

FACTS AND FIGURES FOR SUPER BOWL XXII

AT STAKE — National Football League championship for the Vince Lombardi Trophy.

PARTICIPANTS — Champions of the American Football Conference (AFC) and the National Football Conference (NFC) of the National Football League.

SITE — San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium, San Diego, California.

DATE — January 31, 1988.

STARTING TIME — Kickoff 6:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

CAPACITY — 73,500

NETWORK TELEVISION — Nationwide by American Broadcasting Company, Air time 6:00 P.M., ET (5:00 P.M., CT; 4:00 P.M., MT; 3:00 P.M., PT). Pre-game program starts at 4:00 P.M. ET.

PLAYERS' SHARE — \$36,000 to each member of the winning team; \$18,000 to each member of the losing team (approximately \$3.2 million total for the personnel of two competing clubs). Previous shares were: Super Bowls I-XI, \$15,000/\$7,500; Super Bowls XII-XVI, \$18,000/\$9,000; Super Bowls XVII-present, \$36,000/\$18,000.

GAME CONDITIONS —

Player Uniforms — The AFC Champion will be the home team, will use the South bench, and will have the choice of wearing its colored or white jersey. The NFC Champion will be the visiting team and will use the North bench.

Sudden Death — If the game is tied at the end of regulation 60 minutes, it will continue in sudden death overtime. The team scoring first (by safety, field goal, or touchdown) will win.

At the end of regulation playing time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at center of the field, in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pre-game toss. The captain of the visiting team will call the toss. Following a three (3) minute intermission after the end of the regular game, play will continue by fifteen (15) minute periods with a two (2) minute intermission between such overtime period with no halftime intermission. Teams will change goals between each period. The rules for game timing and team timeouts shall be the same as in a regular game, including the last two (2) minutes of the second and fourth quarters.

Officials — There will be seven officials and two alternates appointed by the Commissioner's office.

Official Time — The scoreboard clock will be official.

TROPHY — Winning team receives permanent possession of the Vince Lombardi Trophy, a sterling silver trophy created by Tiffany & Company and presented annually to the winner of the Super Bowl. The trophy was named for the late Vince Lombardi before Super Bowl V. The trophy is a regulation silver football mounted in a kicking position on a pyramid-like stand of three concave sides. The trophy stands 20.75 inches tall, weighs 107.3 ounces, and is valued in excess of \$10,000. The words Vince Lombardi and Super Bowl XXII are engraved on the base along with the NFL emblem.

ATTENDANCE HISTORY — To date 1,732,340 have attended Super Bowl games. Largest crowd was 103,985 at Super Bowl XIV, Pasadena, California.

WASHINGTON REDSKINS 17, MINNESOTA VIKINGS 10 — At Robert F. Kennedy Stadium, Washington, D.C., attendance 55,212.

NFC Eastern Division Champion Washington advanced to its third Super Bowl in the past six seasons by downing Wild Card Minnesota, 17-10.

The Redskins consistently applied pressure to Vikings quarterback Wade Wilson and by game's end had accumulated eight sacks, one from tying the NFL playoff record of nine. Defensive tackle Dave Butz, with two sacks, and defensive end Dexter Manley, with 1½ sacks, led the charge. Washington's defense limited Minnesota to 259 yards.

Washington scored first when quarterback Doug Williams completed a 42-yard touchdown pass to Kelvin Bryant which completed an 8-play, 98-yard drive. Redskins linebacker Mel Kaufman had an interception in the third quarter and returned it to the Vikings' 17-yard line which set up a 28-yard field goal by Ali Haji-Sheikh. This field goal gave Washington a 10-7 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

Early in the final period, the Vikings' Anthony Carter had a 26-yard punt return to midfield which preceded Chuck Nelson's 18-yard field goal. The Redskins responded with an 18-play, 70-yard drive which concluded with wide receiver Gary Clark's 7-yard touchdown catch with 5:06 remaining.

Minnesota drove to the Washington 6-yard line and had an incomplete fourth down pass with 52 seconds left.

DENVER BRONCOS 38, CLEVELAND BROWNS 33 — At Mile High Stadium, Denver, Colorado, attendance 75,993.

AFC Western Champion Denver Broncos became the first team to win back-to-back AFC titles since the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978-79 by defeating the Cleveland Browns for the second straight year, 38-33.

Reserve CB Jeremiah Castille forced and recovered a fumble by Cleveland RB Earnest Byner at the Broncos' three-yard line with 66 seconds to play to insure Denver's third Super Bowl appearance in franchise history.

Denver jumped out to a commanding 21-3 halftime lead. DE Freddie Gilbert halted Cleveland's first drive of the game by intercepting a Bernie Kosar pass to set up John Elway's eight-yard pass to WR Ricky Nattiel. RBs Steve Sewell and Gene Lang each scored on one-yard runs to give Denver their comfortable lead.

The Browns roared back in the second half by scoring 28 points in the first 19:22 of the half. Kosar fired scoring passes to WR Reggie Langhorne (18 yards) and Byner (32) who also scored on a four-yard run. Kosar's four-yard strike to WR Webster Slaughter on the Browns' opening drive of the fourth quarter tied the score 31-31 with 10:38 to play.

But Elway, who completed 14 of 26 for 281 yards and three touchdowns with one interception, finished off a 75-yard drive with a 20-yard touchdown pass to RB Sammy Winder with 4:01 remaining for the decisive score.

Kosar completed an AFC Championship Game record 26 of 41 passes for 356 yards with three touchdowns and one interception. Byner caught seven passes for 120 yards and a touchdown. Denver WR Mark Jackson had four receptions for 134 yards, including a club postseason-record 80-yard scoring catch.

SUPER BOWL I

GREEN BAY 35, KANSAS CITY 10 — At Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, Sunday, January 15, 1967, attendance 61,946. The Green Bay Packers opened the Super Bowl series by defeating Kansas City's American Football League champions, 35-10. Green Bay broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 40-yard return of an interception to the Chiefs' five-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler, caught seven passes from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores. The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter; the only TD on a seven yard pass from Len Dawson to Curtis McClinton. Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 TDs and was chosen the Most Valuable Player.

SUPER BOWL II

GREEN BAY 33, OAKLAND 14 — At Miami Orange Bowl Stadium, Sunday, January 14, 1968, attendance 75,546. Green Bay, after winning its third consecutive NFL championship, won the Super Bowl World title for the second straight year, 33-14, over the AFL champion Raiders in a game that drew the first 3 million dollar gate in football history. Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown. Don Chandler kicked four field goals. Herb Adderley capped the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard run with an interception. The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packer coach, ending nine years at Green Bay.

SUPER BOWL III

NEW YORK JETS 16, BALTIMORE 7 — At Miami Orange Bowl Stadium, Sunday, January 12, 1969, attendance 75,389. Jets' quarterback Joe Namath "guaranteed" victory on the Thursday before the game, then led the AFL to its first Super Bowl victory. Namath, chosen the outstanding player, completed 17 of 28 passes for 206 yards. The Jet defense intercepted Colt quarterback Earl Morrall three times in the first half. The Jets had 337 total yards, including 121 yards rushing by Matt Snell. John Unitas, who had missed most of the season with a sore elbow, came off the bench and led Baltimore to its only touchdown late in the fourth quarter after New York led 16-0.

SUPER BOWL IV

KANSAS CITY 23, MINNESOTA 7 — At Tulane Stadium, New Orleans, Sunday, January 11, 1970, attendance 80,562. The AFL squared the Super Bowl at 2 games apiece, building a 16-0 halftime lead behind Len Dawson's superb quarterbacking. Dawson, the fourth consecutive quarterback to be chosen the Super Bowl's top player, completed 12 of 17 passes, hitting Otis Taylor on a 46-yard play for the final Chief's touchdown. The Kansas City defense limited Minnesota's rushing game to 67 yards gained and made three interceptions and two fumble recoveries. The crowd of 80,562 set a Super Bowl record as did the gross receipts of \$3,817,872.69.

SUPER BOWL V

BALTIMORE 16, DALLAS 13 — At Miami Orange Bowl Stadium, Sunday, January 17, 1971, attendance 79,204. A 32-yard field goal by rookie kicker Jim O'Brien brought the Baltimore Colts a victory over the Dallas Cowboys in the final five seconds of Super Bowl V. The first game between the champions of the AFC and NFC was played on artificial turf. Dallas led 13-6 at the half but interceptions by Rick Volk and Mike Curtis set up a Baltimore TD and O'Brien's decisive kick in the fourth period. Each team had three interceptions. Earl Morrall relieved an injured John Unitas late in the first half, although Unitas completed the Colts' only scoring pass. It caromed off receiver Eddie Hinton's finger tips, off Dallas defensive back Mel Renfro and finally settled into the grasp of John Mackey, who went 45 yards to score on a 75-yard play.

SUPER BOWL VI

DALLAS 24, MIAMI 3 — At Tulane Stadium, New Orleans, Sunday, January 16, 1972, attendance 81,023. The Cowboys rushed for a record 252 yards and their defense limited the Dolphins to a low of 185 yards while not permitting a touchdown for the first time in Super Bowl history. Dallas converted Chuck Howley's recovery of Larry Csonka's first fumble of the season into a 3-0 advantage, and led at half-time 10-3. After Dallas received the second half kickoff, Duane Thomas led a 71-yard match in eight plays for a 17-3 margin.

SUPER BOWL VII

MIAMI 14, WASHINGTON 7 — At Los Angeles Coliseum, Sunday, January 14, 1973, attendance 90,182. The Dolphins played virtually perfect football in the first half as their defense permitted the Redskins to cross midfield only once and their offense turned good field position into two touchdowns. On its third possession, Miami opened its first scoring drive from the Dolphins' 37-yard line. An 18-yard pass from Bob Griese to Paul Warfield preceded by three plays Griese's 28-yard touchdown pass to Howard Twilley.

SUPER BOWL VIII

MIAMI 24, MINNESOTA 7 — At Rice Stadium, Houston, Sunday, January 13, 1974, attendance 71,882. The defending NFL Champion Dolphins, representing the AFC for the third straight year, scored the first two times they had possession on marches of 62 and 56 yards in the first period while the Miami defense limited the Vikings to only seven plays. Larry Csonka climaxed the initial 10-play drive with a 5-yard touchdown bolt through right guard after 5:27 elapsed. Four plays later, Miami began another scoring drive which ended with Jim Kiick bursting one yard through the middle for another touchdown after 13:38 of the period.

SUPER BOWL IX

PITTSBURGH 16, MINNESOTA 6 — At Tulane Stadium, New Orleans, Sunday, January 12, 1975, attendance 80,997. AFC champion Pittsburgh made its initial Super Bowl appearance, and NFC champion Minnesota tried a third time for a Super Bowl title. Dwight White downed Vikings' quarterback Fran Tarkenton in the end zone for a safety 7:49 into the second period. The Steelers forced another break and took advantage on the second half kickoff when Minnesota's Bill Brown fumbled and Marv Kellum recovered for Pittsburgh on the Vikings 30. Franco Harris carried three consecutive times, including a nine-yard touchdown and a 9-0 lead.

SUPER BOWL X

PITTSBURGH 21, DALLAS 17 — At Miami Orange Bowl Stadium, Sunday, January 18, 1976, attendance 80,187. The Steelers won the Super Bowl for the second year in a row on Terry Bradshaw's 64-yard touchdown pass to Lynn Swann and an aggressive defense that snuffed out a late rally by the Cowboys with an end zone interception on the final play of the game.

SUPER BOWL XI

OAKLAND 32, MINNESOTA 14 — At Rose Bowl, Pasadena, California, Sunday, January 9, 1977, attendance 103,438. The Raiders won their first NFL championship before a record Super Bowl crowd plus 81 million television viewers, the largest audience ever to watch a sporting event. The Raiders gained a record-breaking 429 yards including running back Clarence Davis's 137 yards rushing, and wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff made four key receptions, which earned him the game's most valuable player trophy. Oakland scored on three successive possessions in the second quarter to open up a 16-0 halftime lead.

SUPER BOWL XII

DALLAS 27, DENVER 10 — At New Orleans Superdome, Sunday, January 15, 1978, attendance 75,583. Dallas evened their Super Bowl record at 2-2 before a sellout crowd, plus 102,010,000 TV fans, the largest audience for a sports event. They built up a 13-0 lead as Denver lost 3 fumbles and were intercepted twice in the first half. After Turner's 47-yard FG, a diving catch by Butch Johnson on a 45-yard pass from Roger Staubach put the Cowboys ahead 20-3. Norris Weese relieved Craig Morton (who was intercepted a Super Bowl game record 4 times) and guided the Broncos to the 1-yard line, from where Rob Lytle ran for the score. Dallas ended the scoring on a surprise Robert Newhouse to Golden Richards 29-yard pass play.

SUPER BOWL XIII

PITTSBURGH 35, DALLAS 31 — At Orange Bowl, Miami, Fla., Sunday, January 21, 1979, attendance 79,484. Terry Bradshaw threw a record four touchdown passes to lead the Steelers to victory in the highest-scoring Super Bowl in history. Bradshaw, who was voted the game's most valuable player, completed 17 of 30 passes for 318 yards, also a Super Bowl record. Stallworth had two catches for touchdowns (28, 75), Bleier caught one for 7 yards, and Swann caught an 18 yarder for a TD.

SUPER BOWL XIV

PITTSBURGH 31, LOS ANGELES 19 — At Rose Bowl, Pasadena, California, Sunday, January 20, 1980, attendance 103,985. Terry Bradshaw completed 14 of 21 passes for 309 yards and set two passing records as the Steelers became the first team to win four Super Bowls. Despite three interceptions by the Rams, Bradshaw kept his poise and brought the Steelers from behind twice in the second half.

SUPER BOWL XV

OAKLAND 27, PHILADELPHIA 10 — At Louisiana Superdome, New Orleans, La., Sunday, January 25, 1981, attendance 76,135. Jim Plunkett threw 3 touchdown passes, including an 80-yarder to Kenny King, as the Raiders became the first wild card team to win the Super Bowl. Besides the 80-yard pass to King, Plunkett threw two touchdown passes to Cliff Branch (3 yards and 29 yards) and Chris Bahr added field goals of 46 and 35 yards.

SUPER BOWL XVI

SAN FRANCISCO 26, CINCINNATI 21 — At Pontiac Silverdome, Pontiac, Mich., Sunday, January 24, 1982, attendance 81,270. Ray Wersching's Super Bowl record-tying four field goals helped lift the San Francisco 49ers to their first NFL championship. The 49ers built a game-record 20-0 halftime lead via Montana's one-yard touchdown run, fullback Earl Cooper's 11-yard scoring pass from Montana, and Wersching's 22- and 26-yard field goals. The Bengals rebounded in the second half, closing the gap to 20-14 on quarterback Ken Anderson's five-yard run and Dan Ross's four-yard catch from Anderson, who established Super Bowl passing records for completions (25) and completion percentage (73.5 percent on 25 of 34). Wersching added early fourth-period field goals of 40 and 23 yards. Dan Ross set a Super Bowl record with 11 receptions for 104 yards. Montana was named the game's most valuable player. Cincinnati compiled 356 yards to San Francisco's 275, the first time in Super Bowl history that the team that gained the most yards from scrimmage lost.

SUPER BOWL XVII

WASHINGTON 27, MIAMI 17 — At Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Cal., Sunday, January 30, 1983, attendance 103,667. Fullback John Riggins, the game's most valuable player, rushed 166 yards on 3 carries (both Super Bowl records). The Redskins accounted for 400 yards (including a record 276 rushing) exceeded only by the 429 total yards by Oakland in game XI. The Dolphins built a 17-10 first-half lead on a 76-yard pass, a 20-yard field goal and a Super Bowl record 9-yard kickoff return by Fulton Walker. The second half was all Washington. After a 3rd period 20-yard field goal by Mark Moseley, the Redskins tied a Super Bowl record of 14 points in the 4th quarter with Riggins's 43-yard td run and a 6-yard pass from Joe Theismann to Charlie Brown.

SUPER BOWL XVIII

LOS ANGELES RAIDERS 38, WASHINGTON 9 — At Tampa Stadium, Tampa, Florida, January 22, 1984, attendance 72,920. The Raiders achieved the most lopsided (29 points) victory in Super Bowl history, led by Marcus Allen, who set

game records for yards (191) and longest rush from scrimmage (74 yards, td). He was voted Most Valuable Player. The Raiders scored on a blocked punt recovery in the end zone by Derrick Jensen and a 12-yard pass from Jim Plunkett to Cliff Branch. Mark Moseley's 24-yard field goal for the Redskins was followed by Jack Squirek's 5-yard td interception to give the Raiders a 21-3 halftime lead. John Riggins closed out Washington's scoring with a 1-yard td run before Marcus Allen's 2 td runs of 5 and 74-yards in the third quarter and Chris Bahr's 21-yard field goal in the fourth set a record for most points by a Super Bowl team.

SUPER BOWL XIX

SAN FRANCISCO 38, MIAMI 16 — At Stanford Stadium, Stanford, California, Sunday, January 20, 1985, attendance 84,059. The Dolphins led 10-7 at the end of the first quarter, however the 49ers built a 28-16 half-time lead. The total of 17 points in the 1st quarter and 44 points at the half set Super Bowl records for points by two teams at those stages. San Francisco's Roger Craig set a record by scoring 3 TDs on pass receptions of 8 and 16 yards and a run of 2 yards. His teammate, Joe Montana, the game's most valuable player, completed 24 of 35 passes (3 tds) for a Super Bowl record 331 yards and rushed 5 times for 59 yards (1 td). The 49ers 537 total net yards set a new game record. They held a time of possession advantage of 37:11 to Miami's 22:49.

SUPER BOWL XX

CHICAGO 46, NEW ENGLAND 10 — At Superdome, New Orleans, Louisiana, Sunday, January 26, 1986, attendance 73,818. The Bears scored the most points in Super Bowl history to claim their first NFL title since 1963. New England jumped out to the quickest lead in Super Bowl annals on Tony Franklin's 36-yard field goal 1:19 into the game, but Chicago dominated the first half from that point on to take a 23-3 lead. The Bears forged their advantage on three Kevin Butler field goals (24, 28, 24 yards) and touchdown runs by Matt Suhey (11 yards) and Jim McMahon (2). Chicago gained 236 total yards in the first half while holding New England to minus 19. Reggie Phillips (29-yard interception return), McMahon (1 run), and William Perry (1 run) added third-quarter scores to put the game away. Richard Dent became the fourth defender to be named the game's most valuable player while coach Mike Ditka joined the Raiders's Tom Flores as the only coaches to play in a Super Bowl and coach a team to a victory. Chicago's 36-point winning margin was the largest in Super Bowl history.

SUPER BOWL XXI

NEW YORK GIANTS 39, DENVER 20 — At Rose Bowl, Pasadena, California, Sunday, January 25, 1987, attendance 101,063. Phil Simms set Super Bowl records for most consecutive completions (10) and highest completion percentage (88%) as he passed for 238 yards and three touchdowns. The victory marked the NFC's fifth win in the past six Super Bowls and the first NFL title for the Giants since 1956. The Broncos held a 10-9 halftime lead, the narrowest margin in Super Bowl history, led by John Elway's 13 of 20 for 187 yards. The Giants took command of the game by scoring a Super Bowl-record 30 points in the second half. Simms, the game's most valuable player, completed touchdown passes to Mark Bavaro (13 yards) and Phil McConkey (6). The New York defense also held Denver scoreless on a key second-quarter drive when the Broncos failed to score on four chances inside the Giants' 10-yard line. The Giants limited Denver's offense to only two net yards in the third quarter.
