixth game. Taylor led the team in receptions again in 1968 with 48, 7th in the NFL.

Taylor has ranked in the top ten receivers each of the 6 years in the League, all with the Redskins. He won the pass receiving title in 1966 with 72 receptions and repeated as champion in 1967 with 70 catches. Last year he was second with 71 receptions, one shy of the Redskins record of 72 he gained in '66. Going into the final game of 1969 he was tied with the winner, the Saints' Danny Abramowicz, who finished with 73. He has been first team All-Pro 1964 through 1968. In 1969 he was a second team selection.

For his 6 years in the NFL, Taylor has averaged 59 catches per season, the best of any active player in all professional football.

He is ranked as the 2nd all-time active receiver. Mike Ditka is the leader.

In 1969, after Mitchell retired at the beginning of the season, Taylor placed second in the league with 71 receptions for 883 yards and 8 touchdowns.
