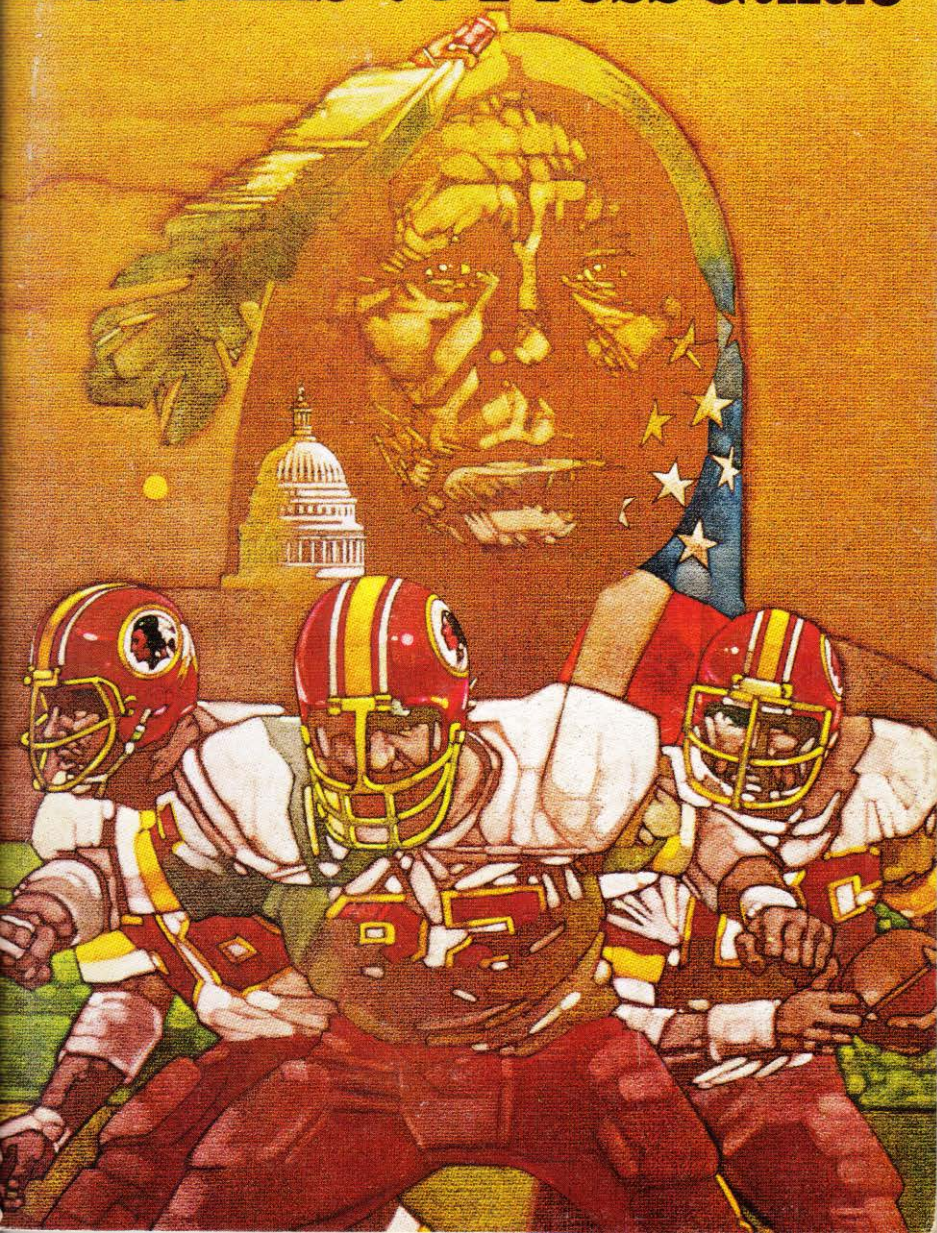

"HAIL TO THE REDSKINS"

Ever since 1937 when the Redskins came to Washington, when Corinne Griffith Marshall and Barnee Breeskin collaborated on the fight song, and when the famed Redskin Marching Band was formed, "Hail to the Redskins" has symbolized the devout unity and loyalty of the Washington Redskins to the Nation's Capital.

When 3,000 people turned out in 1937 just to see Sammy Baugh's first practice, and when 10,000 football-crazed fans traveled to New York and marched down the streets preparing for the division title game vs the Giants, it was obvious that founder George Preston Marshall had found the ultimate perfect home for the Redskins. Nothing has changed in those past 43 years, either. All home games are sold out on a season basis, thousands travel to road games, the TV audience is in the millions, and the players are idolized in a city full of "VIP's."

The proud Redskin tradition, in addition to having the League's first marching band and fight song, includes being the first team to have all their games televised, the first team to have a radio network that once covered a whole geographic area of some 10 states, the League's longest string of sell-outs, and the first team to have a complete football facility (Redskin Park) under one roof. Founder George Preston Marshall was also responsible for the two-division system with a championship game, a slimmed down football for more passing, an extra game featuring the League's all stars (Pro Bowl) and elaborate half-time shows.

All over America, the Redskins still attract the interest of football fans. Last year's Monday night TV contest against Dallas attracted the most viewers of any game in Monday night history, while President and Mrs. Jimmy Carter watched from the box of Redskin President Edward Bennett Williams. No team has been on Monday night TV more than the Redskins, another tribute of the Redskins "drawing power."

Redskin fans have stayed totally behind their team for 42 years, while those who could get tickets have rocked the stadium with thunderous ovations. When the band begins to play, millions of fans, young and old, jump to their feet and proudly proclaim, "Hail to the Redskins, Hail Victory!"

P R E S I D E N T

EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS is the senior partner in the Washington law firm of Williams & Connolly. A native of Hartford, Connecticut he received his A.B. (summa cum laude) from Holy Cross College in 1941. After serving in the USAAF during World War II, he was graduated from Georgetown University Law School and was admitted to the Bar of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at Georgetown Law School from 1946 to 1958, was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the University of Frankfurt in West Germany in 1954, and in 1971 was visiting lecturer at Yale Law School where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from eleven universities.

He was Chairman of the American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control in 1970-72. In 1966 the Bar Association of the District of Columbia presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award. He is a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers, and was a member of its Board of Regents from 1968 through 1972.

By appointment of the Chief Justice of the United States in March of 1965, he served on the United States Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974, and from 1971 to 1974 on the Chief Justice's Committee on Court Facilities and Design. Since 1971 he has served as Chairman of the Judicial Nominating Commission for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Maryland.

By appointment of President Ford, Mr. Williams served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. In 1977 President Carter appointed him as a consultant to the National Security Agency. He is a past member of the President's Lawyers Committee on Civil Rights.

Mr. Williams served as Treasurer of the Democratic National Committee from 1974 to 1977, has served as general counsel of Georgetown University since 1949, and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the College of the Holy Cross.

He is the author of the best seller, **One Man's Freedom**, 1962.

He is the father of seven children and is married to the former Agnes Anne Neill, who is also a graduate of Georgetown University Law School. They live in Potomac, Maryland.

With a firm commitment to excellence, Edward Bennett Williams has brought the Redskins to a championship caliber level in the NFL.

Under Williams, only the third president in the team's 45-year history, Washington has thrived, but has not yet reached the pinnacle Williams desires—a Super Bowl victory. The success achieved, however, has earned the Redskins recognition as one of the NFL's strongest teams. Sold-out RFK Stadium and national TV popularity are only small indications of what Edward Bennett Williams has accomplished with the Redskins.

HEAD COACH

The Redskins of 1978 got off to their best start in over 35 years under debuting head coach Jack Pardee. Beginning with a thrilling opening win at New England, followed by wins over rivals Philadelphia and St. Louis and the surging Jets, and then the Monday night triumph over the Cowboys, the Redskins were the toast of the town under the 42-year enthusiastic Pardee.

Quickly becoming one of the NFL's finest coaches, Pardee has a 17-13 record for the past two seasons.

He was named Washington Redskin head coach by Club President Edward Bennett Williams, January 24, 1978.

Pardee's return to the Redskins came just five years and 10 days after he ended a 15-year NFL playing career by announcing his retirement following the Redskins' Super Bowl VII loss to the Miami Dolphins.

Pardee starred at left linebacker and defensive signal caller for the Redskins for two of the team's most successful years, 1971 and '72. During this time Washington won 22 games, posted the team's best record since 1945, and were crowned NFC champs.

Following his retirement, his pro coaching career began immediately as he became linebacker coach for the Redskins.

Debuting as a head coach in the World Football League, in 1974, Pardee accepted the assignment with a franchise that was to be located in Washington, later moved to Norfolk, and finally became the Florida (Orlando) Blazers. As coach and general manager, he guided the team through many financial disasters. Going sometimes without paychecks, the team posted a 14-6 record and entered the WFL championship game, bowing to Birmingham by a single point.

Pardee was the youngest head coach in the NFL (age 38) when he was hired by the Chicago Bears, December 31, 1974. In three years, he took the Bears from a lowly 4-10 record to the NFL playoffs. Only the eighth head coach in Bear history, he earned NFC Coach of the Year honors by UPI and Pro Football Writers Association in his second year. In 1977, the Bears closed with a six-game winning streak, their longest in 18 years (1959). The last time the Bears had been in the playoffs was 1963.

A superb student of the sport, Pardee's football career began at Texas A&M where he starred under Paul (Bear) Bryant. He was selected All-Southwest Conference and had outstanding performances in both the Blue-Gray and North-South post season all-star games. Off the field, he earned classroom honors as a business administration major.

In 1957, the Los Angeles Rams chose Pardee as a second round draft choice and a sparkling NFL career was underway. After his eighth pro season, an operation to remove cancer in his arm forced him off the field at which time he entered the coaching profession as an assistant at Texas A&M. Never one to quit, Pardee rejoined the Rams in 1966 after

the one-year layoff. When the Rams and Redskins transacted a seven-player, eight-draft choice trade in 1971, Pardee came to Washington.

In his 15 NFL years, he played in 196 games. His stats read 22 pass interceptions, 13 fumble recoveries, five touchdowns, and a safety and 1963 and 1971 All-Pro honors. As the defensive signal caller, he was a coach on the field.

Redskin fans may well remember Pardee's game vs. St. Louis in 1971 when he intercepted three passes and returned one for a touchdown.

Living with the thought "I've always tried to treat everybody the way I'd like to be treated," he has earned the respect and admiration of those who have come in contact with him.

The 6-2, 225 pounder was voted to the Texas all-time Pro Team in 1975. He coached the South All-Star team in the 1976 Senior Bowl and the Big 10 senior stars against the Pac 8 in 1977 at the Seattle Kingdome in the Challenge Bowl.

Pardee lists his "loves" as church, family and football. He and his wife Phyllis Lane Perryman, were married December 27, 1957, and have five children: Steven, 20, sophomore, Northern Virginia Community College; Judee, 19, freshman, Texas Christian University, Ft. Worth, TX; Anne Marie, 18; Susan, 16; and Ted, 10.

Born April 19, 1936 in Exira, Iowa Pardee spent most of his youth in Texas playing six-man high school ball at Christoval High.

GENERAL MANAGER

BOBBY BEATHARD

Finding talent is the name of the game for general managers and scouts. Beathard has ranked among the NFL's elite in doing so and has demonstrated his versatility in finding ways to construct clubs.

The 42-year old go-getter has been an active GM since taking over Redskin controls February 24, 1978. In his first 15 months on the job, he had completed transactions with 14 of the NFL's 28 clubs, acquiring 13 players and 9 draft choices, while surrendering 4 players and 13 draft picks. He signed 7 free agents who played in 1978. And in the draft, where most clubs stress finding talent, he had no pick until the 6th round and only 5 more late picks after that. However, he picked a Pro Bowl player in Tony Green and a special teams standout in linebacker Don Hover. This year, he had only 5 picks, but feels optimistic in these players chances in the NFL.

From 1974-77 in Miami, Beathard drafted 23 players in the first 6 rounds that made the Dolphin roster. In his final year there, 8 of his 11 picks were on the final 43-man roster.

With 16 years of reviewing talent behind him, Beathard's reputation and knowledge of the NFL are impeccable. He began on a part-time basis with Kansas City (1963-66), scouting the western states and then moved on as an aide to Al Davis in the AFL (American Football League) front office. Kansas City made him a permanent scout after three months at the League office, and he stayed until 1968 when he was hired by the Atlanta Falcons. In 1972, Miami named him Director of Player Personnel (as a successor to Joe Thomas).

A native of El Segundo, California, he quarterbacked Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) to consecutive 9-1 records in 1957-58. He signed with the Redskins in 1959, competing for a spot with Eddie LeBaron, Ralph Guglielmi and Eagle Day. He had a brief stay as a defensive back in 1961 with the San Diego Chargers. His younger brother, Pete, starred at Southern Cal and was a first round draft choice by Kansas City in 1964 at quarterback.

Born January 24, 1937, Beathard is an avid runner. He has run the last two Boston Marathons under three hours and has competed in numerous other races around the country, while trying to run 10-15 miles daily for pleasure and training.

When Beathard isn't traveling the country looking for talent, he resides in Oakton, Va. He has three sons and a daughter.

Fourth year with Redskins. Seventh year in NFL.

Became Redskin: February 10, 1978. Rejoined Redskins after working as a public relations assistant in 1972-73

Career: Started as sports information director at California State College, Fullerton in 1970. Came to Redskins in 1972, leaving to become PR director for Jack Pardee when he took the job with the Florida Blazers. He became Pardee's special assistant in 1975 when they moved to Chicago.

JOE WALTON, Pittsburgh, '57 **Offensive Coordinator**

Sixth year with Redskins. Thirteenth year in NFL.

Became Redskin Coach: January 16, 1974.

College Playing Career: Played tight end for 3 years at Pittsburgh.

Pro Playing Career: He was originally drafted by the Redskins in the second round of the 1957 draft. Played tight end for the Redskins, 1957-60, and for the Giants, 1961-63. He was called "the best third-down receiver in football," by Giant quarterback Y.A. Tittle. His NFL totals read: 178 receptions, 2,623 yards and 28 touchdowns.

Pro Coaching Career: In 1967-68, he served as a special scout for the Giants before joining the coaching staff there in charge of the offensive receivers and overall passing game from 1969-73.

Notable: Joe and his father, Frank, are the only father-son combination to ever play for the Redskins. His father was a guard, 1934-35 and 1943-45. They were the first father-son combination to play in the NFL.

Honors: All-American, 1956. Played in the College All-Star game in 1957.

Coaching Career: High school coach at 3 Kentucky high schools, 1957-62, earning State Prep Coach of Year honors for State Champ Danville High. In 1963, he became line coach at University of Kentucky. In 1967, he moved to the University of Cincinnati as line coach, and became head coach in 1969 until 1972.

Pro Coaching Career: He coached the Baltimore Colt linebackers in 1973, but moved on with Jack Pardee to the Florida Blazers of the WFL in 1974 as offensive coordinator. He was the successful line coach at Chicago from 1975-77.

Became Redskin: February 5, 1979.

College Playing Career: He played quarterback-running back at East Stroudsburg (PA) State from 1958-62.

College Coaching Career: From 1966-70, he coached at C.W. Post as offensive coordinator, and moved on to Villanova, 1970; Maryland, 1971; Southern Mississippi, 1972; and Villanova in 1973 as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator.

Pro Coaching Career: He joined Jack Pardee in 1974 as offensive backfield coach of the Florida Blazers of the WFL. He went with Pardee to the Chicago Bears from 1975-77 in the same capacity. In 1978, he moved to the San Francisco 49'ers as offensive coordinator, and was elevated to the head coaching spot for the final 7 games.

Second year with Redskins. Sixth year coaching in NFL.

Became Redskin: February 14, 1978.

College Playing Career: All-SEC quarterback at Tulane. Selected MVP by teammates and was a Player of the Week of Sports Illustrated.

Pro Playing Career: Had outstanding 14-year career with 48 interceptions for 801 yards and 3 TD's. He was selected in round two of the 1959 draft by the Chicago Bears. In 10 years with the Bears he set 5 interception records and was all-pro and leader of the 1963 World Championship team. In 1969, he was traded to Los Angeles where he helped them to Western Division title. He came to the Redskins in 1971 and played on the Super Bowl team of 1972 with Jack Pardee. He played in 4 Pro Bowls, returning an interception 70 yards for a TD in 1968.

Second year with Redskins. Fifth year coaching in NFL.

Became Redskin Coach: February 9, 1978.

College Playing Career: Led Southern Conference in receiving three years at University of Richmond. He caught 87 passes for 1,289 yards and 14 TD's.

Pro Playing Career: In 9 pro seasons, he grabbed 144 passes for 2,044 yards and 16 TD's. He signed with Pittsburgh in 1965 and later played with Green Bay, 1970; Minnesota, 1971; Detroit, 1972-73. In 1974, he joined the Florida Blazers of the WFL. He was with the Redskins in the pre-season of 1972 before being picked up by Detroit.

Pro Coaching Career: Joined Jack Pardee in Chicago in 1973 as special teams and receivers coach.

BOBBY MITCHELL, Illinois, '58

Executive Assistant to the President

Seventeenth year with Redskins. Twenty-first year in professional football. Played 7 years with Redskins, 4 with Cleveland. He joined the player personnel staff after retiring as active player, September, 1969. Was Director of Pro Scouting before promotion February 24, 1978.

Current Activities: President, Redskin Alumni Association; Chairman, Radiothon—United Negro College Fund Drive; Chairman, Potomac Valley AAU (Boxing).

Became Redskin: December 14, 1961. Historic trade with Browns brought him and halfback LeRoy Jackson to Redskins for no. 1 choice in draft for 1962. Browns got the late Ernie Davis, unanimous all-American of Syracuse University.

Pro Playing Career: Had 72 catches for 1,384 yards and 11 touchdowns in 1962 to lead the League. Picked no. 8 by Browns in 1958. Immediately took over left halfback and played 48 consecutive games for them. He scored 546 points. He ranked in the top 10 receivers for 10 years. In his 7 years with the Redskins, Mitchell ranked first, second, fifth, fourth, sixth, and fourth. He missed ranking in 1968.

REDSKINS' FOUNDER GEORGE PRESTON MARSHALL

In the heart and mind, Marshall was first a showman, secondly a business executive, and then a sports buff.

Born October 11, 1896, near Charleston, West Virginia, George's childhood was divided between West Virginia and Washington, DC. His father published the Grafton (West VA) Leader, where his son learned the value of publicity. His father's death in 1918, while George was serving with a machine gun company at Fort Meade, MD, led the 22-year old into the laundry business. He inherited the small laundry his father established in Washington after giving up the newspaper, took \$500 of the insurance money, and proceeded to glamorize the business. He built it into a chain with a modern plant and made a modest fortune.

Always a sports fan, he backed a local semi-pro basketball team (the Palace) and won a city championship (1923-24). He then entered it into the American Basketball League, and won a championship before the league disbanded in three years.

An ardent baseball fan, he became a confident of Clark Griffith, owner of the Senators, and Bucky Harris, manager of the pennant winning teams of 1924-25. He followed the team on the road as well as home.

In 1931, Marshall, Jay O'Brien, Eddie Reeves, Vincent Bendix and M. Dorland Doyle each put up \$5,000 to buy the inactive Boston Braves franchise. In 1937, Marshall brought his club to Washington.

At various stages of his career, Marshall managed three theatres, became publisher of the old Washington Times newspaper under William Randolph Hearst, was a delegate to the National Democratic Convention, was an auto racing promotor and was director of the first Pan American games.

In 1920, he married Elizabeth Mortensen at Greentown, PA and fathered two children, Catherine and George P., Jr. They divorced in 1935 and Marshall married former movie star, Corinne Griffith, in 1936. This marriage ended in divorce in 1958.

A member of Pro Football's Hall of Fame for all his accomplishments, Marshall died August 9, 1969, and is buried in Romney, West Virginia.

Larry Brown, on second offensive play of game with Eagles and needing 4 yards to break the 1000 yard barrier, takes handoff from Sonny Jurgensen and gains 12 yards to become the first Redskin in history to become a member of the 1000 yard club.

Larry Brown, gaining 44 yards against the Cardinals, ends the season as the top rusher in the NFL with a total of 1125 yards in 237 attempts for a 4.7 avg. He is the first Redskin to win an NFL rushing title.

Allen guided Redskins to most wins, 9, in 29 years with 9-4-1 record. First time in 26 years Redskins gained championship playoff game.

George Allen voted NFL and NFC "Coach of Year."

Redskins won first title in 30 years with a convincing 26-3 NFC championship win over defending world champion Dallas Cowboys in RFK Stadium following big 16-3 NFC playoff victory over Green Bay, also in RFK Stadium. Played the Miami Dolphins in Super Bowl VII in Los Angeles' Coliseum. Lost 14-7.

Larry Brown honored by all selections as "NFL Player of Year." Won NFC rushing title as he set new Redskin rushing record with his 1,216 yards, his second over 1,000 yard year.

For second year in row, George Allen accorded "Coach of Year" honors.

Redskins had the best record (10-4) in the NFC East. Second best in NFL.

For the fourth consecutive year, all under Allen, the Redskins made the NFL playoffs.

Redskins wide receiver Charley Taylor became the all-time reception leader in NFL history with his 634th career catch against the Eagles in the season's finale.

By winning final four games, including wins at Dallas and at St. Louis, Redskins made playoffs for fifth time in six years under Allen.

Redskins finished 9-5 for 7th consecutive winning season, but missed playoffs even though they tied with Minnesota and Chicago.

By winning the first six games, including wins over rivals Dallas and St. Louis and playoff bound New England, the Redskins enjoyed their best start in over 35 years. New Coach Jack Pardee was 12-0, with wins in his final six Chicago games to go with these six.

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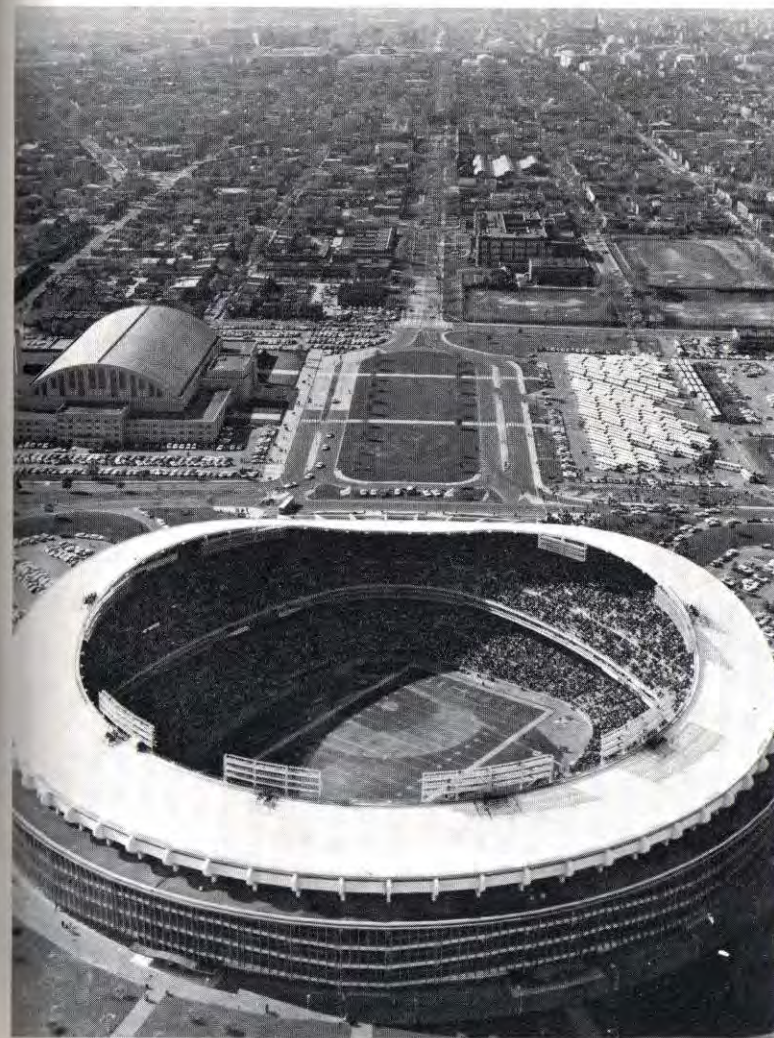

The Super Bowl

In 1970, the NFL was divided into two 13-team conferences, comprised of the 26 teams formerly competing in the National Football League and the American Football League. Each conference was further divided into three divisions, the winner of each conference to be determined by a playoff of the three division winners plus the second place team within the conference with the best record. The winner of the two conferences meet in the NFL title game — **The Super Bowl**. An additional wild card team from each conference was added in 1978.

Redskin Playoff Record

1971 Redskins—NFC Wild Card Winner (9-4-1)

Dec. 26, 1971—Redskins 20, San Francisco 24-Away

Redskins take a 10-3 halftime lead but fail to cash in on scoring opportunities. A Brodie to Washington 78-yard scoring pass ignites a winning 49er counter-attack.

1972 Redskins—Eastern Division Champions, NFC (11-3-0)

Playoff Game—Dec. 24, 1972—Redskins 16, Green Bay 3-Home

Powerful Redskin defense cuts off Green Bay running attack and the Redskins win their first playoff game under the new NFL championship rules. Billy Kilmer hit Roy Jefferson for a score and Curt Knight kicked three field goals.

NFC Championship—Dec. 31, 1972—Redskins 26, Dallas 3-Home

The Redskins win their first conference championship in 30 years with a smashing victory over the defending conference and Super Bowl champion Cowboys. Kilmer flipped two touchdowns to Charley Taylor and Knight booted a playoff record 4 field goals. Defense was outstanding all day.

Super Bowl VII—Jan. 14, 1973—Redskins 7, Miami 14-L.A.

Undefeated Miami cooled off the Redskins attack and the Dolphins became Super Bowl champions with the first undefeated season by any NFL team since the 1941 Chicago Bears.

1973 Redskins—Eastern Division Co-Champions, NFC (10-4)

Dec. 22, 1973—Redskins 20, Minnesota 27-Away

Both Dallas and the Redskins finished the regular season with identical 10-4 records, but because of the point differential in head-to-head play, the Redskins were assigned the NFC "wild card" berth. The Redskins were led by quarterback Billy Kilmer, who had spent all of that week in a Washington, D.C. hospital with a stomach ailment that required surgery after season. Vikings rallied from 7-3 halftime deficit and 10-10 4th quarter tie.

1974 Redskins—Eastern Division Co-Champions, NFC (10-4)

Dec. 22, 1974—Redskins 10, Los Angeles 19-Away

Although both the Redskins and Cardinals finished with identical records of 10-4 in the NFC's Eastern Division, the Redskins were again awarded the "wild card" berth since they lost to the Cardinals twice during regular season play. Despite holding a 10-7 lead at halftime, the Redskins were unable to score in the second half and faltered 19-10.

1976 Redskins—NFC Wild Card Winner (10-4)

Dec. 18, 1976—Redskins 20, Minnesota 35-Away

The Burgundy and Gold returned to the playoffs for the fifth time in the last six years facing Minnesota, who sported the best record in the NFC. The Redskins fell behind in the opening eighty-one seconds on a Viking TD and were unable to make up a 21-3 halftime deficit, despite scoring 17 points in the second half.

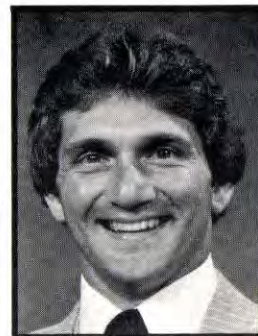
