

JULY 9, 1932 How it Started

JULY 8, 1933 The Name

The First Game

AUG. 9, 1938 Birth of the Band

AUG. 17, 1938 The Song is Sung George P. Marshall heads syndicate (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, M. Dorland Doyle) that buys National Football League franchise for Boston, Massachusetts. They contract to play in Braves Field, home of National Baseball League team—and are called The Braves.

The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home of American League Red Sox, and their name becomes The Redskins.

National Football League approves transfer of Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C. Jesse Jones throws out the first ball and Riley Smith plays with it all night.

We chill the big, bad Bears on frozen Wrigley Field, 28-21.

The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its kind...and still the best. See page 12.

AUG. 2, 1939 Westward Hol Redskins set forth on first coast-to-coast football training trip. Trainside farewell ceremonies presided over by U. S. Senator Lewis B. Schwellenbach. Training site for the pigskin pioneers: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Wash. (near Spokane).

AUG. 7, 1939 All-Time Record Hal Kemp, favorite dance leader, records "Hail to the Redskins!" First pro football song put on platters for popular sale (RCA).

AUG. 18, 1941 Rams Take Note Redskins bring pro football on large scale for first time to California. Establish training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

OCT. 10, 1943 On the Air First broadcast of Redskins game by American Oil Company. Two stations carry it. For today's vast network see page 21.

JULY 30, 1944 To a T Redskins abandon their double-wing formation and adopt the T-formation.

SEPT. 6, 1946 Million \$ Game First annual Redskins-Rams Game for benefit of Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. Draws 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum, NETS Times Boys Club \$96.711.23.

JUNE 13, 1947 High Note Redskins Band performs at Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.

JULY 28, 1947 Birth of the Book First official press-radio year-book printed and distributed free to fans by AMOCO.

JULY 7, 1949 The Big Parade Redskins Band represents the Nation's Capital in the big parade up New York's Fifth Avenue featuring the Lions Clubs National Convention.

JUNE 14, 1950 Veni, Vici, Video AMOCO announces plans to televise all Redskins games — no other pro team on TV.

SEPT. 26, 1954 Another First AMOCO TV's our game in San Francisco back to D. C. and Dixie. First time any regional network has been so served.

OCT. 10, 1954 Baugh-to-Bach Dr. Howard Mitchell leads his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a half-time show.

JULY 16, 1958 The Stadium D. C. Stadium Bill is passed by Congress. (See Page 22).

OCT. 15, 1958 The Alumni Redskins Alumni Association organized. Twentythree former players residing here adopt formal constitution and by-laws and invite all-nonresident ex-Redskins to join for the welfare of all.

DEC. 24, 1959 Here to Stay Redskins sign 30-year lease to play in the new Washington Stadium.

MAY 23, 1960 Another Record! National Symphony Orchestra, under direction of Dr. Howard Mitchell, makes recording of "Hail to the Redskins!" under sponsorship of AMOCO.

THE BIG GAMES . . . for our Team

SEPT. 16, 1937 First Victory

The First Game! Thursday night opener draws 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scores on 60-yd run with interception, two field goals and extra point. Score: Riley's Redskins 13, Giants 3.

DEC. 5, 1937 First Title First big invasion of New York. Rebel yells resound through Manhattan's concrete canyons. Ten thousand feather-wearing fans stomp up Broadway behind brass band. Sam Baugh completes 11 of 15, Cliff Battles runs 75 and 76 yds for TDs, Giants routed, 49 - 14, for Eastern Championship.

DEC. 12, 1937 World Champs! Freezing weather, frozen field, icy-nerved Bears can't stop Baugh. Completes 17 of 33 for 335 yds and 3 TDs. Wayne Millner, the all-time Notre Dame great, escapes with nine for 160 yds . . . including 77 and 55-yd TD sprints.

OCT. 1, 1939 Zero Hour Only scoreless tie in Redskins history as Giants are battled in mud and rain.

OCT. 15, 1939 Record Pass Redskins backed up to their 1-yd line. From kick formation, standing deep in end zone, Frank Filchock flips pass to Andy Farkas who goes all the way for touchdown. Longest pass play in National League history . . . 99 yds.

DEC. 3, 1939 A Kick Coming Giants lead, 9 - 7, with one minute left as Redskins hammer on goal line. Tackle Bo Russell drops back to 15-yd line and kicks placement . . . but fans' cheers are choked. Referee Bill Halloran rules kick wide.

DEC. 1, 1940 Eastern Champs Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13 - 6 to clinch Eastern Championship.

DEC. 8, 1940 73-to-Ohhli Redskins get more first downs than Bears in World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium, NOV. 23, 1941 Title Escapes Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13 - 10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20 - 13.

SEPT. 27, 1942 '42's Only Loss

Giants don't make first down, gain only ONE yard rushing, complete just ONE pass... but it's good for TD; then they capture another TD on interception... and we suffer our only 1942 defeat, 14 - 7.

NOV. 15, 1942 Eastern Champs

Andy Farkas runs 2d half kickoff 94 yds for TD to spark 14 - 7 victory over Giants.

DEC. 13, 1942 World Champs

Bears take early lead on errant pass from center. But Sam Baugh's 85-yd quick kick sets them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then makes vital interception and follows with sensational catch for 38-yd TD. Andy Farkas caps victory by carrying ball 10 of 12 times on 80-yd TD tour. Score: 14 - 6.

DEC. 19, 1943 Champs Again After two straight losses, Redskins bounce back in Eastern Championship playoff game to thrash Giants 28 - 0.

DEC. 26, 1943 Untitled

Sam Baugh suffers concussion early when tackling (of all people) Sid Luckman on punt return and Bears go on to win, 41 - 21.

DEC. 3, 1944 Foul Play Joe Aguirre kicks 37-yd field goal for apparent 16-all tie with 1:28 to go in Eastern title game, but kick is nullified by holding penalty and next kick is short. Giants win. 16 - 13.

DEC. 9, 1945 Eastern Champs Second straight shutout (Steelers 0 - 24 Dec. 2) vs Giants today, 17 - 0, wins Eastern title.

DEC. 16, 1945 Post Mortems In subzero weather, Redskins lose world title to Rams, 15 - 14, on incredibly freakish plays. Baugh's pass from end zone hits goal-post for safety (no longer allowed); and Waterfield's tryfor-point hits crossbar.


NOV. 23, 1947 Champs Trumped Touchdown Club honors Sam Baugh, who gives thanks with 6 TD passes to rout world champion Cards, 45 - 21.

NOV. 25, 1951 And Again No. 1 upset of season—world champion Rams are walloped, 31 - 21.

DEC. 7, 1952 Giant-Killer Eddie LeBaron, kayoed in 1st quarter, returns to pitch four TDs, knocking Giants out of title.

OCT. 31, 1954 The Cup Series Baltimore's Advocate Club puts up silver loving cup for Redskins-Colts series... only such trophy in pro football. Redskins win possession with 24 - 21 triumph on 14-yd, 4th-quarter FG.

OCT. 1, 1955 TD Torrent Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! Eagles lead 16 - 0 in 3d. Brito recovers fumble on their 32 and LeBaron passes to Janowicz for TD. Thomas recovers kick-off in end zone for TD. Torgeson recovers fumble on Eagles 13. Janowicz goes over. Skins go on to win, 31 - 30.

NOV. 25, 1956 Time's Awastin' Eddie LeBaron completes five straight to edge Browns in final 91 seconds.

OCT. 27, 1957 Spoilers Ed Sutton's 23-yd smashing TD run and Bert Zagers' 76-yd punt return for TD provide impetus for 31 - 14 upset of defending champion Giants.

NOV. 17, 1957 The Toe Lou Groza kicks 23-yd FG with only 13 seconds to go to give Browns providential 30 - 30 tie.

NOV. 30, 1958 Done Up Brown The Browns' great Jim Brown held to scant 12 yds in 11 tries... poorest output in his career.

NOV. 8, 1959 Colts Corraled

World Champion Colts nipped in final 11 seconds by 46-yd field goal. Details on page 72.

VITAL DAYS . . . for the League

SEPT. 17, 1920 The Founding The league is born. At meeting in Canton, O., representatives of 11 cities form the American Professional Football Association. (Two teams still in league: Cardinals and Bears).

JUNE 24, 1922 The Naming Second reorganization (of many to come) and the name becomes the National Football League.

FEB. 6, 1926 The Ethics Players declared ineligible for league unless their college classes have graduated.

FEB. 7, 1926 Player Limit First limit placed on size of squads—18 players maximum, 15 minimum. (Limit now is 36).

FEB. 25, 1933 Game Opened Up George Halas of Bears and George P. Marshall combine in re-writing rules to open up game. Biggest changes: Forward passing allowed from anywhere behind line (previously passer had to be 5 yds back); and posts returned to goal line.

JULY 8, 1933 Championship Game Three George P. Marshall proposals adopted: Separation of teams into two leagues (or conferences), balanced scheduling and establishment of World Championship Playoff Game (tremendously increasing players' incentive and income).

AUG. 31, 1934 The All-Star Game First annual All-Star Game between graduating collegians and the pros: Bears 0, Stars 0.

SEPT. 7, 1942 Free Substitution Free substitution tried for first time in Redskins-Packers pre-season game in Baltimore.

APR. 7, 1943 Made Permanent League adopts free substitution rule for the first time.

JAN. 12, 1946 Rams Go West Pro football becomes first major-league coast-tocoast sport. Cleveland's Rams move to Los Angeles. (The way had been paved by the Redskins' pre-season charity games).

DEC. 9, 1949 3 Clubs Join The All-America Conference, struggling rival group, folds. Three of its teams (Cleveland Browns, San Francisco 49ers, Baltimore Colts) are accepted into National League.

JAN. 14, 1950 The Pro Bowl League adopts resolution by George P. Marshall to establish annual All-Star Pro Bowl Game sponsored by Los Angeles Publishers' Association.

DEC. 28, 1958 Sudden Death First sudden death decision in world championship game. Colts defeat Giants, 23-17, after 8 mins. 15 secs. of overtime.

MAY 23, 1959 Benefit Plan Players' Benefit Plan voted. Medical care, hospitalization, insurance guaranteed to all players and dependents.

JAN. 26, 1960 Rozelle Named Pete Rozelle elected Commissioner for three years. Succeeds the late Bert Bell who died Oct. 11 at Steelers-Eagles game in Philadelphia.

JAN. 28, 1960 Welcome, Text Dallas voted franchise for 1960; Minneapolis for 1961.


MAR. 14, 1960 New Deal Cardinals granted permission by unanimous vote to move from Chicago to St. Louis.





• A series sponsored by the Variety Clubs of Baltimore and Washington not only introduced pro football to Baltimore but netted almost \$125,000 for boys' club activities in those two cities.

• During World War II, two Redskins games collected almost \$125,000 for service relief funds.

• In Winston-Salem, the growing Piedmont Bowl has raised more than \$75,000.

• But, by far, the most successful promotion has been The Los Angeles Times' annual Rams-Redskins game in mammoth Memorial Coliseum. In 14 games so far, Times Charities, Inc., has NETTED after all taxes and expenses, \$1,214,591.84.


