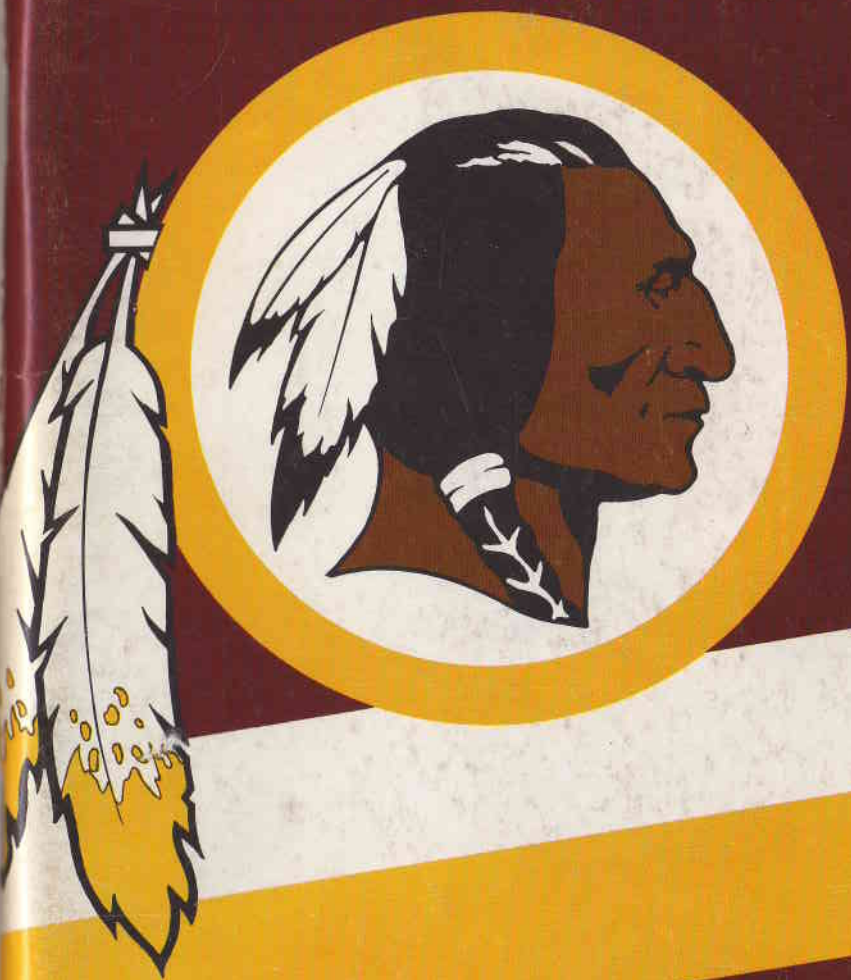
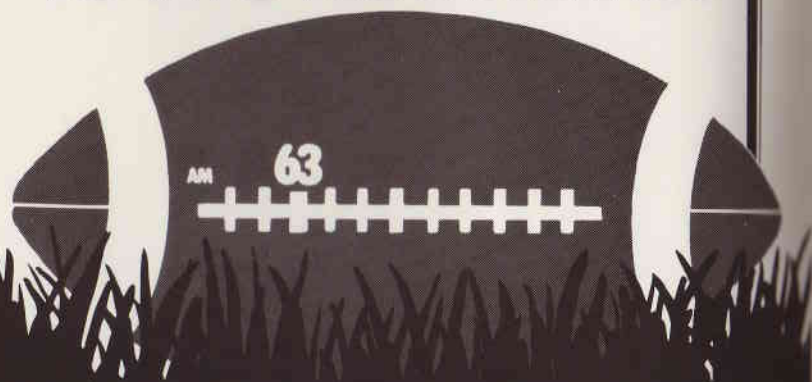

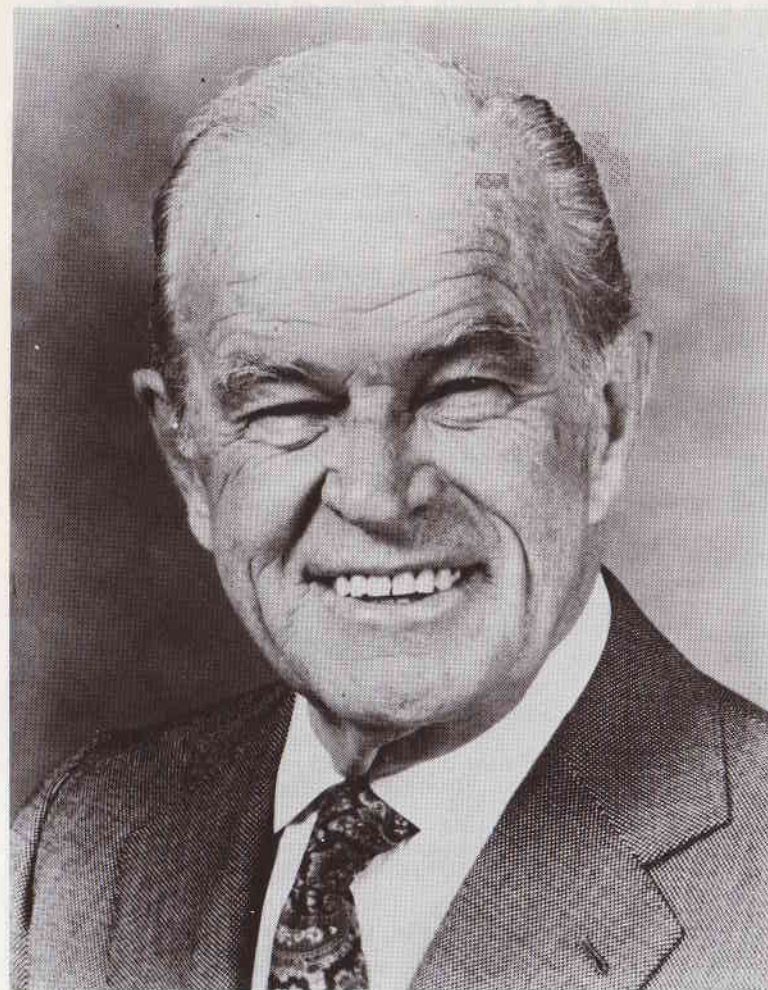

P R E S I D E N T

EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS is the senior partner in the Washington law firm of Williams & Connolly. A native of Hartford, Connecticut he received his A.B. (summa cum laude) from Holy Cross College in 1941. After serving in the USAAF during World War II, he was graduated from Georgetown University Law School and was admitted to the Bar of the District of Columbia.

In 1962, he was appointed to the Redskin Board of Directors by George Preston Marshall. He was named Executive Vice-President to Mr. Marshall in 1965 and President in 1966. He purchased the Baltimore Oriole baseball team November 1, 1979 and serves as Chairman of the Board of the Orioles.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at Georgetown Law School from 1946 to 1958, was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the University of Frankfurt in West Germany in 1954, and in 1971 was visiting lecturer at Yale Law School where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from eleven universities.

He was Chairman of the American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control in 1970-72. In 1966 the Bar Association of the District of Columbia presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award. He is a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers, and was a member of its Board of Regents from 1968 through 1972.

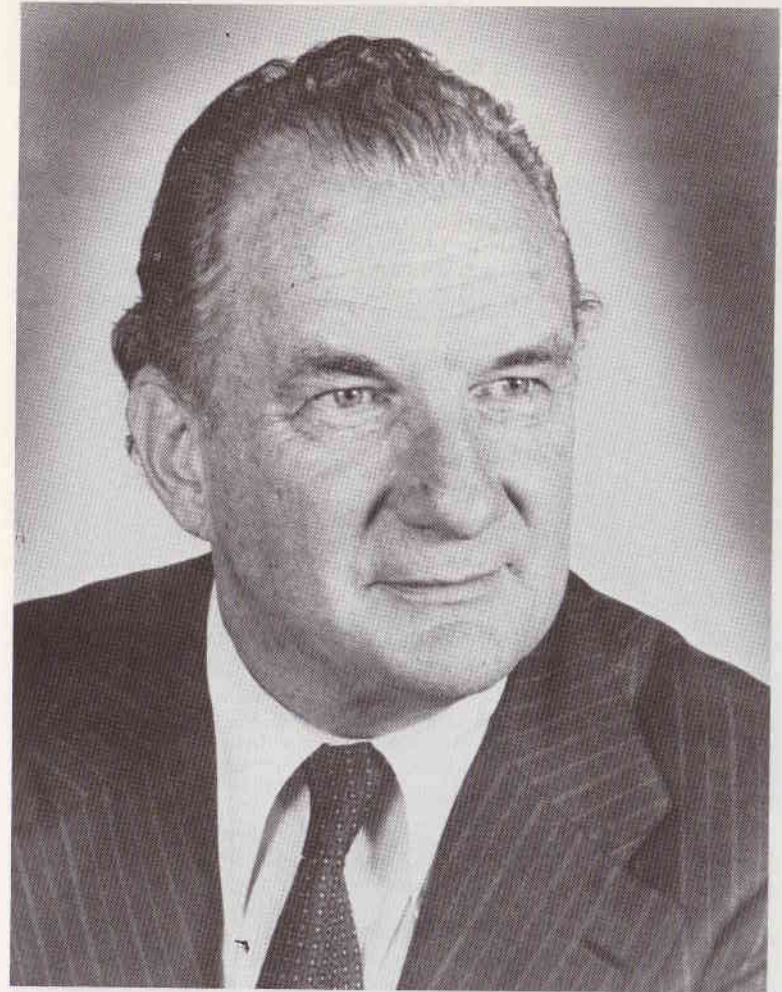
By appointment of the Chief Justice of the United States in March of 1965, he served on the United States Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974, and from 1971 to 1974 on the Chief Justice's Committee on Court Facilities and Design. Since 1971 he has served as Chairman of the Judicial Nominating Commission for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Maryland.

By appointment of President Ford, Mr. Williams served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. In 1977 President Carter appointed him as a consultant to the National Security Agency. He is a past member of the President's Lawyers Committee on Civil Rights.

Mr. Williams served as Treasurer of the Democratic National Committee from 1974 to 1977, has served as general counsel of Georgetown University since 1949, and is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Holy Cross College.

He is the author of the best seller, **One Man's Freedom**, 1962.

He is the father of seven children and is married to the former Agnes Anne Neill, who is also a graduate of Georgetown University Law School. They live in Potomac, Maryland.



GENERAL MANAGER

BOBBY BEATHARD

When discussing NFL experts in evaluating and grading the potential or ability of football players, Bobby Beathard's name will be near the top of any list.

With 18 years of talent-hunting behind him, the tireless Redskin GM has established an impeccable reputation of knowing how to judge players.

In taking over the Redskin helm February 24, 1978, Beathard inherited a draft-poor situation and since has diligently scoured the market, signing free agents, making trades and using what draft choices available.

During his first three years in Washington, the 44-year old Beathard has completed transactions with 17 of NFL's 27 member clubs, acquiring 21 players and 22 draft picks, while surrendering eight players and 27 picks. In that same span, 22 free agents have made the Redskins roster.

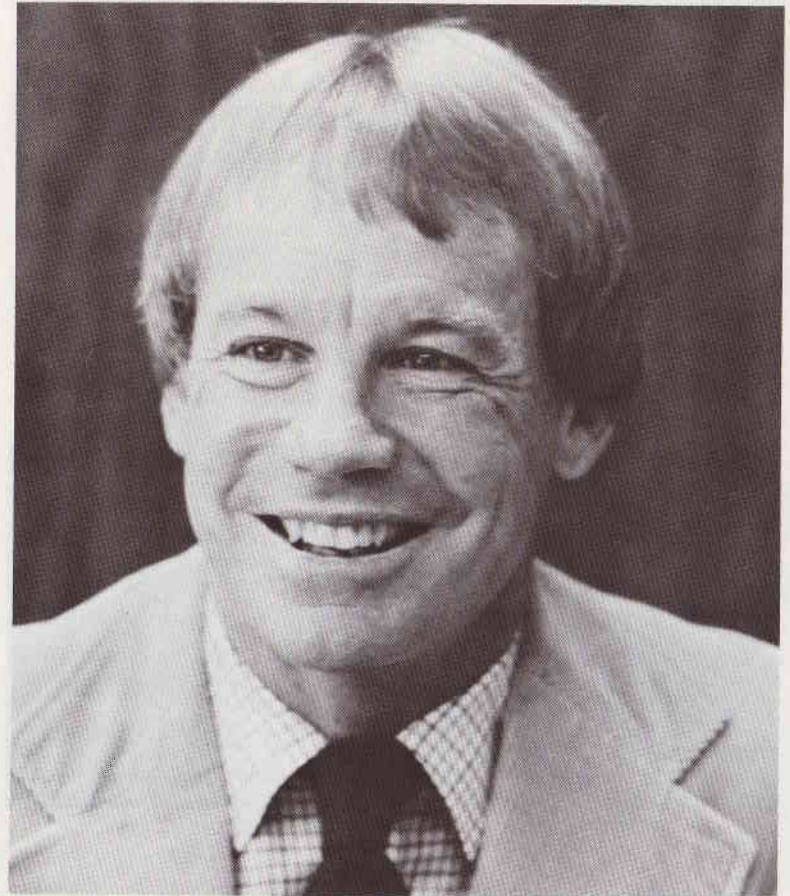
More eye-catching is his ability to perform despite the handicap that the Redskins have not had top draft choices to work with. In his first draft here (1978), the first pick was not until round six. Beathard chose a future Pro Bowl performer, Tony Green, and followed that in round eight with starting middle linebacker Don Hoyer. In 1979, he had an all-time NFL low of only five picks (rounds 4, 7, 9, 11, 12). He selected three current starters (TE Don Warren and LB's Rich Milot and Monte Coleman) along with WR Kris Haines, still active in the NFL. Last year, he had the club's first number one pick since 1968 and chose WR Art Monk, a unanimous all-NFL rookie who set Redskin rookie records. Four other players (Mat Mendenhall, Farley Bell, Melvin Jones, and Lewis Walker), who were among his seven picks, are returning from reserve lists and will attend training camp this summer. Beathard utilized Canadian eligibles, bringing in Pro Bowl returner Mike Nelms in 1979 and running back Buddy Hardeman in 1978.

A native of El Segundo, California, Beathard quarterbacked Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo to consecutive 9-1 records in 1957-58, rooming with John Madden. He signed with the Redskins in 1959, but did not make the club. He also tried out with Minnesota and later played five games with San Diego in 1960. The Kansas City Chiefs hired Beathard in 1963 as a part-time scout and he stayed with them until 1966, when he moved to the AFL front office headquarters working with Al Davis. Kansas City hired him full-time after three months at the League office and he

then moved on to the Atlanta Falcons in 1968 as a personnel scout. In 1972, Miami named him Director of Player Personnel. At Miami, he displayed his talent in selecting players in the draft and signing key free agents. On February 24, 1978, he was named Redskins General Manager.

Born January 24, 1937, Beathard is an avid runner. He has run the last three Boston Marathons, plus several other road races, and usually runs 10-15 miles daily.

Beathard and his wife, Christine, reside in Oakton, Va. He has four children: Kurt, 18; Jeff, 17; Casey, 15; and Jaime, 12.



HEAD COACH

JOE GIBBS

When Jack Kent Cooke and Bobby Beathard began a search for a new head coach, the one man they wanted to entice to Washington was Joe Gibbs, then offensive coordinator of the NFL's most powerful record-setting unit at San Diego.

With 17 years of coaching experience behind him, Gibbs came with solid recommendations from all those he had worked with.

"Joe appeals to me because of his obvious dedication to the game," Cooke remarked. "And I believe his abilities match his ambitions. He's a pioneer in the game in as much as he recognized before others the perceptible change in the character of the game." Cooke's reference was to Gibbs' offensive-play schemes that established new NFL records for total offense and passing the last two seasons.

As offensive play caller from the press box, Gibbs directed the Chargers to 6,410 yards offense (the Redskins had 4,854), 4,715 passing yards (2,838 by the Redskins), and 418 points (261 by Washington) in 1980. "On offense, we dictate to the defense and we are aggressive," Gibbs says of his philosophy.

Gibbs has had excellent tutors and pupils throughout his career. As a tight end, linebacker and guard at San Diego State, he played on teams that were 22-6-1 under the guidance of Don Coryell. After Gibbs graduated, Coryell named him offensive line coach and in three seasons, San Diego State won 27 of 31 games, including a perfect 11-0 mark in 1966. In 1967 and 68, Gibbs was offensive coordinator at Florida State under Bill Peterson, compiling a 15-4-2 record with WR Ron Sellers setting receiving records that still stand.

Southern California Coach John McKay hired Gibbs in 1969 as offensive line coach and in two seasons there, the Trojans were 15-4-1. Next, Arkansas' Frank Broyles offered Gibbs a job on his staff and the Razorbacks were 14-8-1 over two seasons behind QB Joe Ferguson.

The NFL and Don Coryell gave Gibbs his opportunity in 1973. As offensive backfield coach, he helped the Cards post a 42-27-1 mark, winning NFC East titles twice, in five years. The potent offense led the NFC in 1976 with QB Jim Hart using Terry Metcalf, Mel Gray, and Jim Otis effectively.

In 1978, Gibbs re-joined John McKay at Tampa Bay and as offensive coordinator helped develop a rookie quarterback, Doug Williams, and running back Ricky Bell. Coryell beckoned for Gibbs' services again in 1979 at San Diego, where the Chargers have been record setters and two-time AFC West Champions with football's most productive offense.

Born November 25, 1940, in Mocksville, NC, the son of a sheriff, Gibbs moved to the west coast as a child and graduated from Sante Fe Spring High and attended Cerritos Junior College, before transferring to San Diego State.

Gibbs and his wife, Patricia Escobar, have two sons, Jason Dean, 12; and Coy Randle, 8.

Gibbs is a 1976 national racquetball champion and ranked second in the over-35 category in 1977. He is also active in church and youth programs and enjoys precious time with his family.

DAN HENNING—Assistant Head Coach—7th NFL Year

Coached quarterbacks, receivers and the passing game for the Miami Dolphins, 1979-80 . . . With the New York Jets, 1976-78, he tutored the receivers . . . First NFL job with Houston Oilers, 1972, as receivers coach . . . On college level, he was on Florida State staff, 1968-70 with Coach Gibbs and again in 1974 . . . Spent two seasons on Virginia Tech staff, 1971, 1973 . . . Played quarterback at William and Mary, 1960-63, and with Norfolk Neptunes (Continental League) and San Diego Chargers, 1966 . . . Born June 21, 1942, Bronx, New York . . . Dan and his wife, Sandra, have five children: Mary K, 19; Patty, 18; Danny, 16; Terry, 13; and Mike, 8.

RICHIE PETITBON—Defensive Coordinator—8th NFL Year

He has been with the Redskins since 1978, coaching the NFL's top-rated defensive secondary . . . Spent four seasons as defensive backfield coach for the Houston Oilers, 1974-77 . . . As an NFL player from 1959-72, he had 48 career interceptions and four Pro Bowl appearances . . . Began as second-round pick of Chicago Bears, setting five club interception marks and playing on '63 world championship team . . . Later was traded to Los Angeles Rams, 1969-70, and later, in 1971 to Redskins, where he was a member of the 1972 Super Bowl team . . . This is his 22nd year involved in the NFL . . . Richie was an all-SEC quarterback at Tulane . . . Born April 18, 1938, New Orleans, LA . . . Richie and his wife, Beverley Fuglam, have three children: Hope, 18; Richie, 16; and Vicki-Leigh, 15.

JOE BUGEL—Offensive Coordinator—7th NFL Year

Coached the offensive line for the Houston Oilers, 1977-80, where they set club rushing and passing records in 1980 and led the NFL in fewest quarterback sacks in 1978 . . . Started in NFL as offensive line coach with Detroit Lions, 1975-76 . . . Collegiately, he worked with offense at Ohio State, 1974; Iowa State, 1973; Navy, 1969-72; and Western Kentucky, 1964-68 . . . He played guard at Western Kentucky, 1960-62, earning a masters degree in Guidance and Counseling . . . Born March 10, 1940, Pittsburgh, PA . . . Joe and his wife, Brenda, have three children: Angie, 11; Holly, 8; and Jennifer, 4.

DON BREAUX—Offensive Backfield Coach—2nd NFL Year

He has coached 14 years collegiately, including 10 post-season Bowl staffs . . . Came to Redskins from Arkansas, where he was backfield coach for Lou Holtz the past four seasons . . . Served on offensive staff at Texas, 1975-76; Florida, 1973-74; Arkansas, 1968-71, and Florida State, 1966-67 . . . Coached on the Houston Oilers staff in 1972 in charge of running backs . . . Don was a quarterback at McNeese State, 1959-61, and in the AFL with Denver, 1963, and San Diego, 1964-65, completing 92-181 passes for 1,339 yards and nine touchdowns . . . Returns to Redskins staff for third time after three years with Los Angeles Rams, 1978-80 . . . Spent seven seasons here, 1971-77, and three seasons originally, 1959-61 . . . Also coached in the NFL with Pittsburgh Steelers, 1962-68, and Rams, 1969-70 . . . Torgy played linebacker for the Detroit Lions, 1951-54, and finished his playing career with the Redskins, 1955-58, earning all-pro honors five times in his eight years, while playing in 94 of 96 games . . . This will be his 31st year working in the NFL . . . Played center and linebacker for Washington State, 1948-50 . . . Born February 28, 1929, LaCrosse, WI . . . LARRY PECCATIELLO—Linebackers—10th NFL Year

Earned all-Southern Conference honors as a receiver and is now a member of the Hall of Fame at William and Mary . . . Was a Lt. in the 101st Airborne Division . . . Joined Redskin personnel staff in 1969 . . . Moved up to Director of Pro Scouting, then to executive assistant to president in 1978, and to new position in 1981 . . . Played 48 consecutive games at left halfback with Jim Brown . . . Traded to Redskins December 14, 1961, with Leroy Jackson for number one draft choice, which Browns used for Ernie Davis . . . Career totals read 2,735 yards rushing on 513 attempts for 5.3 average; 521 passes caught for 7,953 yards and a 15.3 average; 69 returns for 699 yards and 10.2 average; and 102 kickoffs for 2,690 yards and 26.4 average . . . As a rookie, the unheralded Harmon was the 17th running back the Redskins signed, but when training camp closed, he was on the roster and ready to contribute. He became the first Redskin rookie since Mike Thomas to start a game and went on to start eight more, gaining 310 yards rushing and 119 receiving.

In 1980, he caught 54 passes (one shy of the club mark for a running back) and has been on the receiving end of a pass in 29 of the past 30 games. He had an 18-game streak snapped when he couldn't start the Eagles game because of an injury, but came back to build an 11-game streak.

Clarence established a Redskin record for a game when he caught 12 passes for 118 yards against San Diego. He rushed for 71 yards in that game, giving him 189 total yards, his career-best. He has had three games in which he has scored two touchdowns (vs Cincinnati, San Diego, and the Giants). His first career touchdown came against Dallas as a rookie. He's also returned nine kickoffs for 133 yards and two punts for 15 yards, in addition to being a superb special teams coverage player. Harmon has 2,549 career combined yards (rushing, receiving, returns).

College, Personal: Used primarily as a blocking back at Mississippi State, Clarence had averaged 30 carries per game at Holmes Junior College. One of nine Harmon children, he has two brothers currently playing: Larry (Toronto Argonauts) and Michael (U of Mississippi). Through the years, he has shown himself to be a "complete" back who can run, receive and block. As a rookie, he played halfback with Larry Schreiber, but later moved to fullback and teamed with Delvin Williams and O.J. Simpson. In 1980, he arrived in Washington late in pre-season, but was the starter by week number two and finished with 1,191 combined yards (rushing, receiving and returning).

Return specialist Mike Nelms earned the honors in just his first NFL season. He had earned all-star honors in the Canadian League and led his conference in both punt returns and interceptions playing for the Ottawa Roughriders. In 1980, Mike had a long punt return of 64 yards and a long kickoff return of 51 yards.

Pro Career: In two seasons, talented Milot has started at both outside linebacker and middle linebacker. As a rookie, he inherited Chris Hanburger's right linebacker

spot and became the first Redskin rookie to start an opener since 1970 when DT Bill Brundige did so. Last year, he stepped in to open the season at middle linebacker when Neal Olkewicz was injured in pre-season. After six games in 1979, Rich fractured his wrist and played the remainder of the season with his arm in a cast. He had forced a fumble in the opening series of the St. Louis contest that the Redskins recovered for a touchdown to highlight his first year. In 1980, he recorded 82 tackles, five quarterback sacks, and recovered a fumble. In addition, he intercepted four passes with two of them coming against New Orleans when he earned a game ball.

College, Personal: At Penn State, Rich played linebacker, strong safety, tailback, fullback, defensive end, and defensive halfback in his four years. As a senior, he had three interceptions and had rushed for 191 yards, caught seven passes on offense earlier in his career. He earned his Business degree in marketing and has worked for the U.S. Census Bureau and for Congressman Frank Wolf (R-Va) on Capitol Hill since living in Washington. Rich and his wife, Laura Jean Nelson, reside in Herndon, VA.

Pro Career: A third round 1973 draft choice, Metcalf has gone on to become one of football's top gainers for combined yardage (rushing, receiving and returning), with game-breaking potential. In 1975, he established an NFL record with 2,462 combined yards and went on to become the first NFL player to have three 2,000-yard seasons. He is one of only four NFL players to account for touchdowns five different ways in one season (rushing, receiving, punt return, kickoff return, and passing). He earned Pro Bowl honors twice (1974, 75) and was Cardinals MVP twice.

His first NFL carry was a 50-yard gain vs Philadelphia. Including playoffs, he's had five 100-yard rushing games and 11 games over 200 combined net yards. He has 133 yards for his top rushing game and 280 yards for his top combined yards in a game. He had a 252-yard combined game vs the Redskins in 1976.

In 1978, Metcalf played out his contract option and signed with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League. In his three seasons there, he rushed for 1,914 yards, caught 137 passes and returned kicks for 1,000 yards. He netted 4,168 combined yards, with a top rushing game of 163 yards. He led the Argos in receiving with 55 and 51 catches in the past two seasons.

College, Personal: In 1971, he led NCAA small colleges in rushing (1,673 yards, 6.0 average) and scoring (178 points), while earning college division all-American honors. He was MVP in Coaches' All-American game in 1973 and played in the College All-Star and East-West games. He was conference title holder in both the long jump and triple jump at Long Beach State. Transferred from Everett (WA) Junior College. Terry and his wife, Celeste, have a son, Terry, II and reside in Arlington, VA.

Speedy Monk finished with 58 receptions (five more than the club record), which was 10th in the NFC, for 797 yards and three touchdowns. He got his first NFL start in week number seven against St. Louis at RFK and responded with six catches for 85 yards. From then on he was a permanent fixture in the starting line-up. Had single game bests of 14 receptions for 188 yards and 134 yards rushing. He never missed a practice or game in four years because of an injury. Also a track star and winner of '76 national interscholastic meet in 330 intermediate hurdles. A bachelor, Monk resides in Arlington, VA.

Pro Career: Now the holder of all Redskin records for scoring, field goals, and extra points, Mark has started his climb into the NFL's top ten categories. He is almost machine-like in his success that people expect him to never miss. In 1980, a "slump" caused him to miss two field goals inside 40 yards, yet he made 10 field goals outside 40 yards (second in the League). His average attempt (42.9 yards) again led the NFL and with three plus-50 kicks, he upped his career total to 10. His high kickoffs allowed Redskin coverage units to yield under 20 yards a return for a fifth consecutive season. He has a 97 per cent accuracy rate on extra points over those five years (146-151).

Moseley has led the NFL in field goals made three times (1976, 77, and 79) and the NFC in scoring two times (1976, 79), while earning Pro Bowl honors, UPI first-team honors, and PFW and Sporting News first-team honors in 1979. His 81 points in 1980 allowed him to top the Redskins for a seventh straight year and move into the 18th spot all-time (772 points) as he passed Jim Brown and Paul Hornung.

In 1980, Moseley tied a club record with five field goals in a game (52, 50, 38, 35, 28 vs New Orleans). He booted four in a game vs St. Louis in 1977 and has had 14 games with three field goals.

One of only three "straight-on" kickers in 1980 in the NFL, Moseley is dedicated to his weight program and has squatted over 500 pounds in building his leg strength to its present level. This strength has given him 68 field goals over 40 yards and a club-record 54-yard field goal.

Originally a 14th round Philadelphia Eagles draft choice, he was cut after his rookie year (1970) and signed by the Houston Oilers. In his second year with the Oilers, he was injured and later cut. The Redskins signed him prior to the 1974 season and he ousted veteran Curt Knight to earn a spot on the roster.

College, Personal: Set Lone Star Conference (Texas) records for field goals in season and most points in game, with 50-yard long, at Stephen F. Austin. Only 26 of his 56 kickoffs were returned. He transferred from Texas A&M, where he played quarterback as a freshman. Off the field, Moseley is also a leader. He was honored by both his local Virginia county and hometown Texas county for his efforts. He has worked with United Way, the Heart Association, the Salvation Army, the Red Cross, Goodwill Industries, the Ronald McDonald House, and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Mark has his own television and radio shows, while also entrepreuneuring with his construction company, western wear store, travel agency, and serving on the advisory board of a bank. Mark and his wife, Sharon Allison, have three children: Megan Allison, 5; Lindsay, 2; and Mark DeWayne, Jr, 1, and reside in Haymarket, VA.

Pro Career: For a second consecutive year, aggressive Mark led the Redskins in tackles. His 186 total tackles last season were 60 more than the second player and topped his personal best of 152 tackles in 1979, his first year as a starter. He also intercepted six passes (tied for third in the NFC) as he anchored the NFL's top passing defense from his free safety position.



At 6-4, he is the League's biggest player at his position and has shown the ability to come up to stop running plays or drop deep to cover receivers. He also is the defensive "quarterback", calling signals in the huddle and audibilizing on the line.

In 1977, he and Clarence Harmon were the only two rookies to earn a spot on the roster. As a special teams standout, rookie Murphy blocked a punt vs the Cowboys at Texas Stadium that the Redskins recovered on the one-yard line and rookie Harmon scored a touchdown on the ensuing play. Durable, he played almost every down on defense in 1980 and played on the special teams as well. He hasn't missed a game (62 consecutive) in his four NFL seasons. In addition, he's returned three kickoffs for 44 yards, caught a pass for 13 yards on a fake punt, and has recovered two fumbles for 22 yards.

Popular on and off the field, Mark is the Redskins' player representative to the NFLPA and makes numerous appearances, especially for youths, throughout the metropolitan area.

College, Personal: He earned All-ECAC honors on Colgate's 8-2 1977 team and established a school record for interceptions in one game. Mark showed 10 interceptions and 180 tackles as a starter. As center fielder on the baseball team, Mark also received major league baseball contract offers. Mark earned his BA in Economics and is currently working on a masters degree at American University. He and his wife, Laurie Young, reside in Sterling, VA.

Originally a seventh round 1977 draft pick of the Buffalo Bills, he was released at the end of training camp and signed by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL. That same season, he broke a toe, was cut by Hamilton and signed by the Ottawa Roughriders, with whom he found a home. His third season, 1979, was a banner one that saw him lead the entire CFL in punt returns (a record 106 for 1,155 yards, 10.9 average) and his conference in interceptions (10 for 124 yards). In three seasons, he had 19 interceptions and career averages of 10.2 and 22.6 on punt and kickoff returns, respectively.



As a Redskin, Nelms earned the Pro Bowl with 1,297 yards on returns, with 10.1 and 21.3 averages. Of his 48 punt returns, 21 were for 10 or more yards with longs of 64 (vs Atlanta) and 36 yards (Seattle). His 38 kickoff returns included 12 over 25 yards and a long of 51 yards (vs Atlanta). In his 86 returns and five fair catches, he fumbled but one time and recovered that one. Nelms was also exceptional on both the punt and kickoff coverage units. He played in the NFL's leading secondary in "nickel" passing situations, as well as short-yardage situations, and can play both safety and cornerback.

John set personal bests for yards rushing in a season (1,153), most carries (260), most touchdowns (12) and longest run (66 yards) in 1979.

Career wise, Riggins is ninth all-time with 6,822 yards and a career-average of 4.1 yards per carry. He has caught 216 passes for 1,891 yards, giving him a total offensive output of 8,713 yards. Also, John has scored 54 touchdowns (324 points). Larry Brown and John are the only two Redskins to have had two 1,000-yard seasons. The 1,000-yard plateau was reached by John for the third time in his career and his three 100-yard games upped his career total to 16.

A hard-worker, John battled back from a knee injury in 1977 to earn the NFL's Comeback-Player-of-the-Year by NEA in 1978.

Originally, John came into the NFL as a first round draft choice by the New York Jets. He led them in both rushing and receiving as a rookie and went on to gain 3,880 yards over five seasons before becoming a free agent. His four-year Redskin totals read 738 carries for 2,942 yards, 87 catches for 729 yards, 23 touchdowns, and six 100-yard games.

College Career: John broke all of Gale Sayers' records at Kansas with 2,706 career yards, including 1,131 as a senior. He was a three-time all Big Eight choice and an all-American as a senior. John never missed a game or practice

at Kansas. He was also a two-time state 100-yard dash champ with a 9.8 clocking while in high school.

Last year, in week two, he hurt his knee on an extra point play and missed three games (all losses) before returning.

A team captain for the last three seasons, he has been with the Redskins since 1972. He spent that season on the taxi squad and he played as a backup in 1973 before earning his starting spot. In 1971, George was an 11th round draft choice of the Redskins, but was traded to Kansas City July 24. The Chiefs released him and he signed with the Cowboys in 1972. Dallas waived him on August 2, and the Redskins then claimed him. He has five career fumble recoveries to his credit.

College, Personal: George played tight end and defensive end at Columbia, catching 35 passes for 478 yards. He was also the starting center on their 20-4 and 20-5 basketball teams with Jim McMillian and Heyward Dotson that were ranked fourth in the country. Pro Career: For a second consecutive season, Joe had his best individual season and the club's best by a QB since 1969.

In 1980, Joe's 2,962 yards passing were fifth highest in Redskin history and pushed him over the 10,000-yard career mark. His 262 pass completions were third most in club history and he had a second consecutive year with more touchdowns than interceptions.

The Redskins most valuable weapon on offense, mobile Joe has also run for 825 yards and 11 touchdowns as a Redskin. A gutty competitor, he played in 1980 with a pulled groin muscle, a sprained shoulder, a hamstring pull, and an endless list of bruises suffered.

Originally a 4th round draft choice by the Miami Dolphins in 1971, Joe optioned to travel to Toronto to play for the Argonauts of the Canadian League. He starred three seasons there, passing for over 6,000 yards and rushing for over 1,000 more.

In 1974, the Redskins obtained him from Miami and he filled in as a punt returner (10.5 average) and place kick holder, while awaiting his chance to start.

In 1976, Joe made his first NFL start vs the Kansas City Chiefs in impressive fashion. He passed for 270 yards (20-37 with two touchdowns), ran for 38 yards (one touchdown) and led the team to 30 points and 438 yards, only to watch the Redskins lose with 1:04 remaining on a 63-yard flea-flicker.

In 1978, Joe started the season as the number one quarterback under new Coach Pardee and has started 45 of the past 48 games over the three seasons. In 1979, he was the second highest rated passer in the NFL and has matured into an outstanding signal-caller.

He earned second team UPI all-NFC honors in 1979, while his teammates cited him as the club's most valuable player.

College, Personal: An All-American at Notre Dame, Joe was runner-up in the Heisman Trophy balloting to Jim Plunkett. He set numerous passing marks, still holding the mark for season passing. Joe led the Irish to back-to-back Cotton Bowl trips, losing 21-17 to Texas in 1970 and winning 24-11 over Texas in 1971. He received his bachelor's degree in Sociology, earning academic All-American honors as well. In high school at South River, NJ, he teamed with Cowboys receiver Drew Pearson and was also an all-star baseball pitcher, receiving a pro offer from the Minnesota Twins. An excellent athlete, Joe has fared well in "Superstars" competition (going to world's finals), has been a Virginia state racquetball champion, and is good at golf, tennis, and bowling.



An active entrepreneur on his own, Joe has appeared in a movie (The Man with Bogart's Face) and TV show (B.J. and the Bear), done national TV commercial (Canon Camera), numerous national corporate seminars, local TV ads, owns two restaurants (expanding again), does morning talk shows and sports spots with WJLA-TV, has a radio show with Q-107, published a book (Quarterbacking), and his personal appearance calendar is always full.

Active in community functions, Joe is on the corporate board of Children's Hospital (where his daughter underwent open-heart surgery) and has worked with the United Way March of Dimes, Cystic Fibrosis, Mental Health Association, Special Olympics, Boy Scouts, No Greater Love for MIA-POW's and Hostages, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Joe and his wife, Cheryl Lynn Brown, (who was the sports secretary at Notre Dame) have three children: Joey, 10; Amy, 8; and Patrick, 3, and reside in Vienna, VA.

Pro Career: In four NFL seasons, elusive Joe has gained over 5,000 combined yards and showed his versatility as a runner, receiver, returner, passer and blocker.

As the fourth player chosen overall in the 1976 draft, by the San Diego Chargers, Washington sustained a knee injury in the third pre-season game and underwent a knee operation, forcing him to miss his entire rookie season. He came back in 1977 to gain 461 yards, with a top game of 55 yards rushing on just six carries vs Oakland, plus throwing a 32-yard touchdown pass vs Denver.

On August 23, 1978, the Colts acquired Washington and a fifth pick in a trade for Lydell Mitchell and Washington got a chance to display his talents. In '78, he led the Colts in rushing (956), receiving (45 for 377), and kickoff returns (26.2 avg.). He netted 1,869 combined yards (rushing-receiving-returns). In '79, he was voted into the Pro Bowl with a 1,635 combined yard season and an NFL-high 82 pass receptions. Last year, he added 996 yards offense to the Colts attack.

His finest individual performance came on Monday night TV (9-18-78) when he generated 260 yards and was responsible for three touchdowns. He rushed for 53 yards, caught for 41 yards (one touchdown), returned kicks for 112 yards (90-yard touchdown), and passed for a 54-yard touchdown. He established a Colt record for pass receptions, season (82-1979) and tied the mark for a game (13 vs Kansas City-9/2/79). He has had two 100-yard rushing games (126 on 20 carries vs Miami-10/29/78 and 106 on 22 carries vs Cincinnati-11/4/79). In addition to his 13-catch game, he's had two 10-catch games (vs Miami-11/11/79) and vs the Jets 12/2/79). His top receiving yardage was 130 vs Kansas City-9/2/79) and 121 vs Miami-11/11/79.



College, Personal: He left as Oklahoma's all-time leading rusher with 3,995 yards, a 6.1 average, and 30 touchdowns. He also caught 88 passes for 807 yards, returned kicks for 981 yards, and accumulated 5,783 career yards. Joe wore hand-painted silver shoes en route to earning All-Big 8 honors for three years. Joe's high school coach at Port Arthur (Texas) Lincoln High was his father, Joe, Sr., and his brother, Ken, played quarterback at North Texas State. Joe graduated with a degree in public relations. Joe and his wife, Meadow Lark, live in Port Arthur, Texas.

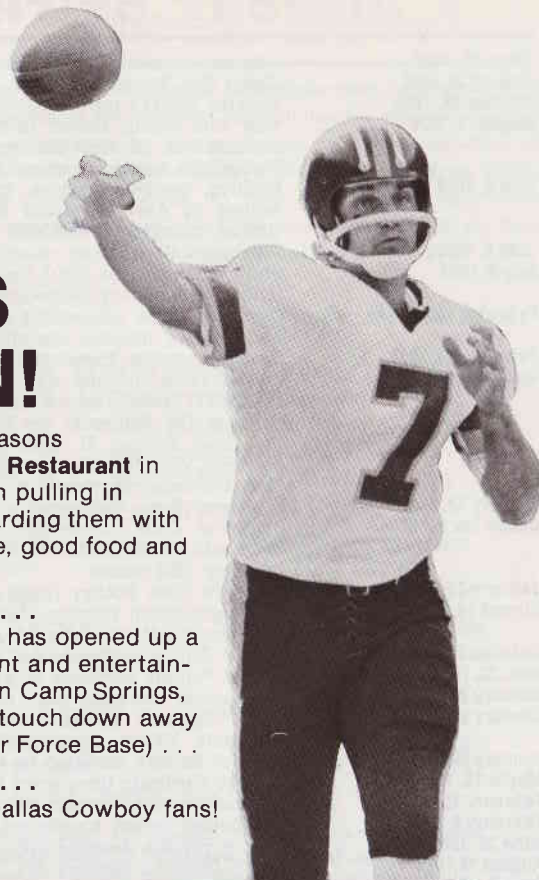

The Super Bowl

In 1970, the NFL was divided into two 13-team conferences, comprised of the 26 teams formerly competing in the National Football League and the American Football League. Each conference was further divided into three divisions, the winner of each conference to be determined by a playoff of the three division winners plus the second place team within the conference with the best record. The winner of the two conferences meet in the NFL title game—The Super Bowl. An additional wild card team from each conference was added in 1978.

The Redskins score the most points in NFL history as they tie or set many team and league records in routing New York, 72-41.

Sonny Jurgensen sets new Redskin and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finish 1, 2, and 4 in the league; highest ever by receivers on same team.

Redskins defeat New Orleans by score of 17-14 to insure their first winning season since 1955. Victory also kept Coach Lombardi's record of never having coached a losing NFL team intact.

Larry Brown, on second offensive play of game with Eagles and needing 4 yards to break the 1000 yard barrier, takes handoff from Sonny Jurgensen and gains 12 yards to become the first Redskin in history to become a member of the 1000 yard club.
